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ORDINANCE

At a regular meeting of the General Council of the City of Prestonsburg, Kentucky, held at the City Hall on Monday, February 27, 1946, the following ordinance was passed and enacted:

An ordinance providing for the annexation of certain lands to the corporate limits of the City of Prestonsburg, Kentucky, as provided in Sec. 81-210, Kentucky Revised Statutes.

WHEREAS, it appears that an extensive amount of business and residential buildings has been completed and is being completed in and on the lands adjoining the eastern corporate limits of the City of Prestonsburg, along U. S. 2, and

WHEREAS, several owners of said properties have indicated their desire that said lands or properties be annexed to and made a part of the City of Prestonsburg, and

WHEREAS, the opinion of the General Council of the City of Prestonsburg that said lands or properties should be made a part of and incorporated within the City of Prestonsburg, Kentucky, is

UPON MOTION OF CLABE BINGHAM, seconded by Mrs. Glenn H. Hall, of the following ordinance was introduced, to-wit:

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE GENERAL COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF PRESTONSBURG, KY.:

Sec. 1. That the following described tracts or parcels of land situated in Floyd County, Kentucky, on the right bank of the Big Sandy river, and adjoining the eastern limit of the City of Prestonsburg, Kentucky, and the same are hereby annexed to, incorporated within and made a part of the City of Prestonsburg, Kentucky. Said tracts or parcels of land are more particularly bounded and described as follows:

"BEGINNING at a point on the present eastern corporate limit of the City of Prestonsburg, at the low water mark on the western side of the southern end of Lot No. 1 of Block No. 1 of Richmond, and extending southward a distance of 2850 feet to a point; thence from said point and in a northwesterly direction and a straight line a distance of 500 feet to a point; thence in a westerly direction and in a straight line a distance of 380 feet to a point on the present corporate limit of said city; thence in a southern direction and along said corporate limit a distance of 100 feet to the U. S. 2 HIGHWAY; thence north a distance of 200 feet to a point; thence in a westerly direction and in a straight line a distance of 380 feet to a point on the present corporate limit of the City of Prestonsburg, Kentucky."

Sec. 2. All ordinances or parts of ordinances in conflict herewith are hereby repealed.

This ordinance does not attempt nor is it intended, to annex or incorporate any part of the present City of Prestonsburg, Kentucky, into the City of Prestonsburg, Kentucky.

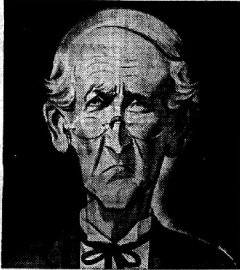
