not state the number of rail employees made idle since beginning of the coal strike April 1 nor did he say how many more would be unemployed as a result of passenger service suspension.

valley trains to be discontinued Friday are Nos. 64 and 65, operating between Shelby and Jenkins.

C. & O. Executive Vice-President A. T. Lowmaster, of Cincinnati, said the first passenger train curtailment will go into effect Friday and the second on May 15, and so on.

Effective at once we are temporarily abandoning our time freight schedules and will move what freight business is moving with-

less number of engines at a slower speed.

Mr. Lowmaster said measures previously taken have resulted in curtailment of service and reduction in employment.

"As of this date," he continued, "10,266 employees have been cut off. On April 1, our engines were in service except three and curtailment of service since that date have taken 356 of our engines out of service on the system.

In order to conserve our rapidly dwindling coal supply we are forced to make further curtailments.

Governmental orders which have for their purpose the saving of fuel require that on May 10 our passenger mileage be reduced 25 per cent below what it was on April 1, 1946.

We are endeavoring to comply with this order so as to interfere with the public needs as little as possible.

The governmental orders also require that on May 15 our passenger engine mileage be reduced 30 per cent below what was on April 1.

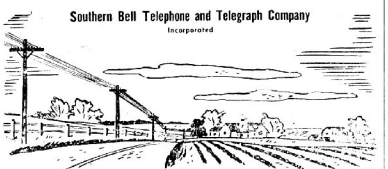

"We must find other means to dispose of our coal and it can go only to an expanding middle west," Tierney said.

M. L. Garvey, representing the Pocahtonia Operators Association, also expressed the opinion the proposed bill would affect the railroad adversely. He said the railroads' claim that their service is adequate and abundant is contradicted by the fact that producing coal companies in the district have been compelled to invest large sums of money to provide ocean carriage to New England and lake carriage into the Northwest.

John Kerper, secretary of the Dubuque (Iowa) Chamber of Commerce, said if the upper Mississippi section is to attract many new industries which require high volatile by-product coal they must obtain such coal at a lower price through lower transportation costs.

Other proponents included the Rev. Garfield Stump, president of the Stone, Ky., local of the United Mine Workers, who said the federal government was not doing enough for relief in the area hard-hit by unemployment to have built the proposed locks; E. L. Mullins, president of Henry Clay D.M.W. union, Heller, Ky.; William Allen, of the Mississippi Valley Association; Ernest M. Merrill, vice-president of the Ohio Valley Improvement Association; Weston B. Grimes, of Cargill Grain Company, of Minnesota.

Representative A. J. May, Prestonsburg sponsor of the project, attended the hearing and appeared in rebuttal upon completion of opposition testimony.

Col. Peter Fanning, army engineer told the committee that much of the coal lying between the Tug and Letcher forks is not mined because railroads are located on the far side of the streams and the expense would be great to convey the coal across.

Brooks Lawson, Williamson, W. Va., said the proposed \$82,000,000 Big Sandy waterway project is a huge project and the nation as a whole can not afford.

"It is an extremely fantastic and a vainly conceived project," Lawson said. "We owe it to our children, ourselves and the nation as a whole to set an example of economy and sound business."

Representative Daughton (D. Va.) told the committee that much of the project will not be by the federal government but by a private company.

"The Norfolk & Western Railroad planned the area," Daughton said. "There wouldn't have been any coal fields ever developed if there had not been for the N & W."

Representative Bailey (D. W. Va.) said he was not convinced the project is insolvent, unjust and economically justified, and Representative Vorys (R. Ohio) said he was opposed to the project because it would not be generally economically justified and would cause injury to his district.

In addition to the share his constituents would have to expend in taxes to pay for construction.
