The following letter to Roy Allen, Prestonsburg, from Wayne Shepley, Rochester, N. Y., not only tells how Chester Allen, brother of Roy, met death in the Arnold tank but also provides an interesting insight into the thoughts of a soldier during action:

"Your letter has affected me deeply. What I worry about probably is that you and your family will not be able to make the whole thing seem real. I assure you, this answer is very important to me. It's a duty to a good friend and a good soldier."

"We had been living in holes, unclean, unshowered, on the Anzio beachhead for I don't know how many weeks. Time just merges into one big lump on the battlefield. One night the order came down to pack our gear. We knew that was it. Our turn had come where they were going to break the ring around the beachhead and our tanks would be the first to roll toward the enemy."

"At dawn, we went on the Anzio through our own barbed wire. Allen was driving the platoon leader's tank. I was the next next to him operating the bow machine gun. Our tank being in the lead of the platoon, we were first to run into a mine field.

"The Germans had hit our mine field one of our tanks in half. Not much of an explosion, but being disabled the crew had to abandon the tank. Luck with us, the whole front was safely back through heavy artillery fire."

"Before midnight, the same day, maintenance had had to repair the tank and we were back in the fight."

"For three days we jockeyed, cleaned out, advanced. You see, Roy, the storm would be incoming if it didn't include these three days. Whatever we took our toll of Germans, the enemy comes out of this war. The one thought that gives me satisfaction, 'We took our toll.'"

"The third day, we had driven the Germans back to a position where we were within sight of Rome. For the afternoon our platoon was lined up for our next jump. We got the order to 'move out.' The crew was still the same: Lt. Knack in command, Redman, gunner. Redman, a quiet leader, Allen driver, myself on the bow machine gun."

"We moved toward the Germans with all of our guns firing, ran into a lot of German infantry, took care of our share. Then we got hit by an anti-tank gun and our tank just blew up from the inside. I probably wouldn't have gotten out of the tank if the exploding ammunition hadn't blown me out. No one else was lucky. The tank just blew itself to pieces."

"Lucky? I spent the next year in the hands of the Germans. They had a lot of bandages and shrapnel wounds about the head, arms and legs, and medical care, but not much consolation, I know, but at least Allen was spared that."

"You know, Roy, on the battlefield there is no room for sentiment, just cold facts."

"I'd like to record a cold fact—Chester was a real combat soldier."

"Real combat soldier" seems like just words, but among fighting men it's the highest praise you can receive. It means he's been through it and again, nerves so tight you wonder how he keeps them from snapping. But you keep doing your job, you keep going over the next hill and you die on every hill. If you do get hit, that's the way one, the hard death are the ones in the imagination. You go on and on without sleep, you're nervous and you sweat. You can't see any end to it, but you keep going. You don't crack up because there's something inside you that makes you that way. Quiet, nerve, whatever you want to call it, Chester had it to the limit. I know. It was with him that fatal day near the Anzio beachhead. We brewed many a cup of coffee together and went over a lot of those hills together. He was a real combat soldier."

Lackey Man Expires While Being Examined While undergoing examination in the office of Dr. R. P. Wilcox at Martin, Ky., Wednesday, March 14, 1946, at the age of 73 years, retired Lackey died of heart disease.

Mr. Lackey was a native of Perry county, was a member of the Regular Baptist Church and had many friends in the Richwood Creek section of the county. He is survived by three sons, Robert Lee and Henry T. Walls, both of Lackey, and Orville of North Midway, W. Va., and one daughter, Mrs. Myrtle Combs, Lackey; also by one brother, George Walls, and one sister, Mrs. Lewis Angles, Denver, Colorado.

The funeral was conducted Sunday at Jeff. Perry county where burial was made under direction of the Ryan Funeral Home.

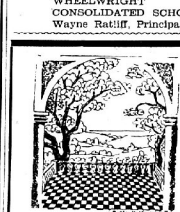

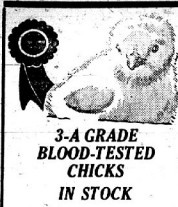

ments of the remaining portions of the reservoir area will generally not be required to build their houses before the latter part of the fall of 1947, thus permitting continued use of lands and orderly conduct of business in these areas until that time.

"Prior to completion of the dam the government will acquire the necessary lands and flowage easements for operation of the reservoir. Before acquiring these lands the government will have them appraised by competent local and government appraisers and will negotiate with the owners to assure that a fair price is paid for the necessary rights required. Due consideration will be given to severance damages and available access facilities to all portions of land not acquired by the government."

The dam will be located 5.4 miles above the mouth of Johns Creek, and about five miles north-east of Prestonsburg. It will be of earth-fill type of construction and have a height of about 105 feet and a crest length of about 800 feet. Construction features of the dam and reservoir are controlled by outlet works discharging through a tunnel in the left abutment, an uncontrolled spillway excavated in the left abutment, a rolled-dike earth roller about 350 feet long and 40 feet high closing a low gap in the reservoir perimeter. The reservoir will control a drainage area of 207 square miles and provide a gross storage of 88,000 acre-feet at spillway crest elevation. Of this amount, 7,000 acre-feet will be allocated to flood control, and 11,000 acre-feet will be reserved for conservation purposes. The conservation pool will be a permanent one, extending 11 miles up Johns Creek and having a surface area of 860 acres. At maximum flood-control pool or spillway-crest elevation, the pool will extend approximately 3.10 miles. During flood periods, the flood-control pool of the reservoir will be operated to discharge the maximum amount of water as limited by bank-full stages downstream. Under this plan of operation, the reservoir would not have been completely filled to spillway level by any flood of local record and would be filled only in the event of occurrence of a more severe flood condition than is known to have occurred in the past.

The conservation pool was incorporated in the project in accordance with the Flood Control Act under which the project was authorized. The Act required, among other things, that consideration be given to incorporating in the project provisions for pollution abatement and for increasing low flows for navigation in the streams below it as it is desirable to provide water during low water periods for pollution abatement, navigation, and industrial and municipal water-supply purposes along the Big Sandy and Ohio rivers, and as the land in the low portion of the reservoir, or surrounding pool area, would be so frequently flooded by the storage of floodwaters that its utility for general agricultural or other purposes would be destroyed and the land of necessity would be acquired by the government in fee. A pool will be provided for conservation purposes. Such provisions will have little, if any, effect on the flood-control features of the project. Naturally, with the conservation pool in excess water, proper precaution against fire setting back on the dam is necessary.
