AND ON THE OTHER SIDE

Last Thursday, as American soldiers crossed the last river barrier before Berlin, Franklin D. Roosevelt slipped silently out and across his Last River. Since that time, the great of the world, its newspapers, statesmen, rulers and military leaders, have joined in paying eloquent tributes to this great Voyager. So well have they spoken and written of the late President's major aims and achievements that comment by this newspaper, a week later, would be the retelling of an oft-told tale. Permit us, then, to write of the comparatively little things in Franklin Roosevelt's life, the things which made him so beloved of all the little people of the earth. To us, the outstanding achievement in the life of that other war-martyred President, the immortal Lincoln, was not his freeing of the slaves, noble as it was. What stands out in the Great Emancipator's career in our mind is the cumulative effect of all the little homely traits, all the tenderness and humanities that made him noble. His poignant letter to the widow Bixby, the solemn measure of

his Gettysburg address, his mercy to soldiers consigned to die, his failing sense of humor, his unostentatiousness—these are among the things which add up to the Lincoln the people still love. And so it is with Franklin Roosevelt. We do not have to go to Teheran or Yalta to see the great-souled man that left the world behind only a few days ago. A trip down to Warm Springs, Georgia, to the crippled children there whom he cheered with his gaiety, to whom he gave a new lease on life through his own courage and joyous heart in the face of the same disease which blighted their young lives—there is found one bright facet of the many-sided Roosevelt personality. Listen to a youngster there choke out his grief as the President's body left Warm Springs; hear the old negro accordion-player squeeze out the loved hymns the President had often had him play. You do not have to read the Atlantic Charter to find the true Franklin Roosevelt. Men, far back up the hollows, men deep in the slums muttered. Hope was gone. A negro child cried for food. An immigrant woman complained that she could not buy medicine for her sick baby. Franklin Roosevelt heard them with ears attuned to the breathing of men and things down to earth. "I can't get help here—I'll write the President!" men threatened. And they did write. And the President answered. And things were done for such men. Always the friendly heart, the loving spirit in these two martyred Presidents who, some day, will share history's brightest pages together. A story in homely humor by the one to shake from his shoulders the cloak of melancholy, a flash of wit from the other to shed his mounting load of care—both contributing to the world's laughter. So very human—that is why humanitarian loved them. It would be no small measure of consolation if those who cherish the memories of these two of this nation's greatest could believe that Abraham Lincoln was writing with outstretched hand on the other side of that Last River—waiting for that kindred spirit, Franklin Roosevelt.

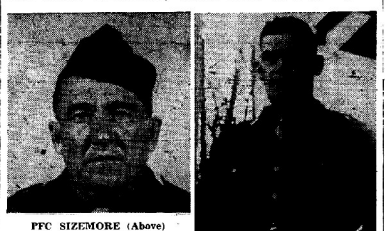

SIZEMORE VOLUNTEERED AT 45 WITH NEPHEW FOR ARMY SERVICE; BOTH ARE OVERSEAS

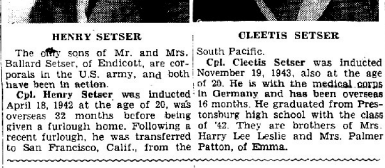

Floyd Captain Finds Death on Lonely Road

Death may come comminantly to the man in battle but it is a macabre awareness that cannot be forgotten. Of how he found death on a lonely road during the drive on Germany, Capt. James Darwin Stephens, son of Circuit Judge and Mrs. Stephens, died in a crash on a lonely road near Lexington. Excerpts from his letter follow: "I was on the green land the space was still and quiet. The air was chilly, moist. You've no doubt seen this kind of weather. It was leaving the ground in early morning when the wind would give a blow it away from frosted grass and brown clay. It was such a morning when I set out on a journey."

"My comrade and I rode for a few minutes until I ran into a rain with a cold, clammy dampness. "We rode along until we arrived at a place where the road was previously told was under observation by the enemy. It was at this point that the enemy opened fire and we were hit a slow target. There were a couple of shots—not any his, but the first was a bullet in the leg and so I was a man's luck; perhaps the worst will come later. After crossing the bank, with trees on both sides, where the road narrowed, much harder to see. A stream was working its way down the gully on the side of the road with my eyes were causing in the channel as it rolled over the tiny precipice and GI food cans and paper boxes.

"Just behind one of the GI K-rations food boxes there sat a soldier. On the opposite side of the stream, he was looking at me. His hands on his knees and his hands almost folded above his lap. His head was tilted back and his eyes were looking at me. His feet were in the water as the stream gently rippled over his shoes. His helmet was off and the rain had pressed his hair to his scalp; his hair hung in a peak and hung over his forehead, where the rain dripped off and hit the ground with a minute splatter. I stared at him so long I began to think I knew him or had seen him somewhere. He was only passing at the time but it seemed like hours as we went by. His face seemed the color of green-yellow, almost like the color of turpentine or dark brown syrup. His right hand, at the junction of the temple and the temple bone, was a blood spatch, with a dark stain of color. He was the right side of his face. He was dead still erect. "Looking at his hands, I was pondering some important problem."

"Yes, I'll bet that soldier really has his mind on his job, too. But many others may never realize that there was a man who sacrificed everything to see that others may have everything, including freedom. But sometimes I wonder what care others as long as they aren't doing a similar job."
