ORDINANCE
 At a regular meeting of the General Council of the City of Prestonsburg, Kentucky, held at the City Hall on February 18, 1946, the following ordinance was passed and enacted:
 An Ordinance providing for the annexation of certain lands to the corporate limits of the City of Prestonsburg, Kentucky, as provided in Sec. 81-219, Kentucky Revised Statutes.
 WHEREAS, It appears that an extensive amount of business and residential buildings has been completed and is being completed in and on the lands adjoining the eastern corporate limit of the City of Prestonsburg, along U.S. 29, and
 WHEREAS, Several owners of said properties have indicated their desire that said lands or portions be annexed to and made a part of the City of Prestonsburg, and
 WHEREAS, It is the opinion of the General Council of the City of Prestonsburg that said lands or portions should be made a part of, and incorporated within, the City of Prestonsburg.
 The motion of Glabe Dingman, first seconded by Frank Lewis, the following ordinance was introduced, to-wit:
BE IT ORDAINED BY THE GENERAL COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF PRESTONSBURG, KY.:
 Sec. 1. That the following described tracts or parcels of land situate in Floyd county, Kentucky, on the waters of the Big Sandy river, on the adjoining lands of the City of Prestonsburg, Kentucky, be and the same are hereby annexed to, incorporated within, and made a part of the City of Prestonsburg, Kentucky. Said tracts or parcels of land are more particularly bounded and described as follows:
BEGINNING at a point on the eastern corporate limit of the City of Prestonsburg, at the low water mark on the western side of the southern end of Lot No. 1 of Block No. 1, of Richmond Sub-Division No. 1 and running in an easterly direction with the meanders of the Big Sandy river in an easterly direction with the low water mark of said river, a distance of 380 feet to a point; thence from said point and in a straight line a distance of 500 feet to a point; thence in a westerly direction and in a straight line a distance of 380 feet to a point on the present corporate limit of said city; thence in a southerly direction and along the low water mark of said river, a distance of 1025 feet, crossing U.S. 29, to THE POINT OF BEGINNING.
 This ordinance does not attempt or it is intended, to annex or incorporate any part of the present corporate limits of the City of Prestonsburg, Kentucky, now known as U.S. 29, which said right-of-way passes through the lands hereinafter described and incorporated into the City of Prestonsburg, Kentucky. All ordinances or parts of ordinances in conflict herewith are hereby repealed.
 This ordinance shall become and be in full force and effect after its passage by the General Council of the City of Prestonsburg and its publication as is required by law.

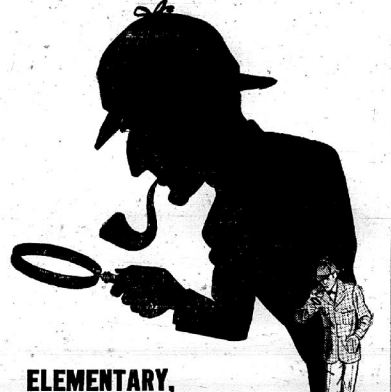

"I don't blame the people of Boaco or any other community for wanting a better school," Superintendent Hall said. "It shows a good spirit of citizenship to demand better schools." While these larger projects were being needed and to advertise for the Board authorized the Superintendent to purchase sites where needed and to advertise for bids on construction of 10 small frame school buildings. One of these, on Buckeye Fork of Middle Creek, is school, to be built at Lancer, supplanting the old school at Eureka, near here. One room is to be added to the Tinker Fork school. The seven others, all one-room buildings are at Brush Creek, Spawing Camp, Cold Spring, Lick Fork, Buck's Branch, Ivy Creek and Clear Creek. It is expected that these will be built since the foundations can be built of rough lumber and no steel or brick will be used. Because of a six-week break in the teaching schedule at Wayland, caused by a winter-time breakdown of the heating system, the Board has asked the State Department of Education to declare an emergency there and permit six-days-a-week school to recover lost time.

The payroll has during this time been troubled. Outlining in broad terms the conservation movement through Kentucky, in addition to Mr. Wallace, were E. Adams, superintendent of the League of Kentucky Sportsmen; Roscoe Davis, League vice-president of the Seventh district; Dr. O. W. Thompson, Pikeville, Seventh district commissioner, Division of Game and Fish. The music program was enhanced by piano, saxophone and clarinet numbers by the versatile "Jimmy" Gilpin.

The program of the Floyd County Club was outlined to the sportmen by J. B. Clarke, Prestonsburg, a charter member of the club. E. R. Burke, Prestonsburg, Seventh district supervisor, Division of Game and Fish, presided as toastmaster. Division office personnel included Dud Johnson, editor of "Happy Hunting Grounds," Joe Slocum, advertising manager of the magazine, and Muriel Clarke, superintendent of fish hatcheries.

An official of the Floyd County Fish and Game Club said, following last Thursday's banquet, that the club is far short of its membership goal of 2,000 set for 1946. "In fact, according to reports received to date, we actually have only 676 members."

This membership lies mainly, however, in Prestonsburg, Maytown and Allen, with a few at Ashland, and the total may be substantially increased when the membership drives at David Ward, Hester, Garrett and all Left Beaver towns, hitherto unreported, are made.

"Importance of a large membership cannot be too strongly stressed," the club's spokesman said. "We have planned a rather ambitious program, one which should mean much to sportmen and all others interested in conservation, without a strong club the work will fail."

Items of the program are:

1. A fish pond at Middle on Right Beaver Creek.

2. Construction of quail brooders and their maintenance and operation.

3. A general program of re-stocking streams and fields with fish and game and the work of protecting wildlife.

It was explained that the Division of Game and Fish does not cost Kentucky one cent, that funds spent in this work are derived solely from the sale of hunting and fishing licenses, and that work of local clubs such as the Floyd county organization is furnished by hunters and fishermen here at home, with division aid.

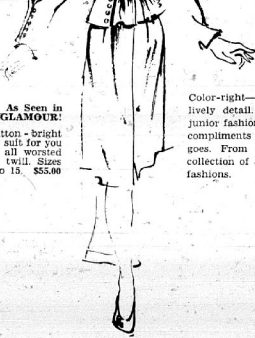
