Prestonsburg General Changes Hands; Staff To Be Enlarged, Plan

Sale of the Prestonsburg General hospital Saturday by G. A. Culbertson, Prestonsburg druggist, to Dr. John G. Archer, Prestonsburg, and Dr. James W. Archer, Paintsville, was announced this week.

Although the purchase price was not stated, it was reported as being "about the same as when the hospital was bought from Dr. Daniel M. Culbertson paid Dr. D. H. Daniel, last September, \$30,000 for the institution and all its equipment, when ill health forced Dr. Daniel's retirement.

New-owners of the institution plan to enlarge it as soon as conditional permit, which are designed to make the hospital one of the best in this section of Kentucky.

Pfc. Albert Boy, previously listed as missing, was reported as a prisoner of war and is believed to have been liberated.

STRIKE END SEEN TODAY

Elk Horn at Wayland Idle for Week; Foremen Quit As 2 Discharged

Discharge of the two foremen followed a collapse of roof in two rooms off an entry where they were in charge. It was reported. Hope of mediation between the company and the foremen's union was expressed Tuesday, with an early return to work possible.

"It's all over but the shouting," one in the crowd said. And a moment later the voice of a woman rose in a wailing shout. Men stood silently, unashamedly in tears.

One man said grimly: "It's not all over. There's Japan. One of my boys was killed in the Pacific, another one of my boys is fighting over there right now."

There was no rowdy celebration here. Immediately, all whiskey stores closed their doors, remained closed throughout Monday and all Tuesday. Church bells tolled.

On official V-E Day—Tuesday—most business places here remained closed after Mayor E. P. Arnold had issued a proclamation. 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Vets of Land, Sea War Against Japs Tell Experiences

Two men of the navy and a marine who shared in drags among the starkest in this war told their experiences at Wheelwright Wednesday of their experiences at grips with the enemy, thus accentuating the necessity of greater wartime production and of civilian participation in all Home Front activities.

The trio—Chief Petty Officer E. D. Drinnem and Machinist Mate Sgt. Delbert Sparks, of the navy, and Walter Fritchard, of the Marine Corps—appeared at the Inland Steel Company's monthly safety meeting and in appearance, afternoon and evening, at the theatre there held audience spellbound.

But, explained Sgt. Fritchard, a Californian, "we are not here merely to tell you folks the news from the front when we go back, we will take to the boys the news from the home front."

Petty Officer Drinnem, a native of Covington, Ky., is a survivor of two aircraft-carrier sinkings, those of the Enterprise and the Wasp, and was on the latter when General Doolittle and his raid took off for the historic first bombing of Tokyo. The events leading up to Doolittle's raid were captured in the drama which followed, he vividly described. One bomber crew of Doolittle's squadron was captured, he said, it can now be revealed, and these withstood six months of torture before revealing that it was from the Wasp—not Shangri-la—whence they came. Thereafter, he said, the Wasp was a marked ship and on the day of the sinking the Japanese bombed the carrier from 10 a. m. till 6 p. m.

Sparks, a resident of Louisville, saw his mother a few weeks ago for the first time since he enlisted in the navy in 1937. He told his audience that when he was in the air he spent three years in five jail prison camps, gaining freedom only when American Rangers liberated them in the Cebu-Manila prison on Luzon.

COUNCIL SETS CLOSING HOUR

For Drinking Places Cited by 7 p. m.; Abuses Attributed by Garriott

An ordinance directing that all dispensaries of beer and whiskey close at 7 p. m. on week-days and throughout Sundays was enacted by the City Council Monday evening after a spokesman for the Methodist and Baptist men's Bible classes, the Kiwanis and Women's Clubs pointed out to the Council violations in connection with the sale here of alcoholic drinks.

Restaurants which sell beer are required by the ordinance either to close their beer bars in quarters separate from the restaurant or to close their eating places at 7 p. m.

The Rev. G. Garriott, pastor of the Methodist Church, was spokesman for the groups appearing at the Council meeting. When he remonstrated that the beer bars had been closed here on Sunday, he was told that if proof of the charges could be produced action would be taken. The Rev. Mr. Garriott said "I personally saw persons drinking from beer bottles but I could not swear the bottles actually contained beer." Mayor E. P. Arnold replied: "It's pretty certain they aren't drinking water from them."

The restaurants alleged to have been in violation of the law were notified their licenses may be revoked if the offenses are repeated.

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County Jail Guy Horn was temporarily employed to feed city prisoners after City Jailier Arthur Blackburn was unable to provide necessary foodstuffs.

Use of the vacant Hopkins lot on Court street for dumping garbage and other refuse was ordered halted.

NAZIS TWICE DURING WEEK ACCEPT TERMS

Goering, Quisling, Other Leaders of Vanquished Nation are Captives

Nazi Germany's dream of world conquest ended in unconditional surrender Monday to representatives of the nations for whose liberation Adolf Hitler had waged merciless war for more than five years.

The end came in a schoolhouse in Reims, France, and for good measure the Third Reich surrendered unconditionally again in Berlin two days later to representatives of the Allied governments.

With the official announcement of the surrender made by President Truman and Prime Minister Churchill, of Great Britain, Tuesday morning, that day was observed in all Allied countries except Russia as V-E Day.

Fighting continued through Wednesday only between Nazi field marshals and the Russians in Czechoslovakia, Carniola, and other lands, and air forces of Germany had quit the war.

German General G. J. von S. surrendered to the U. S. Seventh Army, Quisling, the Norwegian stooge leader, was added to the list of those who have signed a new surrender to the Allies. The German and Japanese leaders were in Allied hands.

President Truman proclaimed Tuesday the day of the final victory in the European theatre of the greatest war in history.

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EDUCATION FOR DISASTER

TODAY, May 8, 1945—V-E DAY—three recently published photographs stick with us.

One shows a little German girl in a bonnet-littered street clasping her doll, as little girls have done from time immemorial.

The other two show the horrors of a German prison camp: One a charred corpse with hand outstretched for a can of water; the other, the head of a young prisoner outside the interior of that charred chamber, his torso inside—a human being caught in the hell of man's inhumanity to man as he sought life-giving air and freedom.

The awesome contrast between these two sets of photographs tells the story of the descent of a nation into the abyss via education for cruelty.

Basically, the German child is as other children; the child is the father of the man—therefore, Germans are basically as all other humankind. The child in the picture loves her doll. She is not old enough to have been inoculated with the Nazi virus, the deadly poison of mind and soul which created the hallucination

of a super-race, the mad theory that all others were but pawns in the game of destiny, that all the humanities are the folly of weaklings.

Those other two pictures resulted from incidental sadism and the brutal teachings of Nazism—sadism on a national scale. There was a time, perhaps, when many of those whose brutality has shocked the civilized world may have been normal human beings. But that was before the Golden Rule was abbreviated to Rule in Germany; before the mind of German youth was distorted by a select group of perverts with world rule their only aim in life.

The United States, this V-E Day, should thank God for the form of government which makes such things impossible. Its people should never forget the protection our civilization owes to freedom of speech and freedom of the press.

For, deprived of these, and given a dictatorship fitted with dream of world power and the complete subjugation of his own and all other peoples, there would be none to dispute whatever evil teaching might be presented the boys and girls of the nation. With all our high ideals of the present, America, under such conditions would become as Germany is today—bating, and hated by, all people.

In our own Civil War we had the disgrace of Libby's and Andersonville prisons. England had its "Black Hole of Calcutta." Cruelty is not unknown to any nation.

But those long-ago examples of cruelty were caused by a few individuals. They were exceptions, not the rule; elsewhere, mercy, the principles of humanity, prevailed. Entire nations had not been permeated by inhumanity. But on May 8, through the protection of democracy, the teachings have they escaped Germany's ignominy.

It is the doctrine of hatred and brutality, not the bullets and bombs and shells of war, which destroys civilization.

This V-E DAY, we find some satisfaction in the fact that the end of the Nazi curse, nurtured by distorted teachings of depraved teachers, was reached in the quiet hours of Monday morning in a red schoolhouse, in Reims, France.

ABOARD A U.S. CRUISER OFF OKINAWA (Delayed)—William F. Braddock, 31, seaman first class, of Martin, Ky., had a grandstand seat from which to view the invasion of Okinawa.

This hard-hitting ship, while under threat of air attack, moved up within 3,000 yards of the shore, cruising slowly back and forth and pulverizing the beach targets at point-blank range. The crew could clearly see the explosions from the ship's shells as her guns smashed pillboxes, gun emplacements, warehouses and trench fortifications.

At one time a Jap "Zeke" bomber, pursued by two U.S. navy planes, came within range of the ship's 30-mm. and 40-mm. guns, and crew members of this ship and those of another close by saw the satisfaction of seeing the enemy crash into the sea. Another time, bombs from a Jap plane fell only 200 yards off the port bow.

By early afternoon of invasion day, the big ship's primary target area had been captured and she was free to lend her powerful support against other enemy-held areas.

Bill David Craft has been seeing action in Germany with the 7th army and has been promoted to the rating of private first class. He has been awarded the Combat Infantryman badge. His brother, Fie. Ray L. Craft, is in Germany with the Third army's field artillery and has been in action for the past eight months. They are sons of Mr. and Mrs. W. H. Craft, formerly of Prestonsburg, now of Jeffersonville, Ind. Both boys were basketball stars while in school here.

Ky. Farmers Use Huge Lime Tonnage on Land

The College of Agriculture and Home Economics at Lexington announces that Kentucky farmers have used 12,427.71 tons of limestone, marl and burned lime in the past 20 years. More than 11,000,000 tons were ground limestone.

The largest amount used in any one year was in 1941, when 2,923 farmers used 1,455,703 tons of limestone; 491 farmers spread 161,219 tons of marl and 389 farmers used 9,217 tons of burned lime. Use of lime has decreased slightly in the last three years, due to shortage of labor, freight cars and trucks.

In announcing the use of this huge tonnage of lime in Kentucky, the college says reports are being received about the excessive application of lime. For general crops, two tons of ground limestone to the acre is considered sufficient, although alfalfa growing may require three to four tons on some land.

A bulletin on "Cropping and Soil Management, for Burley Tobacco" says that even for alfalfa and red clover, low soils in Kentucky require more than a first application of two to three tons to the acre and perhaps one or two tons every eight to 10 years thereafter.

Heavy liming, says the college, ties up the mineral elements of phosphorus and potassium in the soil and reduces the amount the crop can get and thereby reduces the yield of several farm crops.

Five carloads or 175 tons of ammonium nitrate have been delivered to Fleming county farmers.

Goal of 95,000 Set For Ky 4-H Clubs
National 4-H Club Week, March 3-11, will find Kentucky with a goal of 95,000 members this year. It is announced from the State College of Agriculture and Home Economics following the scope of club work and its educational and economic value are revealed in a report of the victory garden.
Last year 2,900 clubs in Kentucky had an enrollment of 91,074 members—49,808 girls and 41,266 boys. The work was carried on in all counties.
The club members contributed in the war effort by buying bonds and stamps, by producing food and by helping out in the labor shortage. Approximately \$500,000 was put in bonds and stamps. More than 8,500 club members helped on farms. Their services were especially valuable in picking strawberries and other fruit and in truck gardens.
The club members also raised and cared for 15,383 hogs, 5,256 sheep and 3,334 calves. They also grew 6,783 acres of corn and 3,219 acres of tobacco.
Club girls last year put up 1,113,289 quarts of food and planned and served 88,279 meals, many of them during housework while their mother worked in the fields, taking the place of sons now in war. In learning to sew, 4-11 club girls made 53,881 garments.
Livestock raised by the club boys and girls included 15,383 hogs, 5,256 sheep and 3,334 calves. They also grew 6,783 acres of corn and 3,219 acres of tobacco.

College Suggests Farmers Try Kudu This Spring

Farmers interested in additional hay and pasture and in controlling erosion might try kudu, says a statement issued by Dr. E. N. Ferguson, of the Kentucky College of Agriculture and Home Economics.

Plantings made this spring would give farmers a chance to learn about the habits and value of kudus, and also provide cover for new plantings, it suggested.

Kudus is started by setting seedlings or crowns by early spring. Plants are set 3 to 7 feet apart each way. On land that can be cultivated, plants may be set closer together in rows 7 to 10 feet apart and corn grown between the rows.

Three small fields of kudus are being grown at the Robinson Experiment Station at Gulesland, Bracken county, all on steep hillsides. One field, 15 years old, furnishes grazing for at least one cow to an acre and a half from about June 1 to killing frost.

On a second field, where corn had been grown for several years, three years were required to cover the hillsides and control erosion. The third field, which is on grassland, was established by digging hills and planting crowns and then hoeing around them for one year. The kudus is spreading and gradually taking the grass.

He went on a radio hook-up at 9 a.m. (Eastern War Time), to read his formal proclamation and a solemn warning to Japan that "when the last Japanese division has surrendered unconditionally, then only will our fighting job be done."

He carefully avoided any use of the term "V-E Day" and White House sources made it clear that for the United States no formal V-E Day was proclaimed in keeping with his announced wish that the European victory should not be made the occasion for unrestrained celebration.

It was President Truman's 61st birthday, his first in the White House, and he described it as "a solemn but a glorious hour."

In his proclamation he designated next Sunday—Mother's Day—as a day of prayer for offering "joyful thanks to God for the victory we have won and to pray that He will support us to the end of our present struggle and guide us into the way of peace."

In rejoicing over victory, he asked the nation not to forget that "sorrow and heartache" abide in the homes of thousands of Americans.

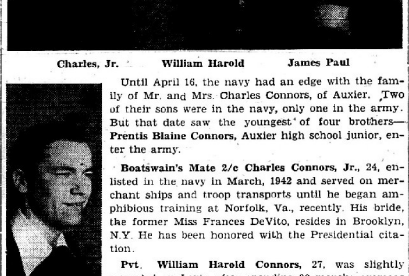
Japs Aker's Shell Off Aker's Helmet But He's Unharmed

BUTLER, PAL WOUNDED AS TWO WITH THEM Killed by Shell

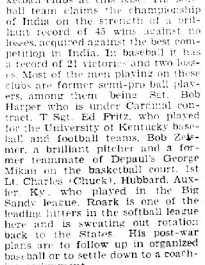
Four American soldiers jumped into one footlocker in the Harpersville forest after afternoon during the early days of the allied push into Germany. One of the soldiers, Butler, was killed by a shell which burst near him. One plunged in head first, another feet first, the other two glided on top of them.

The two who jumped last were killed, the other two wounded and the boy who dived rather than jumped in was David Butler, former Prestonsburg football and basketball star.

He emerged with a part of his foot blown away and shell fragments in the right side of his hip. Later, with his wounds healed, he was discharged. Butler's crawling across a sea of fire and his wounds and loss of a leg are now being treated in a hospital in England.

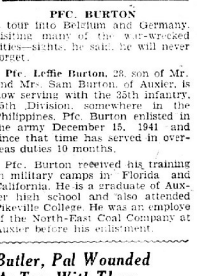
