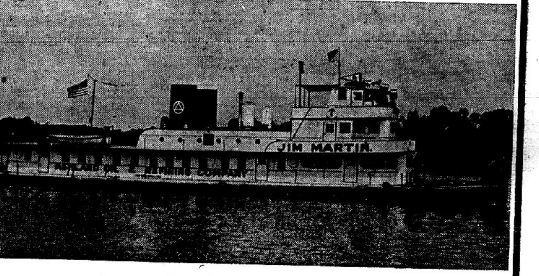

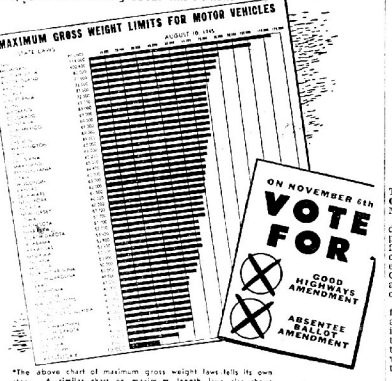

4. An appropriation of \$2,750,000 a year to complete the rehabilitation and modernization of our state hospitals and other institutions.
5. The expenditure of not less than \$5,000,000 (\$3,000,000 more than has heretofore been spent) a year for rural highways, these funds to be spent under the direction of local authorities and the responsibility for the location of rural highways in each county to be in the hands of the fiscal courts.
6. An appropriation of \$1,250,000 a year additional money for the development of a state conservation program, including soil conservation, forestry, parks and public utility to make Kentucky attractive to the expanding tourist trade. This can and will be done without additional expense to the taxpayers.
7. I will vote and work for all measures to aid in the rehabilitation and care of disabled veterans and to protect their rights. Those old enough to fight are, I contend, old enough to vote; and so I favor reduction of the minimum voting age to 18 years for all citizens.
8. I favor liberalization of the Workmen's Compensation Act, including provisions for secondary injury fund; also, I will support legislation liberalizing the duration period and benefit provisions of Unemployment Compensation.
9. I HAVE NEVER FAVORED, I DO NOT NOW FAVOR AND I WILL NEVER SUPPORT A SALES TAX.

These are matters that affect us people of Floyd county as vitally as the people of any other county in the state. They deserve your earnest consideration.

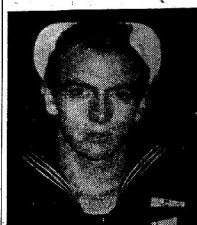

Tire Application Mistakes Causing Delays, Says OPA

All tire inspectors and dealers have been asked by the Office of Price Administration to help inform applicants for passenger and truck tires on how to fill in their application blanks (OPA R-1, Rev. 9-4-41).
Tire applications are being held up because the forms used, which were originally prepared when tire rationing was closely linked with gasoline rationing, are being incorrectly filled in now that tire eligibility rules have been revised. OPA said. Formerly most applicants had to have a supplemental gasoline ration to be eligible for tires, and this in turn was based on occupational use of an automobile. This is no longer used but occupational use of an automobile is still the principal basis for the issuance of tire purchase certificates.
Failure to fill in forms correctly results in the applications being rejected by local War Price and Rationing Boards because of insufficient information on the occupational use of the car. OPA decided it was inadvisable to spend funds on new forms at this time when the old forms may still be used if prepared so as to include all data the boards need.

War Trophy Weapons Registration Asked As Safety Measure

In behalf of public safety, Joseph D. Numan, Jr., Commissioner of Internal Revenue, last week appealed to all merchant and veterans of the armed forces and their families to register and safeguard all war trophies for the safety of both of service families and the public at large.
Under the law registration must be made on every possession of any firearms of the automatic type such as machine pistols, machine guns, submachine guns, or any type gun from which a number of shots or bullets may be discharged with a continuous pull of the trigger. I urge all servicemen, veterans, and their families having any such guns, to communicate at once—in person, by telephone, or mail—with the nearest office of an Investigator in charge. Alcohol Tax Unit, Bureau of Internal Revenue, or to write to me at Washington, D.C. I will assist them with the registration without charge.
At the same time, I urge possessors of these weapons to accept the assistance of the Bureau representative of the Bureau will prevent accidents and keep them out of the hands of the criminal element.

Furthermore, as long as the weapon is serviceable, the law requires payment of the \$200 tax upon each sale, exchange, gift or other transfer of the firearm. If the gun is made permanently inoperative, it may be transferred as a war trophy without payment of the \$200 tax by the filing of Form 1 (Firearms) with the Commissioner of Internal Revenue, Washington, D.C.

BOTH PARTIES REPRESENTED

In Program Backing State Good Roads Amendment Move

Unreserved support of the Good Roads Amendment which goes before the voters for ratification November 6, was given by Governor Simon S. Willis at Lexington yesterday by 25 members of the Good Roads Federation at the Lafayette hotel to launch the drive to carry the amendment.
Len B. Shouse, president of the Federation, presided and other speakers were Thomas R. Underwood, editor of the Lexington Herald, J. Stephen Watkins, state commissioner of highways, and State Senator Stanley B. Mayer, Louisville attorney. The addresses were broadcast over a state-wide hook-up of radio stations.
"Here are some sincere and genuine friends of good roads who are backing the amendment," said Governor Willis. "They are not backing the amendment because it is not necessary to have a state road fund for diversion to other purposes and, second, that the present program is not clear enough as to its purpose and effect.
"However, it is found necessary to adopt such amendments, and several states are proceeding in the same manner to protect their road funds. We have learned from the experience of other states that revision is necessary, because at every session of the Legislature there is spent in combating efforts to make inroads on the road fund. Mere statutory protection is not sufficient. It is too easily overruled. Already, the state has had to raise taxes on highway users' taxes have been diverted to non-highway purposes.
"Whereas it is necessary, when so much money is being diverted from road funds to other purposes, this is especially rough treatment of the road user, and a very large proportion of all other taxes which make up the general fund. The amendment is absolutely necessary to protect the road fund, now and in the future."
Governor Willis stated that the amendment does not mean in any way directly or indirectly any additional tax or any other tax that would be levied on the road user. In the amendment proposed, he stated that the power of the Legislature is not improperly curtailed.
"By increasing the tax for the roads, and all other taxes," he declared, "the only limited tax that is levied on these particular sources is the only diverted tax for highway purposes. The greatest need in Kentucky today is the completion of our highway system and the construction of our rural roads. The rural road program stands side by side with the urban road program because it affords access to schools, churches, and markets."
In concluding his talk, the Governor appealed to all voters of the state to support the amendment. "It is strictly a non-partisan progressive step which if other states have not taken, we should take. It is the duty of every citizen to support it because it will advance the welfare of Kentucky and of all Americans. I heartily and unreservedly support it. I regard the amendment as the greatest road program ever planned for Kentucky."
The Governor pleaded for unified action on the part of all of Kentucky's voters in support of the amendment. "If I thought for a minute that this amendment was going to provide highways at the expense of airports, highways paid for out of the pockets of the people, or that it would harm or destroy or rob the farmers of Kentucky, I would oppose it."
He said, "For 30 years those who are opposing this amendment have been fighting and opposing other advancement for the state. I believe that every citizen who is a Kentucky voter should pass both of these amendments in November. Let us work out every problem, in the right way, honestly and together, expeditiously and as far as men, not as rodents men or as al men, not as Democrats or as Republicans, but as Kentuckians bent on making this a progressive, advancing commonwealth and the best on earth."
