LIGHTING EFFECTIVE FEBRUARY 1, 1945 **7**OUR Government has declared that a shortage of coal has created a situation so critical as to threaten the war effort. There is no shortage of electrical capacity. We have ample capacity to meet the demands

purpos

made upon us for war production and for civilian use as well, but coal is essential for producing electricity. To save essential coal the Government has issued an order, effec-tive February 1, 1945, which prohibits the use of electricity for any of the following purposes:

- 1. Outdoor advertising and outdoor promotional ghting.
