debtless and \$20,000 for the city board's part of the Arts and Science building, or a total of \$64,000, will be issued at this time. He added, however, that it will be possible at any time to sell an additional \$20,000 worth for gymnasium construction.

The Floyd County Board of Education will bear half the expense of the Arts and Science building and also of the gym construction when it is undertaken.

Original bonded indebtedness incurred in the construction of the grade school here was \$50,000. The principal indebtedness, with interest, has been reduced to \$44,000—and that, declared a board member this week, "is every cent we owe."

Council at Monday's meeting also enacted an ordinance seeking to annex to the city an area at the upper limits of Prestonsburg where considerable building development has been made in recent months.

Following a discussion of the street-cleaning problem here, including that of garbage disposal, Mayor pro-tem Bill Fitzpatrick named a committee of Councilmen to visit, with Charles Chumley, of the Kewanee Club, the neighboring towns of Paintsville and Pikeville to study systems employed there.

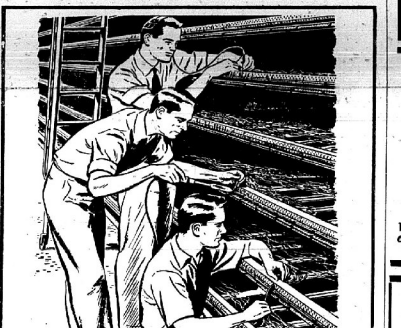

The project, as recommended, includes such interesting items as: (1) Two hundred miles of improved channels extending from Cashelburg to Louisa and thence up the Levisa Fork to Russell Fork and up the Tug Fork to Sprigg.

(2) Two double chamber locks on the Big Sandy and four single chamber locks on each of the two forks, all locks to be 80x100 feet, or sufficient to pass four barges and the tow boat at one lockage.

(3) One hundred miles of rip-rap for bank protection plus considerable dumped bank protection. Alterations will be required on 43 bridges, 12 highway bridges, and five railroad bridges, one of which is narrow gauge, in order to provide channel widths of 200 feet on Big Sandy and 150 feet on the two forks and vertical clearances of 25 feet above navigation stage. Because most of the tangible benefits will accrue to coal consumers in many states, it is recommended that the cost of these alterations be included in the cost of the project and paid for by the government.

TO THE MEN AND WOMEN OF FLOYD COUNTY

It is good to be home. It is good to be back with my family and my friends. It is good to be home again with the people of our Kentucky hills. It would be a pleasure to settle down and just relax for a while and not move from this spot. But "the moving finger writes, and having writ, moves on." And such is this case, for to doff the khaki and the blue and retire from foreign service, is but to don the cloak of battle again and carry the victorious torch of liberty to higher, safer and firmer ground.

Again our glorious heritage of democracy has been preserved for us by blood, sacrifice and deprivation on foreign soil; by tears and sweat and aching hearts at home. But, PRESERVATION of it, time and time again, is not enough. It must be made to glow in the darkness of the world and lead us on to a greater and fuller life. It must be made to lead us to a life that is deserved by our stalwart people. We must cleanse the bloody sword of victory before replacing it in its sheath.

Until that bloody sword has been entirely cleansed, I cannot rest, I cannot relax. I am starting out now and I shall go from hill to hill and from valley to valley; the same hills and the same valleys from whence went so many examples of fine young manhood, fine, strong boys to make whatever sacrifices that

were needed. I shall go into the fields and talk with the farmers and into the coal banks and talk with the miners and into the homes amid the family circle as they huddle close to the open fire. And I know that in many of these homes I shall find families that are still saddened by their loss on the field of battle. And I know I shall find many family circles broken by the absence of one or more of their boys who lie buried on foreign soil in war-torn Europe or on a lonely island of the vast Pacific.

I shall meet and talk with and listen to our people, for how can one propose to represent the people unless he knows the feel of the calloused hand of the farmer whose hours of labor are longer than the light of day. How can he, unless he knows the feel of the hand of the miner, with coal dust ground into flesh too white from lack of the noon-day sun? One must know the feel of the hand of the merchant as he waits on his trade and listens to the problems of the countryside. One must shake the hand of the housewife as she toils to keep clean her children and her home. And I shall stay in the hills; I shall stay in the fields and at the crossroads until I know the people and the people know me. Then the people will know I am sincere and that my heart beats with their hearts. And I know that that sincerity is so great that it will radiate confidence. Then those cal-

loused hands will grasp mine and the people can and will say, "Howes, son, I am with you; go on and fight them, fight for what's ours, fight for what's right, fight for our people in these Kentucky hills, fight for the rights of our boys and don't let up until victory is ours."

Long has there been a flame of desire burning in my heart to help my people. I am proud of our heritage in being born of strong mountain stock. We live in the greatest section of the greatest state in the greatest nation of the world. We have the greatest, truest and bravest people in the world right here in our hills. Just look at the war records of the boys from these hills—the greatest percentage of sacrifice, combatant service and Purple Heart awards of any other section of the entire United States. We all must be proud of that distinction. We are proud of the record of the boys. We are proud of the families of these boys—proud of their fathers, mothers, wives and sweethearts who stayed behind worrying day in and day out—carrying a heavy heart in their bosoms every hour—living in dreaded fear of that fateful telegram—a telegram telling the worst news that can be heaped upon a person—that their loved one—the light of their life—had laid down his life for his country—laid down his life that others might live in peace and security—a peace and security he could never again, in this world, enjoy. His life

was gone. We who are privileged to survive and return are prone to want to forget. We must not forget. Many can never forget. Those who have suffered the most cannot, the rest must not. For when we do, we are forgetting our Lord who favored us with victory—who favored us with brave hearts—who favored us with strong and brave boys to go forth in battle and win, many times against insurmountable odds—with brave and strong mothers, fathers, wives and sweethearts to keep the home-fires aflame; with loved ones at home who would go forth and produce all that was needed to win—to guarantee victory.

We, as a nation, face many problems. Last September I made this statement and I still believe it: "A nation that can accomplish so much and overcome the great tasks forced upon us by foreign countries, in which we stood to gain nothing of a material nature, can and must overcome the simpler domestic problems of unemployment and scarcities and even the fear of unemployment and the fear of scarcities of essentials needed for a full and free life. Our American spirit is the one thing that must be used as a basis for this freedom in our pursuit of peace and the maintenance of that peace."

Many of you are familiar with the passage, "The letter killeth; but the spirit maketh alive." That is my creed; that is my platform.

I am Howes Meade, a lawyer from the hills of Kentucky. Many of you will remember that I announced my candidacy for Congress last September, while I was still serving overseas with our Navy. Now that I have returned I am starting out to do exactly as I stated at that time—to see the people and meet with them and talk with them and listen to them.

I want to know all the people and I want all to know me. I want the people to know my qualifications—I want them to know what I stand for—I WANT THE PEOPLE TO KNOW WHAT RESTS IN THE HEART OF A MOUNTAIN BOY.

As stated in my announcement last September, my father was Lloyd G. Meade and I am the grandson of Henry S. Howes. My family has lived in these hills for over 150 years. I am married and have one child, a daughter 7 years old. I was practicing law when we became engulfed in war. The day after Pearl Harbor I volunteered for the army. I was rejected but continued to volunteer and was received by the Navy in 1943, and went on active duty immediately.

I was born 33 years ago in the Happy Hollow section of Paintsville, Johnson County, Kentucky. I attended the public schools, Mayo College, and was graduated from the Kentucky Military Institute in 1929. After my graduation I enrolled in the Western State Teachers College at Bowling Green and left during the height of the depression and accepted employment in the Second National Bank of Paintsville, Kentucky. For a number of years I was manager and auctioneer at the stock yards in Paintsville. In 1936 I resumed my college studies at the University of Louisville, where I was an honor student, and was graduated from its School of Law in 1939. I have been very active in my church, the First Methodist in Paintsville, serving on its official board and as president of the Men's Bible Class. I have been active in civic work as president of the Kiwanis Club, and for a number of years as chairman of the Red Cross drives. I have been a life-long Republican and a party worker since before I was old enough to vote. I have served as campaign chairman in Presidential and Congressional races.

To the farmers I offer a long and substantial friendship in the development of our mountain farms and in the daily swapping and trading of livestock.

My father was a member of the United Mine Workers and I have defended the miners and other workers in local, state and Federal courts.

To the returning service men I offer a common understanding of our present and future problems that has been thoroughly instilled during our service.

To all I offer my legal and business training and experience, coupled with youth and the energy that goes with youth, plus an ironbound determination that our hard-earned peace shall not now be marred by an economic setback such as followed the last war. We have earned prosperity and we shall have it.

I know the problems confronting the farmers, the miners and the returning service men. I believe in doing something about them other than just talking. These problems can best be dealt with through the medium of a Congressional office. I am a candidate for that Congressional Office.

THE PROBLEMS OF PEACE BELONG TO ALL OF US JUST AS DID THE PROBLEMS OF WAR.

ORDINANCE

At a regular meeting of the General Council of the City of Prestonsburg, Kentucky, held at the City Hall on February 18, 1946, the following ordinance was passed and enacted:

An ordinance providing for the annexation of certain lands to the corporate limits of the City of Prestonsburg, Kentucky, as is provided in Sec. 2, 3 and 4, Revised Statutes.

WHEREAS, It appears that an extensive amount of business and residential buildings has been completed and is being completed in and on the lands adjoining the eastern corporate limits of the City of Prestonsburg, U. S. 23, and

WHEREAS, Several owners of said properties have indicated their desire that said lands or properties be annexed to and made a part of the City of Prestonsburg;

WHEREAS, It is the opinion of the General Council of the City of Prestonsburg that said lands or properties should be made a part of, and incorporated within, the City of Prestonsburg;

Upon motion of Clabe Bingham duly seconded by Frank Layne, the above ordinance was introduced, and will:

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE GENERAL COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF PRESTONSBURG, KY.:

Sec. 1. That the following described tracts or parcels of land situate in Floyd County, Kentucky, on the waters of the Big Sandy river, and adjoining and being contiguous to the present eastern limit of the City of Prestonsburg, Kentucky, be and the same are hereby annexed to, incorporated within, and made a part of the City of Prestonsburg, Kentucky. Said tracts or parcels of land are described as follows:

"BEGINNING at a point on the present eastern corporate limit of the City of Prestonsburg, at the low water mark on the eastern and southern end of Lot No. 1 of Block No. 2, of Richmond Sub-Division No. 2, and running in an easterly direction to the meanders of the Big Sandy river, and along the low water mark of said river, a distance of 380 feet to a point; thence from said point in a northwesterly direction and in a straight line a distance of 90 feet to a point; thence in a westerly direction and in a straight line a distance of 102 feet to a point on the present corporate line a distance of 1025 feet, crossing U. S. 23, to THE POINT OF BEGINNING."

The ordinance does not attempt, nor is it intended, to annex or incorporate any part of the present right-of-way of the Kentucky Department of Highways, now known as U. S. 23, which said right-of-way now passes through the lands hereby annexed and incorporated into the City of Prestonsburg, Kentucky.

Sec. 2. All ordinances or parts of ordinances in conflict herewith are hereby repealed.

Sec. 3. This ordinance shall become and be in full force and effect from its passage by the General Council of the City of Prestonsburg, and its publication as is required by law.

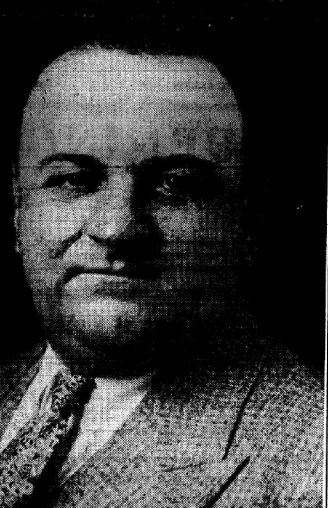
