Post Official's Letter Tells of Dee Pigman

Details of the death and funeral of Dee Pigman, who died recently in Dillon, Mont., are given in this issue. In a letter written by George R. Baker, adjutant of the Deceased American Legion Post there. "Dee had many friends here and was very highly thought of. He had been in this section of Montana for eight or nine years, as near as I can find out and held many responsible positions with several large stock ranches. "Due to his health he had not worked recently and was staying at the Meeten hotel here, as he had, off and on, for years. He lived at the hotel and took his meals at restaurants, and saw his friends daily. Several of his friends likewise stayed at the hotel from time to time and he always had congenial friends around him who were aware of his critical health condition. At least one of these friends was with him when the fatal attack occurred. "The funeral was conducted by the Legion and interment was made in the Legion memorial plot in Mountain View cemetery, a large number of friends attended and the regular Legion burial rites were held. "I am sure that any of his family would have found solace in the many manifestations of warm friendship and esteem that were evidenced at his passing and I know that the Post membership will want me to express their sincerest sympathy. "During World War I Mr. Pigman served with the 32nd field artillery from April 29, 1918 till May 26, 1919.

FOUR FLOYD MEN WIN AWARDS FOR HEROIC SERVICE IN ACTION

For meritorious service in action, four Floyd county men have been cited, recent press releases received by THE TIMES relate.

The decorated Floyd servicemen are:

Sgt. Francis K. Claggett, son of Mrs. Bertie Claggett, both of Lackey, 8/5 Sgt. Charles Jarrell, son of Mrs. George Sam Jarrell, Prestonburg, Pfc. Troy Hunt, of Lancer—all receiving the Purple Heart and the Air Medal.

Sgt. Jarrell, 19-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. H. Howell, of Harold, who received the Air Medal.

Cpl. Howell, a nose runner on a B-24, is a veteran of 15 missions over Rome and the Colinas, Italy, during his parents of the Air Medal service. Gen. George C. Kenney wrote, in part:

"He was cited for meritorious achievement in participating in aerial flights in the Pacific area from May 11, 1944 to July 17, 1945. "Your son took part in sustained operational night missions during which he displayed exceptional courage and valor. These operations, consisting of bombing missions, enemy airdromes and installations as well as attacks on naval and cargo vessels, aided considerably in the recent successes in this theatre. He has been a very real contribution to victory and peace."

T/S Claggett, a member of Major General James L. Bradley's 5th "Desdemona" division, was cited for service April 5.

In decorating Claggett, Maj. Gen. Bradley cited him as follows:

"When the forward observer under whom he was fighting was mortally wounded by enemy machine gun fire, Claggett rapidly proceeded thirty yards across an open field under murderous enemy machine gun and small arms fire and administered first-aid to the dying man. With the aid of a fellow observer, T/S Claggett dragged the wounded man back across the field to safety from increasing enemy opposition attracted by their movements. Not until the wounded man had been taken to the aid station did T/S Claggett relieve himself of the duty he had so willingly and courageously undertaken, and seek cover from the enemy fire. T/S Claggett's credit and composure under hazardous circumstances reflect great credit upon himself and the military service."

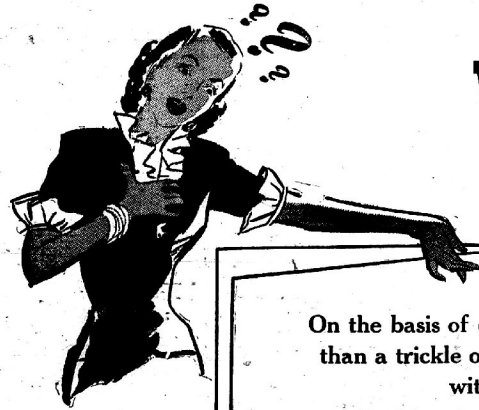

ANY QUESTIONS?
Editor, The Times:
The Floyd County Club hereby expresses its gratitude to you for your fair presentation of the facts about the organization in the Times' editorial last week. You know whereof you spoke, since a copy of the club aims, as outlined to date, has been in your possession for some time, awaiting space for publication. But even then, they are only tentative. Why? asks someone. Simply because the club leaders want, and have invited from time to time, representatives from ALL communities to come to these meetings and to offer FRUITFUL suggestions. Today, the Floyd County Club corresponds somewhat to that of the United Nations: IT IS STILL IN THE MAKING; and the groups who started it have no intention of forcing their ideas on the community. Instead, they are asking for YOUR suggestions, and have compiled in the club aims, to date, proposals from many sources.

poses, a worthwhile objective, entirely overlooked by the committee, who feels many letters are better than one, and continues through the press and at rallies to plead for further suggestions. The constitution is ready for approval by the Board, which includes representatives from all over Floyd county. One of the by-laws strictly forbids any political activity, and no public official can hold office in the club. No club funds will be spent for or against Prohibition or any other similar issue. Club officers and members will be free to do as they please—individually, with regards to such questions, the way members of other organizations do.

Movements like this are starting all over the world, in countries, states and provinces. It is so general that further progress cannot be retarded in any other similar issue. Thousands of tourists will come here when the John Creek dam is constructed. Will we awake and be ready, as suggested?

As an example: after the Garrett community rally, Mr. Ed Singleton contacted one of the club officers, suggesting that the club aims include co-operation with the county health department in eradicating venereal disease and in helping to promote an educational program concerning same. His idea was immediately incorporated in the Aims and Pur-

The idea of this movement originated in the Prestonsburg Woman's Club, when Mrs. Minnie Grace Sutherland, in an address before that organization last spring, told what Pikeville and Pike county were doing for their veterans: planning to erect an expensive building in their honor she said, as she described the planning board. The movement in Floyd was made county-wide from the beginning, and its major objective—the one calling for funds—remains, some type of memorial to the boys. Several proposals have been given. To date, the one receiving the heartiest approval is a club building in Prestonsburg for day and county organizations, with rest-rooms for the public, and a shrine chamber dedicated to our servicemen, photos of those who can never return on the walls. The bulk of membership fees is expected to go to this or some other memorial. Several organizations over the county have offered to contribute to it. If the city of Prestonsburg wishes to raise additional funds separately to enlarge its, provide a basement, or an extra floor, that is up to the citizens there. The club plans to hold a county-wide rally at which a membership drive will be launched. We raise thousands in Floyd for worthy causes, whose funds are chiefly from outside. No objects. Buy not raise and spend some at home? Unless something is done in the near future for the servicemen, it will never be done. Those boys who fought and died for us, for the Four Freedoms, will be forgotten! This is true, yet there are thousands who will never give a dollar nor plant a dogwood tree. And there are those so lacking in noble impulse themselves that when two of the leading

WHAT WAS NOT REPORTED

The daily press reported last week that four forest fires in the state remained unchecked. The locations of these fires were listed as to counties. Floyd was not mentioned.

But it should have been, if the publicizing of an atrocity against nature and the hopes of civilized man helps in any way.

Two forest fires blazed brightly against the mountain backdrop to the Prestonsburg scene last week. On the northwest hillside, across the river from Prestonsburg, one burned down to within a few hundred yards of the river's edge. On the northeast hillside, a forest blaze crept to within a hundred yards of Trimble Branch. All up and around those two hills and in the swales and branches adjoining, the fire caused damage THE TIMES is unable to assess; truth to tell, it is doubtful if even the most experienced forester could make an accurate estimate of such damage.

This was one Floyd county community. In how many others did forest fires rage undetected?

One of those fires was on the east side of the Big Sandy river which, we

have been told, is under protection of the Forestry Service. It raged, we are assured, as unopposed by firefighting men as did the blaze on the west side.

Only nature itself brought the fires to a standstill. In some spots, there might have been nothing more to devour. But where the flames persisted, last week's rains brought blissful black-out.

Neither of those hillsides could spare the leaves, the trees and underbrush that gave them some measure of protection against erosion. The wild-life there needed all the cover and food the hills contained. But the leaves and the food went up in an unretarded holocaust of flame and heat; many the growing bush or mature tree died mean while.

THE TIMES cannot believe these fires were maliciously set; it shrinks from regarding any individual's intelligence so low as not to know better than to set such a fire. But it does see in those hill-girdling rivers of fire that were by night so beautiful to the eye a gross, unknowing carelessness on the part of somebody, possibly a hunter, mayhap a boy playing in the woods.

At the same time, we would be persuaded to become caustic toward those paid for fighting forest fires, were we not so poignantly reminded that all of us are so little concerned with such matters—occurrences which affect the beauty of this section of Kentucky, which reduce its natural wealth beyond our shallow measure, destruction which only nature can restore.

If we continue to permit man-made destruction to fight nature's restoration—what can we by any rule of sense or thumb expect but nature's retribution by way of eroded hillsides, woodland that is not, extinct wildlife—and a new American desert?



AMBIGUOUS DAY THOUGHTS

This is Armistice Day, a holiday for some folk. Not for us. Busy, we take time off to think of the day and of its deep connotations. There, for instance, is the case of the discharged soldier, home for only a few days when Election Day in his home precinct at Point Creek revealed that somebody had decided by voting for one candidate to exercise his right and all the other folks there the right of suffrage that was theirs and for which he had been fighting for three years. He was "burned up" and miserable, too, as he pondered our American Way of Life.

And then we consider the aims of the election in this war that is now officially ended. Must now, we hear the roar of a blast from a neighborhood in the city of New York, November day twenty-seven years ago when the War in Europe ended. A few hours ago, our radio here in this section, of a black and white war, and a rather dark outlook in Germany where starvation and lack of shipping facilities to return veterans home from Europe aid the Pacific.

This Armistice Day, all men of goodwill and all men who shrink from world-raging war and all who would protect their sons and the sons of their kith and friends from further sacrifice at the feet of Mars look to a way out of this terrible mess—a way along which man's mind may walk in peace. Some say, crush the conqueror till they may never rise again; others hope mankind, all races, creeds, and religions—may find common ground on this road to peace.

Long before World War I, Mark Twain, America's beloved humorist, wrote a satiric prayer, noting at the time that "it can be published after an end, for only dead men tell the truth in this world, and we have sold the whole truth in this prayer."

Mark Twain thus blasted away at the spirit that prevails among many, that Armistice Day of the good year 1945.

"O Lord, our God, help us to tear their soldiers to bloody strands with our shells; help us to cover their helmets with the pale forms of their patriots dead; help us to lay waste their humble homes with a hand which unflinching help us to turn them out rootless with their little children to wander unfriended through the wastes of their desolated land in rags and hunger and thirst, and when the sun's flames are dim and icy winds of winter, broken in spirit, mourn with travail, imploring that they be buried in the earth and filled it. For our sakes, who adore Thee, and bleed with their tears, stain the white way with the blood of their wounded feet. We do not know who is the Spirit of love and who is the ever-ready refuge and friend of all that are sore beset, and confide hearts. Grant us our prayer, O Lord, and Thine shall be the praise and honor and glory, now and forever."
