FISCAL COURT, KY. ROADDEPT. TO PLAN WORK

**Meeting Stated Friday; Last Year's Program For County Finished**  
Work with under the rural highway program planned for Floyd County was set in motion in January, 1945 by the fiscal court with highway department officials present. The meeting of the fiscal court will be held in the county building on Friday, April 27, at 10 o'clock a. m. The program for the year just closed was reviewed and the program for the year to come was outlined.

Work finished a few days ago under the 1945 program saw the application of approximately 2,000 tons of crushed limestone to a dozen Floyd county roads. These roads are Little Mud, Salt Lick, Abbott, Middle Creek (West Prestonburg) to Floyd-MacIntosh line and to Davy, Cow Creek-Buffalo, Cliff-Auxier, and Dick Lick roads. The program also included the application of crushed limestone to a dozen roads in the county.

County Judge Davidson said this year the road department is committed to the policy of securing approximately 25 per cent of its rural road fund to the construction of new roads.

Striking employees of the Ryan Construction Company at the Dewey dam returned to work last Friday morning after a strike which had lasted for several days. The employees and the company reached an agreement on Friday.

The unskilled labor group on the project was organized and settled by the Ryan Construction Company. The original wage was \$1.50 an hour for unskilled labor. The new wage is \$1.75 an hour for unskilled labor.

MINERS JOIN BUS DRIVERS IN FLOYD-CO.

**Sparks Bus Strike Marked by Tension; Wide Area Affected**  
Peace transportation in a 10-county area of more than 3,000 square miles remained paralyzed this week as negotiations to settle the 10-day-old strike of Kentucky-Virginia Stages employees and disputes concerning labor in other bus company operations over the section ended Tuesday in a complete breakdown.

W. B. McConnell, Cincinnati, federal labor conciliator, returned to Cincinnati Wednesday following ineffectual talks with operators and union representatives.

With the Sparks Brothers bus strike, which went into effect Saturday midnight, not a bus line was operating in Floyd county. The Southwestern Greyhound line continued to operate into Pikeville from Lexington and into Pikeville the Logan-Williamson Spas Company is still running.

Peace warrants for 11 Kentucky bus drivers, including those sworn out Wednesday by Oakley Sparks at Pikeville, were issued by County Judge Davidson said, to swear to a specific route.

The crowd was dispersed by the arrival of approximately 25 persons watching.





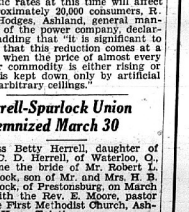

(Continued From Page One) to Prestonsburg in a bus Sunday morning. Company officials claim that strikers had made threats were emphatically denied by Wallen and Allen. Miles is both Seavers edited the force of their numbers to the strikers' cause. McKelvin Sparks, official of the Sparks Brothers company, said Tuesday his drivers did not ask for any wage adjustments. If they had come to me and told me they were organizing and wanted a raise, I would have given them 10 per cent an hour raise, he told THE TIMES. Drivers said Sparks had refused to discuss terms with them. Business here and in other towns of the section is, as a result of the strike, coupled with the main shut-down, suffering its worst days since the depression. Organization of drivers on the Sparks line was effected to the extent that a majority had joined the union before the strike deadline Saturday night. Emphasis of the company was said this week. "We are all organized, all want the same wage increase, and we are all closed shop," they declared. One of the striking drivers said his gross pay for a 15-day period was a gross of \$63.58. He estimated that he may be received per month, including the \$25 bond given each employee by the company quarterly, a \$25 cash bonus at Christmas and a \$5,000 life insurance policy, would not amount to more than \$140 per month. He added that the raise sought by the Kentucky-Virginia Stages drivers was from \$6 to \$7.50 a day, depending upon the length of time before the strike. The workers ask a 30 per cent raise. Prevent Howard F. Dixon, of the C.I.O. Transport Workers union, asserted in a statement, "No further talks are scheduled. Mr. Oakley Sparks, president of the line, has maintained an unfair and arbitrary position. He simply refuses to bargain in good faith." Mayor W. B. Stone, of Pikeville, did not "guarantee" any change for a settlement of the dispute. Dixon asserted in his statement that Oakley Sparks maintained his line could not afford any wage increase. "Yes, he recently purchased new buses costing \$55,000 and paid cash," Dixon continued. The Scott-Nichols Line, operating from Williamsburg, Va. to Pikeville, also is strike-bound. Other bus companies affected by the walk-out are the Cooley Bus Line, and the Paintsville Bus Company. The C.I.O. Transport Workers Local 113, claiming the length of the other companies are on strike, as well as the Kentucky-Virginia Stages employees. However, company officials said they had their drivers of the job to prevent trouble. President Oakley Sparks, of the Sparks Brothers Line, declared that his drivers were not organized when the work stoppage occurred.
