Elmer Hunt, both in the army.

Pfc. Wells Killed In Philippines May 15



Pfc. Arvil Wells, 22-year-old son of Sam Wells, of Garrett, was instantly killed on Cebu, Philippine Islands, May 15, while fighting as an infantryman.

He had been overseas 26 months. A letter from his commanding officer, Capt. Edward L. Wood, told circumstances of the Floyd soldier's death: "Our company was engaging the enemy 200 yards southwest of Tabogan, Cebu, Philippine Islands. In the action Arvil was mortally wounded in the head by an enemy rifleman. He died instantly. . . Arvil was with us through two major campaigns and was always dependable, even during the many trying times we had to endure. . . He was a credit to his family, his country and his fellow-soldiers."

Besides his father, Pfc. Wells is survived by three brothers and two sisters: Johnny, of Weeburg, Ky.; Grant and Billy, of Baltimore, Md.; Mrs. Emma Wells, of Union, Ky.; Mrs. Doris Wells, of Ind.; Mrs. Doris Wells and Mrs. R. W. Morton, both of Palo Alto, California.

Armored Warfare Vet On Way to 'States'

WITH THE 3RD ARMORED DIVISION IN EUROPE—First Sgt. Chester W. Mosely, of Weeburg, Ky., has been awarded a merit furlough to the United States and is now on his way home for reclassification or discharge.

Sgt. Mosely is a veteran of armored warfare. As a member of the famous Third armored "Spearhead" division he has fought in five European campaigns: in Normandy, Northern France, the Rhineland, the Ardennes and in central Germany. His division was the first armor in Belgium, the first allied force to take a German town, and the first to completely pierce the Siegfried Line.

Wounded March 5 on Two Jima while fighting with U. S. Marines, Pfc. Daniel Howard, 21, son of Mrs. Dove Howard Horn, of Hueysville, died March 13 and was buried at the foot of Mt. Saribachi, atop which took place the Marine Corps' historic flag-raising from which emerged the most striking photograph of the present conflict.

Pfc. Howard joined the Marine Corps Dec. 12, 1942 and served eight months overseas. His brother, Richard D. Howard, is with the marines somewhere in Pacific action.

Marine Corps Accepting 17-Year-Old Volunteers

The Marine Corps is now accepting enlistments from 17-year-olds, it is announced by Capt. Charles G. Haskins, officer in charge of U.S. Marine Corps recruiting in Kentucky.

Men accepted for enlistment will be sent to Parris Island, S. C., for nine weeks of "boot" training. After a 15-day furlough, they will receive additional training at Camp Lejeune, N.C.

A 17-year-old has two enlistment choices: he may enlist in the regular Marine Corps for four years, or he may enlist in the Marine Corps Reserve for the duration of the war plus six months.

Applicants must be between five feet four inches and six feet four inches in height with proportionate weight. At least a grammar school education is required, but high school graduates are preferred. Interested 17-year-olds may report or write to the Marine Corps Recruiting office, 1014 Heyburn Building, Louisville 2, Ky., or the District Recruiting Office, Postoffice Building, Paducah, Ky.

Vet of Four Famous Divisions Comes Home; Wears Silver Star

HEADQUARTERS 3RD ARMORED DIVISION IN EUROPE - First Lt. Donald B. Martin, Prestonsburg, Ky., has been awarded a merit furlough and is now en route to the United States after serving with four of the war's most famous armored divisions.

In September, 1940, and was then assigned to the 1st armored division. After his apprenticeship in Africa, the Prestonsburg veteran went to the 4th armored division, a crack unit of Gen. George S. Patton's Third Army. After a tour of duty here, Sgt. Calhoun joined the 3th armored "Victory" division, another great name on the western front.

At Hottot, Belgium, during the vicious German winter offensive, he was decorated with the Silver Star medal for gallantry in action against the enemy. The French government recognized his services and added the Croix de Guerre with Bronze Clasp to his decorations.

His heroic action against superior enemy forces at Mons, Belgium, during the 1944 summer offensive.

For his devotion to duty during the last push of the war, from the Duren-Roer river salient, to Cologne, then across the Rhine, he was awarded the U.S. Army Industrial Ruler and continue on to the Elbe river at Dessau. Sgt. Calhoun was further decorated with the American Bronze Star medal.

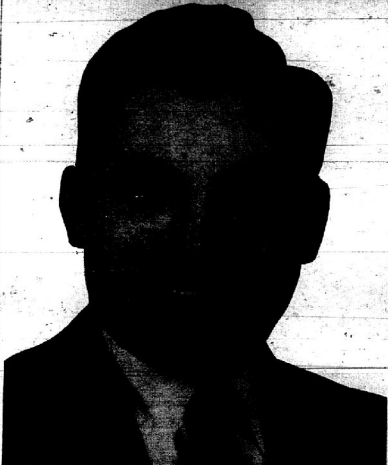

In most camps there has not been any meat in the last 10 to 14 days. If the coal supply is to be maintained this matter must be adjusted immediately as it is serious. It is impossible to expect coal miners to maintain present coal production unless this matter is corrected at once.

"President Caddy has literally burned the wires up sending telegrams to Senator Barkley and Congressman Robison telling the story of the meat shortage in the Hazard field, showing that only two pounds per person of fresh meat, bacon, lard and lunch meat was available for the combined months of March and April. The telegram also revealed that during April only 107 pounds of lard and meats were available for the 11,000 people in the Big Sandy area. Five mines of the Elk Horn Coal Corporation received less than one pound per person for the month of April, including butter, lard and cheese. At the Wheelwright mines 180 persons received less than four ounces for the month of April, or less than 20 pounds per person per year, which includes all fats, butter, lard and cheese. Caddy pointed out that for a population of 1,225, only 18 pounds of meat and 36 pounds of lard were received for one week."

The problems of both counties are familiar to me and none has stronger ties of blood and friendship in the two counties than I. My acquaintance with the two counties and their people would enable me to take to the Circuit Court bench a keen consciousness of their needs which could and should be filled by a Circuit Judge.

These statements are not made as mere "Campaign promises." I ask you to check them in the future against my record as Judge. These things I can do—I am not promising more than I can and will do. I can only offer the services of a friendly, conscientious official who will treat poor and rich, black and white, regardless of political or religious faiths, with complete impartiality.
