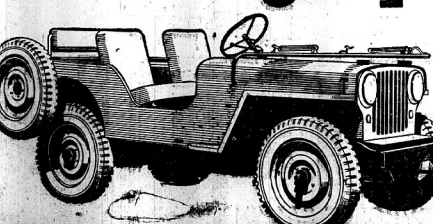

tion, the Red River Valley Association, the Red River Valley Association.

Out of 33 river improvement projects included in the Rivers and Harbors Bill the Big Sandy stood fifth in size and third in economic ratio, or benefits to the general public.

The other two projects that had a better rating were the Cumberland river with an economic ratio of 1.0 to 3.0 and the Illinois waterway and Calumet-Sag Canal with an economic ratio of 1.0 to 2.0.

The Big Sandy's ratio was 1.0 to 1.6. Another costing \$18,000,000 had an economic ratio of only 1.0 to 1.05.

The injustice perpetrated on the Big Sandy by its opponents is thus clearly indicated. The Big Sandy project is sound physically and economically and will be built.

The 25 pct. raise in freight rates requested by the railroads will be very helpful, if allowed, as they probably will be, since the benefits accruing to the Big Sandy project will increase in direct proportion to the freight rate increase.

"We can, of course, expect the continued and selfish opposition of our opponents but they cannot always deceive the people with their money and false misleading statements such as they have used in the past. The continued economic well-being of the people of our valley is the most important issue before the people at this time."

WET ALBI EXPLODED

By MRS. EDGAR R. MAY
Floyd County Dry Campaign

A pot alibi of the wets is dispelled by the following figures which show conditions will not become worse if this county goes dry. The wets are just bootlegging and will increase and result in more drunkenness than we now have.

In Salersville in the WET year of 1945 there were 781 arrests for drunkenness (the last wet year). The county voted dry on June 1, 1936 by a majority of 470 to 428. In the DRY year of 1945 there were only 144 arrests for drunkenness. BUT the wets say Floyd county will be worse off with moonshine than with legalized liquor. Drunkenness decreased in Salersville and Madison county by ratio, seven to ONE, UNDER LOGAL OPTION. Floyd will also gain when she goes DRY.

The records in Johnson county show 90 per cent of all imprisonments there were for DRUNKENNESS, not to mention crimes in which liquor is involved. Under prohibition, Johnson County Records, April 8, 1925 to Sept. 28, 1925, showed only 44 arrests, in the same period in 1945 BEFORE Johnson County went dry, there were 214 arrests in six months!

Records of Hardin county, Ky., show that public drunkenness has almost disappeared six months after the DRY'S went. Crime decreased greatly, and taxes were reduced in 1945, though the wets had warned that a dry victory meant higher taxes. Court cases in Menifee county have been reduced about 75 per cent since it voted DRY. Judge A. R. Tows in the Jackson Independent Jan. 9, 1945 reported Ashland jail empty, no one to try, no cases docketed for the police court for the first time in months. This was after they voted DRY.

Lowell Thomas declared over the radio that repeal has made the biggest bootleg empire in history. Congressman R. L. Doughton, of North Carolina, in his report of Congressional appropriations, says the nation is now a bootlegging nation.

Good citizens who consider voting wet or not at all should note that in April 1945 5,729,438 gallons of whiskey, made from FOODSTUFFS, were added to whiskey reserve stocks, while millions of people starve in Europe. 59,250,000 pounds of grain will produce fifty millions gallons of whiskey (and pack our kids and cause traffic accidents and deaths galore besides) or the same amount of grain will feed five million of the world's starving people in the post-war period between crops. Which do you vote for, Mr. Citizen?

ATTEND OUR DRY RALLIES. Help FLOYD go DRY!

Liquor causes many evils but we do not have to vote for it and thereby sanction them. That is what persons who vote wet to prevent increased bootlegging (they claim), do. Help FLOYD go DRY! Let's let work for a state law against bootlegging, with TEETH in it, similar to the one Kentucky now has against pistol-carrying!
