HALL TO QUIT SCHOOL POST ON JULY 15

Cousin To Succeed Him; New Tax Levy Of \$1.50 Approved

Town Hall announced Wednesday morning that he had resigned on the preceding day as Superintendent of Floyd County Schools, effective July 15, after almost 10 years as head of the county school system and that his cousin, Palmer L. Hall, had been named by the Floyd County Board of Education to succeed him.

Except for the wartime period when his wife, Mrs. Hollie B. Hall, was Superintendent, while he was in the navy, Hall has held the office since Sept. 9, 1936. Formal explanation of his reason for resigning is given in a statement published elsewhere in this edition of THE TIMES.

The new superintendent, who has been an assistant superintendent for several months, after receiving his army discharge, has been contacted with the school system for several years. At Tuesday's meeting of the Board of Education, Board member H. H. Wagoner, and brother of Town Hall, was chosen assistant superintendent at a salary of \$3,800 a year.

Preparation for increased cost of school operation and operation of all schools in the county for nine months of the year, a portion of which was submitted to the county board of education at a public hearing on July 2, at which a tax rate of \$1.50 per \$100 on all taxable property in the county for general school purposes was approved by the county board.

At Tuesday's meeting of the board of education, the \$2,000 increase in the tax rate was approved. The board also approved the \$1,000 school tax rate, which would result in a total school tax of \$2,000.

TO THE PEOPLE OF FLOYD COUNTY

I have decided to resign as Superintendent of Floyd county schools. The Board of Education elected me to this office through your help in 1936. Since then 10 years have gone, at the longest some have been slow. But the same sun glows, the same flowers bloom and the same brook sings of 10 years ago.

During my tenure of office I have done my best to make you a good and progressive superintendent. You, the people, are the ones to know how well I have done my job. Had not your interest, I could have done more in the way of new buildings and improved instruction for the children in one of my early campaigns I told the people we would meet the Blue Grass in four years. I believe you will agree with me that we have made more progress in Floyd county than any Blue Grass county has made. My predecessors handed me a huge debt in the form of warrants and bonds. These have been paid off until the total school debt now stands at \$24,000, none of which I made myself. All the new buildings we have built were paid for as they were built. The school buildings, grounds and furniture in the Floyd county school system is worth well over a million dollars. When I came in as superintendent it was worth a half-million dollars. We have bonds invested in government bonds drawing interest until the building program can be resumed. We have a cash balance of \$39,000, and all bills due are paid up to date. I make these statements without fear of contradiction.

The Board of Education has elected Mr. Palmer H. Hall as my successor in the superintendent's office. Palmer and I are cousins, and we had an agreement that I felt that I had had it long enough. Palmer Hall will make the people a good superintendent. He is honest, capable and progressive. He risked his life on a German battle front and I am back of the Board of Education. We ask all good citizens of Floyd county to support Palmer Hall as superintendent so that our schools may continue to progress rather than regress.

It is rumored around that a "would-be" big politician has used that he would like to have control of our school system so that he could use it to his own advantage in future county elections. But this does not create much alarm when we know that most good people want a school man at the head of the school system rather than a politician.

The people of Floyd county have been good to me. The Board members, past and present have given me the best and whole-hearted support. I appreciate all these efforts, and have tried to show same in efficient handling of Floyd county schools. The Floyd County Times, under Norman Allen's leadership, has given splendid co-operation in giving suitable space for school news that the people may be informed about the schools.

I hope that Palmer Hall will make you a better superintendent than I have made. Then I would know that Floyd county schools were continuing to go forward.

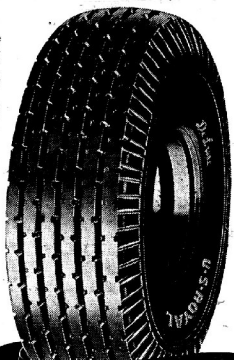
