**WATCH YOUNG FORD!**  
Motor Company Head Thinks First of Men—Then of Machines  
When Henry Ford II was chosen "Outstanding Young Man of the Year" by the national organization of the Junior Chambers of Commerce, many people, some of them high in industry, wondered why. Yet, those in the know realized that it was because young Ford thinks first of men and then of machines.  
For several years before the war brought an end to automobile production for civilians, the Ford Motor Company had lost its place in the industry. Its one-time sales of more than 60 per cent of the industry's production in 1929 had fallen to less than 10 per cent by 1934. The fault was largely due to Ford's insistence on the May issue of MARCH OF PROGRESS Magazine for the development of the Ford organization to develop a well-rounded interest organization. Practically all of the decisions were left to the judgment of one man, the elder Henry Ford, who carried little or no authority, and made moves regarding it as "unbusinesslike" and almost an evil. Today, with young Ford at the helm, there is organization in the Ford Company, specifically assigned responsibility properly delegated authority and as good employees as can be had. The Ford dealers are well-packed Detroit. Henry II, knowing his grandfather's love of "tricks," saw to it that Ford produced the first postwar car. In the advertising his grandfather dreamed, he subtly accentuated the "Famous Ford" slogan, excellent evidence of his use of native tact and diplomacy in departing from his grandfather's dream.  
Behind all this is young Henry Ford's belief in people. He the first of industry to plead for respect attention to the "human element" so long subordinate in big business and an element in the mounting discontent of corporate employees. In an address to the Society of Automotive Engineers, he stated: "Mass production is achieved by both machines and men and while we have gone a long way toward perfection of our mechanical operation, we have not successfully written into our equations what we consider the human factor, the human element... try to take into account the human factor, for by so doing we can make much progress toward lower costs in the next few years as we have made during the past 25 years in the development of mass production."  
Henry's belief in men was further exemplified in the fact that he was visiting Ford dealers, and asking them to "help him to help them." He has extensive plans for reaching his employees, his dealers and his customers through the printed word, in publications designed to promote social responsibility and understanding of each other's problems, objectives and interests.  
In his strong emphasis on the human element, Henry II is not only thinking of the worker of today, he has thought, too, of the worker of tomorrow and proved it when he said: "This is the greatest time in our country's history for young men and women to be coming of age."  
In order to satisfy the great pent-up demand for things that add to our comfort of living, many products will have to be produced that will not be just enough to return to our old ways though we will want to preserve all that is best in them. There are problems of organization and production, problems of research and labor relations and distribution that call for the best talents and it will be in solving these present-day problems that industry offers great opportunities to young Americans in the next few years.  
When a young man exhibits this maturity of thought and ability to act at the comparatively tender age of 28, it is easy to understand why the national organization of the Junior Chambers of Commerce voted him "Outstanding Young Man of the Year." (Paid advertisement)

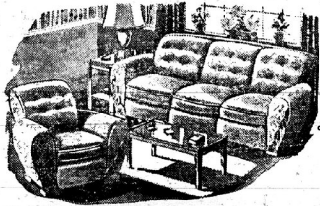

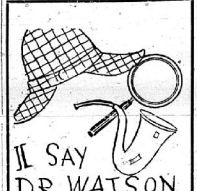

**Crop, Feed Loans Offered Farmers By Farm Credit**

Van H. Renuau, field supervisor of the emergency crop and feed loan division of the Farm Credit Administration, said today that crop and feed loans are available to farmers who are unable to secure credit from banks, P.C.A. or other lending agencies on reasonable terms and sufficient to meet their production needs.

Crop loans may be made for the actual production costs of such crops as corn, soybeans, oats, cotton, hay, fruits, potatoes, tomatoes, beans, and other truck crops grown for market. The money may be used for fertilizer, fuel or oil for tractors, spray material, minor repairs and painting and harvesting expenses.

Feed loans are made for the purchase of such feeds as are usually fed to commercial stock such as hogs, beef cattle, breeding stock or livestock, the product of which will be sold, such as dairy cattle, sheep being maintained for the sale of wool or lambs, or for the production of feeds such as hay, oats, corn, ensilage or other popular feed crops.

Poultry loans may be secured by farmers who have facilities, such as houses, brooder houses, watering and feeding equipment sufficient to care for the poultry. The money may be used for the purchase of feed, medicine, feeding young chicks or turkeys being grown for the market, or the purchase of feed and incidentals supplies for a flock kept for the production of eggs.

Security for loans is a first mortgage on all crops to be grown or stock and poultry to be fed. Crop, feed, or poultry loans become due and payable on the first of the crops, livestock, poultry or stock upon Oct. 31, 1946, which is the date of the first interest on all ever comes first. Interest rate on all is 4 percent, and is deducted in advance to Oct. 31, 1946.
