Soldier Who Re-Enlisted From Prestonsburg Gets Bronze Star for Heroism

Pvt. Damon Stammer, son of Frank Stammer, Prestonsburg blind man, has received the Bronze Star for heroism in action after having re-enlisted for army service. His father said this week. Young Stammer is now at Camp Campbell, Kentucky.

Major General Albert E. Brown's citation to a series of revival meetings of heroic action on the part of the Prestonsburg soldier is that he joined France on Oct. 15, 1944 when he led a patrol bent on destruction of an enemy public address system which was harassing American troops. "Pvt. Stammer," the citation reads, "led his men in a daring maneuver which placed them in a position from which they concentrated effective fire on the installation. After succeeding in accomplishing the mission, Pvt. Stammer rendered covering fire for his patrol's withdrawal to safety and then returned to his unit, under retaliatory enemy mortar fire."
