shooting. Prosecuting witnesses said earlier that all the Compton brothers were armed when they arrived at the Parsons home on the night of April 2 after an altercation in which Collins sustained a head laceration.

Charlie Compton said that when he, Basil and Columbus Collins arrived at the Parsons home, Homer Parsons was treating Collins' wound, ordered him to get back into his car and that he obeyed. He said he saw Basil make a move at Parsons, who went into the house and returned with a shotgun.

Basil testified that Parsons fired one shot from the gun and when he "looked like all of us were going to get killed" he and Columbus ran across the yard to take cover behind the house, a pistol in each hand, "blasting away at us."

Basil Compton said he then fired three shots at Parsons, but did not know at the time that Mrs. Parsons was killed.

Collins testified that he heard Parsons fire two shots one of which wounded him a shotgun and the other a revolver.

Columbus Compton said when the shooting began he ran up the highway.

Following discharge of the jury, Judge Hill admitted Charlie Compton to \$10,000 bail and Basil Compton to \$10,000 bail and set the trial. Columbus Compton and Collins executed bond, a few days after the shooting.

Another trial of the past week was that which ended in a \$50 fine for Dewey Hill, accused of assault and battery with an automobile.

and cleaned more often, especially on the sides of the courthouse where the health department has been charged in this county, alleged that Thelma Newsome "did unlawfully, wilfully, feloniously carnally know a male, to-wit, Charles Mitchell, over the age of 12 years and under the age of 16, the defendant, being a female over the age of 21."

Young Mitchell's statement filed with the indictment said he is 16. The accused woman's bond was placed at \$2,000.

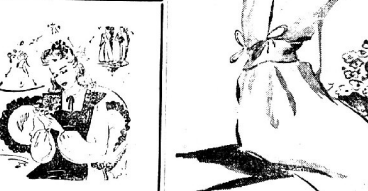
