MAY MEAD COMMITTEE SWAP NOTES

Congressman Asks Right of Counsel, Cross-Examination

The war investigating committee issued a subpoena Friday for Congressman May. Senator Mead expects the Congressman's appearance before the committee Tuesday.

After a sharp exchange of letters at the close of last week between Congressman May, Senator Mead and the investigating committee on the question of the Prestonsburg man's re-appearance before the committee to testify on the matter of the Lumber Company, both un-prob. developments as to Congressman May were reported.

SPARKS BROS. BUSES START, PACT SIGNED

Contract Signed Friday Results in Resumption Of Service to Eastern

Thursday afternoon at 1:30, buses of the Sparks line began operation. Kentucky-Virginia Stages resumed operation Thursday morning.

Eastern Kentucky's bus strike was both settled and unsettled this week, and the resumption of service to this section's 10-county population of some 400,000 residents appeared Wednesday to be a reality.

A contract between the three bus companies—Sparks Brothers, Conley and Kentucky-Virginia Stages—and the Transport Workers Union (TWU) was signed in Lexington last Friday afternoon and the buses appeared ready for rolling this week.

Monday morning, however, a dispute arose between Sparks Brothers Bus Company and the union as to seniority of employes.

Asked for a statement for his denunciation of the latest disagreement, Hays said that the matter of immediate issuance of union cards to drivers seeking membership stalled everything.

Workers' union men were interviewed about the matter and they said that the union had not been asked to sign the contract.

Shortages are holding him back. We in Southern Bell have been adding telephones at the rate of 350,000 a year. It's a tough situation, but we aren't giving up, any more than you have given up trying to get outter or shirts. We're doing the best we can with what we've got and hoping these disturbed conditions will end, so we can really go full speed ahead.
