The vote solemnly promised that legislation of liquor would bring financial and social benefits to the nation. Crime would be greatly increased if not eliminated altogether. A few years ago the danger of repeal for public office was asked how he stood on prohibition and his answer was that he was repeal. He gave two reasons for being for repeal. The elimination of crime and the promotion of greater temperance. But every American of average intelligence knows that repeal has done just the opposite.

1-The highest rate of juvenile delinquency in our history.

2-The greatest period of crime in the history of the nation.

3-Veneral diseases so frightful that the prevalence of them is a matter of public health and medical authorities refer to one of them as the "Public Health Problem No. 1."

4-Jails, penitentiaries and asylums overflowing with ever before.

5-Traffic fatalities more terrible than any other species of American deaths in battle.

6-The highest tax rate on record, which we were told that the revenue from the sale of beer and liquor would decrease our taxes.

7-The largest public debt in the nation's history.

8-Sickening spectacles of corruption in government.

9-The economic postwar prospect of public morality than ever before.

10-437,000 liquor outlets and 40,000,000 drinkers.

If the repeal ever kept one promise they made, I would like to know what it was.

As a nation we drink each year in alcoholic beverages five times what we are willing to give people who were our Allies in the war, whose blood we were on the verge of starvation. Our drink bill for one year is \$7,000,000,000.

We are asked to cut down on our consumption of bread which allows the business of grain to make into beer and liquor.

Is there anything we can do? Yes, we can wage a holy war against this enemy of mankind.

There are those who tell us that conditions were worse under prohibition. They seem to forget that some of us were here during prohibition and we know better.

Occasionally I hear someone say that the liquor situation in Floyd county was worse during prohibition than now. Who believes it could have ever been worse than it is now?

I lived in three dry counties before coming to Floyd county and I have seen more drunkennes, more automobile wrecks and deaths as a result of drinking in nine months in this county than I saw in all the time I was in history.

We can make our county a better place by the re-education of liquor.

We can do away with much of the crime we are having, and make our highways free of the danger of drunken drivers if we will put liquor out.

Under God we can do it. Let's pray about it and if we really pray we will work and vote against it.

All bids must be submitted to the County Judge on or before 10 a.m. June 29, 1946. The fiscal court reserves the right to reject any and all bids.

The conditions and stipulations of the franchise offered for sale by the fiscal court are as follows:

(1) The franchise shall extend and cover that area commonly known as Dwaile, Ky., and the grantee shall be required to furnish natural gas to every applicant living in said area upon their application therefor.

(2) The grantee shall be required to construct, lay, maintain and operate pipe lines sufficient to distribute natural gas to every applicant in Dwaile and the costs for so doing must be borne exclusively by the grantee.

(3) The grantee shall, within 60 days after the purchase of the franchise, lay a main line of pipe from the most available source of supply of natural gas.

(4) The grantee shall furnish at this own expense gas meters, which shall be of a standard make. However, grantee if desired, may require of each consumer a meter deposit not to exceed ten (\$10.00) dollars provided interest is paid at the rate of six (6) per cent per annum.

(5) The maximum price at which the grantee of the franchise shall sell natural gas to consumers shall not exceed forty (40) cents per thousand cubic feet. The grantee may also make special contracts with consumers at rates based upon the amount of gas used, which special rates may be less than those charged to other consumers.

(6) The grantee shall take all reasonable precautions and measures necessary to furnish natural gas to the consumers in Dwaile during the period hereinafter authorized in this franchise.

(7) The grantee of this franchise shall enjoy the exclusive right to sell and distribute natural gas in the unincorporated town of Dwaile.

(8) The grantee is hereby authorized to use the public ways of the town of Dwaile for the purpose of laying and operating a system of mains and pipes.

(9) The franchise shall cover the period beginning July 1, 1946 and ending June 30, 1950.

(10) In the event the grantee violates any of the provisions hereinbefore stated, this franchise shall become immediately void.
