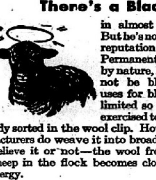

2 pounds ground beef, or 2 eggs	2 teaspoons salt
1 pound each beef and lamb	3 cups soft bread crumbs
1 medium onion	1/4 cup water
1/4 cup diced celery or ground carrot	1/4 cup tomato juice
1/4 cup lard or shortening	2 tablespoons melted butter or margarine
1/4 cup diced green peppers or 1/4 teaspoon pepper	

Chop onion. Brown onion and celery or carrots in lard. Combine with green pepper, salt, eggs, bread crumbs, and water to make a dressing. Add half the dressing (one and one-half cups) to the meat, mixing well. Put out half the mixture in a two-quart loaf pan. Cover with remaining dressing, then top with remaining meat mixture. Bake in a moderate oven (350°F) one and one-quarter hours. Slice twice with tomato juice and butter to keep loaf moist. Yield: 10-12 servings.

Red Cross Offers

Message Service To Freed Americans Families of thousands of American soldiers are anxiously awaiting news from their loved ones. The Red Cross under special arrangements made to supplement the army's notification service, Earl O'Connor, national Red Cross chairman, announced this week. This service is available to those men requesting it.

These next-of-kin notification calls have priority over all other Red Cross communications. Mr. O'Connor said, pointing out that communication cables will be used to avoid taxing military facilities. Full cost will be borne by the Red Cross.

Liberated men who are awaiting transportation home will have an opportunity to communicate with their families. They can send messages through the Red Cross requesting information on the health and welfare of their relatives, and the Red Cross will accept the replies for immediate delivery overseas. While the Red Cross cannot guarantee delivery of the replies, because many of the men will be moving home, every effort will be made to speed the messages. National headquarters will make special telephone calls on hometown chapters to check up on laidly replies.

Families are asked to make no effort to meet the liberated men on their arrival in the United States, and no inquiries should be made of the Red Cross or War Department.

Identical service is being provided to liberated prisoners of Allied nations having relatives in the United States.

Alfalfa grows well in all parts of Kentucky, with proper soil treatment. It is now being used for silage, and its resistance to drought makes it a good emergency pasture crop. Some grasses with alfalfa is a good way to get a good sod established.

New high-yielding strains of red clover are helping to bring this crop back into favor. Lespedeza should continue to make up a part of all seedling mixtures for meadow and pasture.

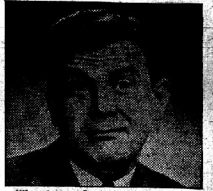

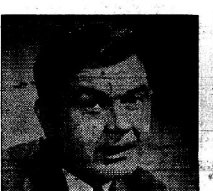

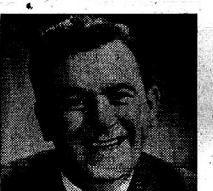
