RELIGION IN THE SCHOOLS

USE of school buildings for teaching religion would be illegal in the light of the Constitution which provides for the separation of church and state, Attorney General Dummitt has inform-ed those interested in a "week-day er-ligious education" program in Lexington schools

Mr. Dummitt points out that the spirit and intent of the Constitution is to ban church teachings from public properties.

THE TIMES has no argument to the contrary as to the Attorney General's opinion that church teachings could be construed as linking church and state, but it fails to see wherein the teaching of the broader aspects of religion would do so. The true spirit of religion—belief sal, the things of the soul, in charity, kindness; sugrey, meekness, the Golden Rule—does not belong to any church alone; it is humanity itself in the superlative. It does not waste its great strength on

Such teaching is needed in the schools. The humanizing effect would save many the brilliant student from self-centred, even criminal, living. There would be fewer Loebs and Leopolds, more cultured men and women with hearts to temper their temperaments.

JOE BATON . . Commercial Manager of WHAS, is the listener's liaison officer between talent and the sponsors. This job demands a broad knowledge of radio . . plus rare diplomatic form. Born in Omaha, Nebraska, he completed his schooling there, to enter the theater. The stage was set for World War I, and Eaton was soon cast in the role of U. S. Navy man.

Joe made a dramatic entrance into radio in 1922, after the war, bringing before the early-day mike his talents as a singer and trouper. It was an American Legion Convention in 1920 that brought him to Louisville, where he met execu-tives and staff of WHAS. He has been with us ever since.

Moving forward in practical fashion, Joe Eaton scored outstanding success as an announcer with WHAS and is well remembered by listening audiences. After the memorable public service performance of radio during the flood of 1937, he was made Program Manager.

Still bearing the stamp of a successful leading man, Eaton looks back over radio's growth to see many changes. He regrets that mass production of sponsored shows has in many instances directed regional talent away from smaller stations. The electrical transcription may have the uniformity that sponsors desire. . but it lacks the variety that regional talent offers.
