DISTRICT OPA TO ISSUE 'GAS'

Board Here To Forward Motorists' Applications For Dist. Office Action

No gasoline ration stamps will be issued in the future from the War Relocation Authority Board here, with the exception of servicemen's furlough gasoline rations and emergency ration stamps.

Applications for gasoline now are being forwarded to the district OPA in Lexington and for this reason applications should be filed with the board here from 10 to 15 days before expiration of current rations. Applications for "B" and "C" rations should be accompanied by mileage receipt. Application for "A" rations must be accompanied by auto license receipt. The board here added, however, that the mileage receipt should not be sent with the application for tires.

Although new gasoline sugar certificates may not be issued at this time, those certificates issued prior to the June 1 "freeze" order are valid and may be used. The ration board's mail is flooded by sugar applications which cannot be acted upon until OPA clears up the present situation. This is expected within a matter of several days. The ration board should not visit the office here in connection with gasoline sugar applications already in the possession of the rationing board, said. "There is nothing we can do till the ban on further sugar rations is lifted. However, we will handle all applications as speedily as possible."

No last gasoline sugar certificates will be replaced.

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Mr. Kent in a New Role

FRANK R. KENT, syndicated political columnist, appeared in a new role last week. He lauded the President of the United States, even though the President is a Democrat.

Of course, there are extenuating circumstances protecting Mr. Kent from the wrath of his staunch admirers; for the column in which he got "out of the groove" he has so deeply etched with his hymn of hate of New Dealism and all things Rooseveltian was devoted to praise of President Truman for calling in ex-President Herbert Hoover for a consultation about food relief administration, and in the meantime he took his usual potshots at the late President Roosevelt.

THE TIMES has no criticism to voice of President Truman for consulting ex-President Hoover, a Republican. Unity is needed now as sorely as it was needed just after Pearl Harbor. The conference, it is to be hoped, will achieve some good. To this extent we agree for once with Mr. Frank R. Kent.

But, while he was in mellow mood, why did not Mr. Kent try to keep in harmony with the theme of goodwill between political parties that he introduced in praising President Truman for calling in Mr. Hoover? Why write into the script these lines?

"What Mr. Truman has done is practically clear the air of the hate with which for a long period it had been heavily saturated. . . . During his (Roosevelt's) administration there not only was very real hate between the two parties but there was, besides, intense factional, class and individual bitterness . . ."

Or, having written the lines, why did not Mr. Kent tell whence stemmed that hate which he so devoutly decries?

Franklin Roosevelt was not perfect, nor was he a perfectionist. He had the Roosevelt spirit, a capacity for anger. But hate, never. Those who wanted a scrap got it, but he left the poison of hate to others.

Mr. Kent should remember the "hate" cult—the "hate Roosevelt" cult, in particular. He should know it well. He fostered it.

Does he not remember the cry of "politics" that went up when President Roosevelt called Stimson and the late Frank Knox into the cabinet? President Truman's friendly gesture to the opposition is nothing new—only, it is being more gracefully accepted than were similar gestures made by the late President.

Even in the heat of a Presidential campaign, Governor Dewey's foreign relations expert, Mr. Dulles, received an invitation to the White House and met with President Roosevelt. Any man who would meet FDR halfway was welcome; but he, ever human, was not one to today to those who carried a chip on their shoulders or who unreasonably found no good in him.

Columnist Kent concludes with the statement, "There is nothing so helpful as tolerance at the top." He should have added, knowing that a chain is only as strong as its weakest link: "or in the middle or at the bottom."

Watkins Offers a Worthwhile Plan

STATE Highway Commissioner J. S. Watkins' announcement of a tentative plan for development of 27,000 miles of rural roads over a period of years is encouraging, even though it is a long-view plan covering a period of from fifteen to twenty years.

When, and if, this becomes a reality in Kentucky's scheme of government, the folks up the creeks—men and women, ordinarily forgotten—will tangibly benefit. Thus, government will really reach the people farthest away from it and needing its help most.

Never till the much-maligned WPA came into existence did the "feeder" county roads of this section get worthwhile attention. Before that, an Ohio farmer could haul a truckload of farm produce into this section and sell it as cheaply as, and more profitably than, could the Eastern Kentucky farmer living on a mud road a few miles from a main highway.

THE TIMES trusts Mr. Watkins' plan will not be forgotten over the years that will be required to put it into effect.

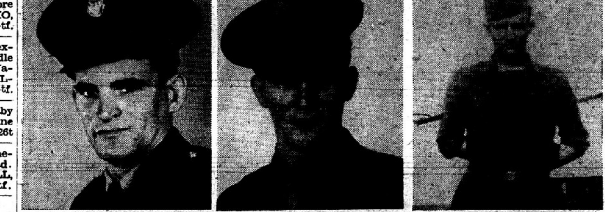

CAPT. HAYES IDECORATED

Fed Air Force Officer Helps Develop Devices Used on Heavy Bombers

AN EIGHTH AIR FORCE LIBERATOR STATION, England (Sp1) —Capt. Paul E. Hayes, Fed. Ky., has been awarded the Bronze Star for meritorious achievement in the performance of outstanding services as sergeant major, assigned to the 8-24 Liberator heavy bombardment group in this capacity he has been responsible for the installation, upkeep and repair of aircraft guns, turrets and bomb-releasing equipment during the 16 months his squadron has been operational in the European theater. So efficiently has this work been performed that his section has consistently received a superior rating.

Capt. Hayes has not been content to stop at the completion of routine duties, but has taken the initiative in suggesting modification and development of many armament devices which have proved beneficial in practice. Technical improvements for adapting the long 5000 lb. bombs, and design of adapters used in installing electrical firing units for turret guns have been developed by him in this direction, and adopted for use in operational aircraft.

According to Major Edward E. Critchfield, Saberton, Ohio, squadron commander, "Capt. Hayes' skill, ingenuity, and his consistent devotion to duty have contributed directly to the safety of his squadron's combat crews, and to the success of his mission in combat."

Capt. Hayes, who is a son of Mr. and Mrs. W. P. Hayes, of Fed., is a graduate of Morehead State Teachers College, Morehead, Ky. He taught high school mathematics and worked as a merchant seaman before joining the army in 1942. He received his commission on October 1, 1943, after completing training at Yale University, and came to England in December, 1943, with the 8th Air Force. He is a member of the 8th Air Force heavy bomber group, which was cited by Maj. Gen. William E. Dill as "distinguished and outstanding performance of duty."

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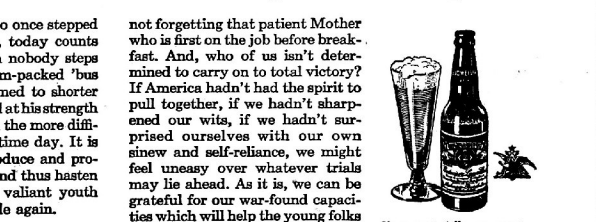
