Labor Forces Gather To Clear Union Tangle

SPARKS SAYS 17 EMPLOYES IN NEW UNION

Plan Bus Operation; Shots from Hillside Hit Conley Line Bus

Threat of a jurisdictional dispute between the Transport Workers Union, A. F. of L., and the United Construction Workers, A. F. of L., was defused after a meeting of the two unions and the United States Workers of America, endorsing the stand of the Transport Workers Union, and members and concerning the attack on the Conley Brothers and Conley bus lines.

Sparks and Conley misrepresented to the Transport Workers Union representative of the United Construction Workers, who received membership of several employes. They claimed a majority of the workers were not members of the CIO and were not on strike. This was immediately refuted by several union stickers which were being demanded that they remove them from their buses.

He added that United Construction Workers did not intend either local attempt to be organized. He said that the Transport Workers Union, Guy Boone, president, and Frank Sparks, recording secretary of Local Union 346, advised by the Rev. Charles Bailey, president local union 346, at 11:00 a. m. 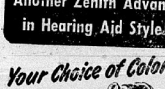

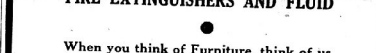



This is to notify the people of Prestonsburg that the ordinance providing a fine or jail sentence, or both, for burning trash or any kind of refuse within the corporate limits of Prestonsburg will be strictly enforced.

Legality of the Ordinance has been carefully checked and the Police Department has been instructed to enforce it to the letter, without favor to any individual or firm.

The Council has been amazed at the reports of opposition from certain citizens to this movement to clean up and keep cleaned up this town. Many have not only refused to pay the small sum of 50 cents a month for garbage collection service but have also threatened to defy the law by burning trash on their property.

We would remind every citizen of the numerous and costly fires caused by the burning of trash in Prestonsburg. The cost of each run by the fire department to such a fire is heavy and, as all know, is paid by us all, the taxpayers.

The Council in taking this step is not seeking to work a hardship on any person. But the plan of garbage collection and disposal was worked out at considerable time and effort, as best the Council could, and it intends to give this plan a thorough and fair trial.

The Woman's Club of Prestonsburg has, on several occasions, appeared before the City Council, asking that the town be cleaned up and made more beautiful. This ordinance and the work being undertaken seek to do exactly that. Now, the Council asks that the Woman's Club and every other local civic and social group extend their co-operation. Again, we remind the people of Prestonsburg - This is the final notice to be given in this matter. We ask your co-operation.
