Every Able-Bodied Service Man To Go Overseas, Says Stimson

Every able-bodied soldier in the United States who has not seen service overseas is earmarked to go abroad just as fast as he can be replaced by a returning veteran. Secretary of War Stimson set this forth in a communication made public Tuesday by Rep. Mahon (D-Texas), member of the House Appropriations Committee. Prompted by a suggestion by Mahon that "the bottom of the barrel" should be scraped, Stimson said in this country before shipping combat units from the European theater to the Pacific war fronts. Stimson wrote: "According to February figures, there are approximately 3,000,000 men in the army, 3,150,000 of whom are overseas. "Of the 2,900,000 on duty in the

EARLY START ON 7TH LOAN FUND PLANNED

Floyd County's Quota Is \$777,000, Chairman Of Bond Drive Notified

Although the Seventh War Loan drive does not officially begin till next month, the Treasury Department's statement that all Series E, F and G bonds and Series C savings notes purchased between April 9 and July 7, official closing date of the county's quota, led County Judge E. P. Hill, Floyd county War Loan chairman, to announce Monday that "We're beginning the job now."

Completion of a countywide organization is expected to be effected within the next few days.

Judge Hill has received from E. R. Price, manager of the Inland Steel Company at Wheelwright, voluntary assurance of full co-operation during the drive.

Of the county's quota, individuals have been assigned \$475,000 in Series E bonds and \$50,000 in Series F bonds. The balance will be asked to pay \$225,000 worth of bonds.

Kentucky has 40th among the 48 states in per capita bond sales during this war. It has been pointed out, and Floyd county is being asked to help the other counties of the state meet its commonwealth in the national standing.

Washington, D. C., April 9 (Sp.)—Oliver Little, Jr., aviation radioman, third class, U.S.N., of Fed. A son of Mrs. Oliver Little, of Fed. Little is 20 years old. Before the attack he attended Little of Home-Head State Teachers College, Morehead, Ky. His air group is known as "Crommelin's Thunderbolts" for its commanding officer, Commander Charles L. Crommelin.

RELIGION IN THE SCHOOLS

USE of school buildings for teaching religion would be illegal in the light of the Constitution which provides for the separation of church and state, Attorney General Dummitt has informed those interested in a "week-day religious education" program in Lexington schools.

Mr. Dummitt points out that the spirit and intent of the Constitution is to ban church teachings from public properties.

THE TIMES has no argument to the contrary as to the Attorney General's opinion that church teachings could be construed as linking church and state, but it fails to see wherein the teaching of the broader aspects of religion would do so. The true spirit of religion—belief in the things of the soul, in charity, kindness, mercy, meekness, the Golden Rule—it is humanity itself in the superlative.

It does not waste its great strength on petty differences of opinion or on little jealousies.

Such teaching is needed in the schools. The humanizing effect would save many the brilliant student from self-centered, even criminal, living. There would be fewer Loeb's and Leopold's, more cultured men and women with hearts to temper their temperaments.

A school in this country—its name now escapes us—has established a class which, though not known as a study in religion, might be adopted by the Lexington schools as well as others with good results. It is known as a Sympathy Class.

On a specified day, a pupil arrives, blindfolded, goes to school and throughout the day walks in darkness. He is blind. He suffers all the handicaps of a blind person, is helped by others of the class. Another day, another student will be crippled, or crutches, and so on. The children actually learn the awful helplessness of the unfortunate and find a lasting sympathy for those less fortunate than they. Thus is found, in some degree, humility, meekness, unselfishness.

Of such things is true religion.

Langley Man Wins The Bronze Star Rescuing Wounded

WITH THE 11TH ARMORED (Thunderbolt) DIVISION ON THE WESTERN FRONT—Pvt. Robert E. May, of Langley, Ky., has been awarded the Bronze Star by Brigadier General Charles S. Kilburn, commanding general of the division. The citation reads in part:

For heroic conduct in connection with military operations against an armed enemy. On 14 January 1945, Pvt. May was a member of an artillery forward observer section assigned to a cavalry reconnaissance squadron, mechanized, 11th Armored Division in its attack. The attack required the squadron to advance through a heavily wooded area being situation rendered artillery support unfavorable, the artillery forward observer section was not engaged in its mission and voluntarily assisted in evacuating the wounded. Intense mortar and artillery fire falling in the area was inflicting severe casualties on the supported unit. Under this fire, Private May exposed himself to assist in the evacuation of wounded personnel. By his disregard of personal safety, Private May's conduct was in keeping with the highest traditions of the U. S. Army.

Heinze, Tail Gunner With Commended Group

AN 8TH AIR FORCE BOMBER COMMAND STATION, England—S/SGT John G. Heinze, 19, Prestonsburg, Ky., now at his home on furlough after completing his tour of missions as a tail gunner on a B-17 Flying Fortress of the 86th bomber group, was in the successful 8th air force attack on the key rail junction at Kitzingen, Germany, for which the group was commended by Maj. Gen. E. E. Partridge, commanding general of the Third Air Division. The bombing of Kitzingen rail junction was one of many such attacks made by Eighth air force heavy bombers on a clear day when the heavy planes struck in the enemy's immediate rear, leaving out rail junctions and marshalling yards, paralyzing communications and cutting off the enemy's supply lines. The accuracy of the 96th's attack drew special mention in the commanding general's letter of commendation. Previously, the group had been cited by the President for the successful low-level diversion attack on Focke-Wulf fighter plane factories which had been hidden at Pose, Poland, supposedly out of day-bomber range. The group is a unit of the Third air division, which the President previously cited for the England-Africa shuttle mission attacking Messerschmitt aircraft assembly plants at Regensburg, Germany, in August, 1943. In this attack, the 96th led units of the Third air division.
