Arrested Tuesday afternoon by Deputy Sheriff Harold Conn, and State Patrolman T. J. Patterson, Lewis told County Attorney Burdick and County Judge Alex L. Davidson, "I'd rather have my brains shot out than be accused of that of killing his wife." The former minor-officer said he was in Prestonsburg when a fellow told me my wife said she was going up there to kill that girl and that he immediately followed in a taxi, stopping at Lancer outside the home of Pearl Harris where he talked with his wife and his mother, who had accompanied Lewis' wife to Prestonsburg in search of him. He added that he went into the kitchen of the Harris home to get a drink of water, that Miss Spears, Pearl and Frank Harris were in the kitchen with him when his wife entered. As he lifted a dipper of water to his mouth, he stated, his wife snatched his revolver from his hip and ran back through the house. He chased her, he said, and as she reached the door to the front porch the shot was fired.

Repeatedly avowing his sincerity, Lewis declared, "I'd rather had been me. Nobody else had anything to do with it. I'd have killed every one of them if they'd killed her."

Lewis said his wife had been inordinately jealous and had threatened to kill herself.

Differing in some details but more closely approximating Lewis' testimony than that of any of the others in the building at the time of the shooting was the story told by Frank Harris. He stated that he and Lewis were taking a drink of whiskey in the kitchen when Mrs. Lewis entered and asked her husband when he was going home. When Lewis told her, "Tomorrow," he added, she snatched the revolver and ran through the house, chased by her husband. He denied that Dorothy Spears was in the building at the time. "When I got out, Mack was picking his wife up," Harris testified.

Pearl Harris said that when he and Lewis arrived outside his home at Lancer Mrs. Lewis and Lewis' mother were there and that Mack Lewis and his wife talked while he sat in the taxi of Jack Wallen which had taken them from Prestonsburg to Lancer. "As I got out I heard Mack say, 'I damn sure ain't going' thereupon, Harris testified, he went inside the house, sat down at the dining room table and ate a sandwich. He declared, however, that he did not "remember" seeing Lewis. Mrs. Lewis, Dorothy Spears or Frank Harris inside the building at the time. "My wife and me were sitting on the bed and some little girls ran in and said Mack's wife had shot herself," he was under the impression she shot herself when we got out of the taxi," Harris admitted he was "pretty jittery."

Miss Spears admitted she and Lewis, whom she has known about two months, are sweethearts. "I didn't kill her and I don't know who did," she told County Attorney Burchett under questioning at the jail. She said she was inside the house when the taxi arrived with Lewis, her step-father and Frank Harris followed a conversation between Mr. and Mrs. Lewis, during which Miss Spears said she heard the wife ask him if he was going home. "Yes, tomorrow," she quoted Lewis as replying. After his mother had also asked him to go home both Lewis' mother and wife asked her to go into the house and see if she could persuade him to go home. He agreed to go, she added, Miss Spears said Lewis and the Harris brothers were drinking in the kitchen, that she was on the back porch when Mrs. Lewis came to the kitchen where her husband poured her a drink. Then, she said, "I heard somebody run through the house and a gun fire. When I got to the front porch, Mack, Pearl Harris and the taxi driver were there."

Under questioning, Miss Spears admitted that Mrs. Lewis had asked her shortly before the shooting, if she loved Lewis enough to marry him and care for the seven children. "I told her I did, and she wanted me to go on up to my house right then."

Asked if she would still marry Lewis, she answered, "Yes, if he wants me to."

Miss Spears and the Harris brothers readily submitted to paraffin tests used in determining if a person has recently fired a weapon. Lewis was not given the test which, reportedly, unerringly uncovers powder residue on the hands of one who has recently fired a gun or revolver.

Lewis told THE TIMES that he still is a deputy sheriff but Sheriff Troy B. Sturgill said Monday night that he had a few days earlier, refused to re-instate him after he had been "let go" from the police force here by Chief of Police Ego Laferty. Both the Sheriff and Chief of Police said they had known of his domestic difficulties and had decided this would prevent him from doing satisfactory work as a peace officer.

Sheriff Sturgill suggested to County Judge Davidson that Lewis be permitted to attend his wife's funeral Wednesday afternoon. "I know he's not getting to leave," he added.

Judge Davidson set date of examining trial for this morning (Thursday). Tuesday afternoon, the Harris brothers and Miss Spears remained in jail.

Mr. and Mrs. Lewis, childhood schoolmates, were married 16 years ago. She was the last member of the family of the late Mike and Molly Burchett, Adkins, and, her husband declared, "a better woman never lived." Surviving her, besides her husband, are seven children: George Donald, Mollie Marie, Joe Wheeler, Ellen Dagg, John, Edna, Mack, Jr. and Corrinne, a babe of two months.

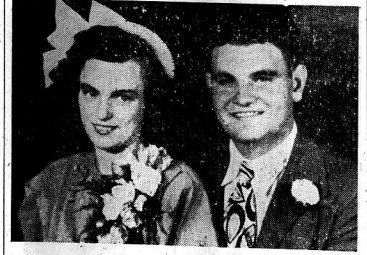

Holding them so, Uncle Bob recalled that he had once been a "great" singer and that folks don't these days, sing the old-time songs as they used to sing them. "Then holding the children, he sang in a strong voice a simple hymn of undaunted faith and bright hope.

Dear Floyd Countian, Your 1946-47 school term is now open. The rural teachers are at work and the graded schools will open on September 9th. Your schools were hard hit by the war period. They are now emerging from that difficult experience, still a little dizzy, but ready to go. Thanks to the recent state legislature and the public, Floyd County's children, as a group, will have the longest school term they have ever known. Floyd County's teachers will enjoy the highest salary, per month and per year, that they have ever had. For years we have talked to prospective teachers, and teachers, of the importance of getting acquainted with and getting along with the patrons and parents of the district. This is all well and good and we shall continue to stress it. But do we not, perhaps, place a little too much of the responsibility on the teacher? What about the duty of the patrons and the parents to get acquainted with and cooperate with the teacher? Although we still have a good many "emergencies" we offer no apologies for Floyd County's teachers. After seeing the interest and enthusiasm displayed by the rural teachers in their four-day workshop held at Martin recently I have no fears as to the kind of job they will do. But since many are young and with limited experience and training we feel it especially important that the people of the district do their part. Your teacher may be ambitious, ready and willing to give her best, but facing a large group of children in all grades and in a new neighborhood can be a serious job. A little kind cooperation from the people of the district may mean the difference between a good school and a bad one. It may decide whether a good teacher has launched her career or another potentially good teacher has been lost to the profession. Try to make your teacher feel welcome in your community. Call on her at school and offer her your cooperation. Invite her into your home. Remember that it is to her advantage (and yours) that she makes good.
