OHIOAN KILLS WRIGHT, WIFE AND ROBINSON

Land Dispute Ends In Tragedy Sunday Near Ironton, Ohio

An orgy of murder on an Ohio farm last Sunday afternoon saw three former Floyd county residents shot to death.

The dead are: John Wright, 57, a native of the Pitts Ford section of Middle Creek; his wife, Mrs. Parrot (Mary) Wright, 48, and 60-year-old William "Bill Duck" Robinson, formerly of Martin.

Held without bond on their first degree murder charges is Chester Arthur Duncan, 45, neighbor of the Wrights, who resided on Route 1, Ironton, Ohio.

Cause of the triple slaying, it was reported, was a matter typical of many the Kentucky deed of violence—a dispute over a property line. A month ago, Duncan and Wright disagreed over the line between their farms, with Sunday afternoon's shooting ending the tragic aftermath.

According to reports received here, all three former Floyd countians were slain by a single bullet from Duncan's shotgun. After the slaying, the Wright home was destroyed by fire but Duncan denied knowledge of the blaze.

Walter Eric Wynne, who was with the slaying, told police that he saw Wright in a field looking for a cow and that he shot him. He said he did not know who killed his wife. He claimed Wright would shoot him if he returned to the yard of his own home.

The slayings took place between 3 and 4 o'clock Sunday afternoon near a darkened home Sunday night.

THE EDITOR'S COLUMN
From time to time, it will be our policy to have various members of the Swift & Company organization write this column. So, let me introduce to you this month's guest editor, F. G. (Tom) Chase, one of my associates in the Agricultural Research Department.

There's an old story about a downstate cattle feeder who brought a load of steers to Chicago to be sold. He turned them over to a local stockman, then wandered around the city for whatever you can get. There's not enough people in the world to eat all the cattle I've seen here! The salesman managed to catch him down and sent him downtown to see the city. He landed in the heart of Chicago, took one look at the city, and dashed into a drugstore to phone his salesman. Hold those steers of mine for the highest price. There's not enough meat in the world to feed all these people!
This old story makes a good point. All of you know the price we can pay for your livestock is governed by what we can get for the meat and by-products. Also you know that what we can get for the meat and by-products is greatly affected by the supply of livestock and the demand for meats. The ever-present problem among producers and meat packers is the matching of the supply with the demand, whenever the supply and demand may be. The job of nation-wide meat packers is to balance the supply of meat with the demand by efficient distribution of the meat to the places where people want to buy it.

ROUND WORMS, one of the greatest hog enemies, can be controlled. The following practices are used by successful hog raisers:
1. Thoroughly clean, then scrub the farrowing pens with boiling lye water (1 pound of lye to 10 gallons of water).
2. Wash the sow's sides and udder with warm soapsuds before putting her in the farrowing pen.
3. Keep pigs out of old hog lots.
4. Haul sows and pigs to pasture when ready. Do not drive them over contaminated ground.

LEGUME-GRASS MIXTURES PROVE WORTHY

By Dr. G. MOTT, Purdue University
Preliminary results of tests at Purdue University showed that legume-grass pasture mixtures produce more beef per acre than bluegrass alone. A mixture of birdsfoot trefoil-bluegrass proved the most efficient tried so far.
The best bluegrass pastures averaged 196 pounds of beef per acre during the period 1941-44, the poorest of legume-grass mixtures produced 185 pounds during the drought year of 1944, while birdsfoot trefoil-bluegrass produced 214 pounds. Birdsfoot trefoil put gains on cattle all through the grazing season, from May 11 to September 14, equalling early season gains made on other mixtures, and continued making gains while cattle on other mixtures lost weight during August and September. Compared to 214 pounds of gain for cattle on birdsfoot trefoil, alfalfa-timothy produced 203 pounds, alfalfa-bromegrass 194 pounds, and Ladino clover-bromegrass 185 pounds of beef per acre during the first grazing season.
Tests also indicated that rotation grazing is necessary to keep cattle from killing alfalfa by selective grazing. With rotation grazing, good stands of alfalfa persisted during the two years they were grazed.

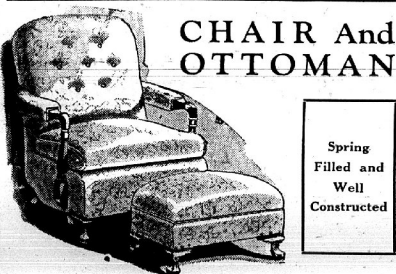

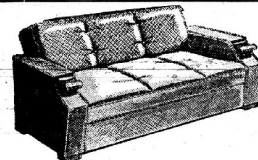

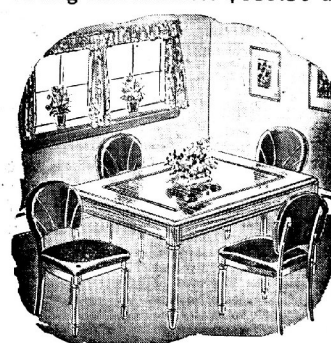

Good News!—New Sugar Stamp in Effect, Others Not Too Far in Distance

Spare stamp No. 9 in Ration Book for the single-sheet sugar stamp will be good through Oct. 31, George H. Goodman, Kentucky OPA district director, said Monday.

It is expected that a second home-canning sugar stamp will be valid through late June or July, but the total amount for home canning won't exceed 10 pounds per person at the actual home canning as there is no additional sugar stamp still in circulation from the stamps being valid.

The sugar supply is slight at this time, Goodman said.

Stamp No. 39, for regular use, is good now and the next regular sugar stamp becomes good May 1.

Many people continue to come to the local Price Control Board for additional sugar. The local Price Control Board does not issue sugar stamps. The regular sugar ration books are issued only by the district office in Louisville.

Merchants are advised to check stamps carefully for correct number. They should not accept mutilated stamps or stamps that have not yet been validated, Goodman said.

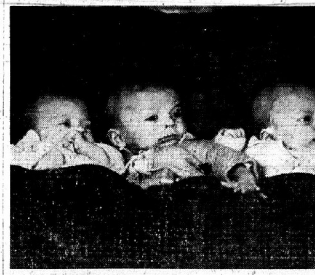
Higher Wages, Shorter Hours Are Mentioned By UMW A Chief
