### To the People of The Seventh District:

It will not be possible for me to issue a personal letter to those who have helped in the effort to secure the Republican nomination for Congress. I am, therefore, sending this word of my appreciation through local papers.

I send to all friends my sincere thanks and good wishes. I shall work with deeper humility, greater determination, and larger faith in the Good Cause which I have known you and worked with you.

**We Should Not Delay**

THE TIMES hopes that those who have assumed responsibility for making a survey to determine the need for, and interest in, the conversion of lands at and around the Dovesy dam into a park need to do a good job of it.

This is absolutely necessary if the reservoir is to mean all it should to this section. The dam should be more than mere impounded waters forming a lake hidden in a valley which has never had modern roads. To whatever value it may be in flood protection there should be added a value as a vacation spot where

fishing, bathing, boating, picnicking and motoring may be enjoyed.

If the state or federal park systems give the aid that is so long and thorough work may now earn for the reservoir area, good roads will be built, boating and bathing facilities will be installed. All the features you have seen at other lakes will be available at this one.

Every recreation spot in the nation is already taxed beyond capacity. Reservations for boats and cabins must be made days, even weeks, in advance. Thoughts wait their turn. There is no such spot for the people of this section, a vast area of half a million persons, nearer than Norris or Harrington lakes.

The need for the proposed park area is such that it will not require a lot of pointing to make it apparent to the governmental department that can make all these things possible.

The thing that should be done is to convert the entire valley above the dam into a forest preserve, since the more valuable lowland will be inundated or threatened with inundation at maximum flood stage. This could be carried on a bit of natural conservation—letting nature's trees and leaves protect the slopes that, unprotected, will some day wash down and slowly fill the lake soon to be formed.

**Contracts for Caskets For 250,000 Yets Let**

Contracts for the manufacture of 250,000 caskets and cases to be used in the War Department's program for returning the bodies of American servicemen who died overseas during World War II have been awarded to five concerns at an approximate cost of \$35,000,000.

The announcement of the award of the contracts was made by Brig. Gen. Harlan L. Mumma, commanding officer of the Jeffersonville Quartermaster Depot which is charged with the procurement of the caskets and cases.

The contracts were let to Continental Industries, Chicago; the Cincinnati Coffin Company; Goodyear Aircraft Corporation, Akron, Ohio; Galint Products, Alliance, Ohio; and National Manufacturing Company, Cincinnati, Ohio. Each concern will produce 50,000.

Manufacture of all caskets and protective outer cases is expected to be completed within the next few months. Production gets into full swing.

The War Department spent many months in research before making its decision on the type casket to be used, Mumma said. It will be of seamless steel hermetically sealed, and conservative in design.

The cases will be of plywood, brown in color, lined with zinc-coated steel. The casket is to be permanently attached to the base of the case.

In order to expedite the program, the War Department appealed to the Civilian Production Administration for help in obtaining the steel, plywood and other materials required.

On July 1, certain changes in the army recruiting program took place such as:

Family allowances are available for the duration and six months for coming into the service now.

Men who were discharged on or after May 12 may come back into the army without the usual discharge, provided they join for a certain length of service in a certain military occupational specialty. Service 100 must be available to be used as proof of length of length of service in each rank.

There has been a substantial pay increase for service men. The pay privates has been increased from \$73 per month to \$80 per month, private first class \$85 and \$90, and there are other increases for the other grades.

The Painville army recruiting station is now the Kentucky State military district. Until July 1, it was a part of the Charleston, W. Va., recruiting district. Applicants for enlistment now will be sent to Ft. Knox, Ky.

**Six Veterans Centers Operate in Kentucky For Advice, Counsel**

Six Veterans Administration Guidance Centers are now in operation in Kentucky to help veterans in selecting proper educational and vocational programs. It was announced this week by Harry W. Farmer, regional manager.

At the various guidance centers, veterans receive expert advice and counseling in the choice of a training course to which they are individually suited. Each veteran's past schooling and business experience, his military specialties, his hobbies and interests are carefully evaluated. He may take a series of tests if he so desires. Any physical disabilities as determined by a medical examination, are listed and compared carefully to the physical requirements of the training which he is considering.

The service is available to all veterans who have received their certificates of eligibility for education or training. Use of the service is required of all disabled veterans entering on-the-job training. Also, it is required before a veteran may receive the program of education or training as a result of unsatisfactory military service.

The Veterans Administration urges veterans planning to attend school for the first time under the G. I. Bill next fall to apply immediately for certificates of eligibility at their nearest Veterans Administration office.

The six guidance centers are located at the Veterans Administration Regional Office, at the Veterans Administration Center near University of Louisville, Louisville; College, Barbourville; Morehead State Teachers College, Morehead; Western Kentucky State Teachers College, Bowling Green; Murray State Teachers College, Murray.

**Mine Entries Planned To Recover 20 Bodies**

Lexington, Ky., Aug. 3—New entries will be driven through unexplored ground surrounding the Kentucky Straight Creek Coal Company mine near Pineville in a recovery effort to recover the bodies of 20 men trapped inside the mine during a cave-in.

The State Department of Mines workers here said today the decision was reached at two recent meetings of the men in charge of the recovery work "because it has been impossible to effectively seal the mine off as another outcrop of existing fires."

At the meetings, the department reported, it was determined and agreed that the unexplored territory through which the men's bodies contain the bodies of 20 men could be reached by driving new entries through some of the unexplored territory entirely independent of the present mine workings.

A sample of mine air taken from behind the present ineffective seals, the department said, show the presence of carbon monoxide, indicating semi-active fires, methane or explosive gas, and a high percentage of high oxygen, indicating an ineffective seal.

The department said a committee had been named to investigate a means of driving the new entries with "all possible speed and dispatch."

"It is difficult to predict definitely how soon the recovery can be effected," the department asserted, "but barring unforeseen difficulties any delays in getting the work started, it is expected that the recovery work should be completed by the end of the present year."

**WAKE UP, KENTUCKY**

By EWING GALLOWAY

If 400 people were killed and 3,000 injured in motor vehicle accidents in Kentucky, and if in every one of these accidents someone was being killed or injured, it would shock us into demanding that every car on the state be thoroughly inspected and unroadworthy vehicles be repaired at once or taken to junk yards.

To do a thorough inspection job the state Highway Patrol work has to be overhauled.

Sheriffs and their deputies would be recruited for part-time work with the state police in removing dangerous cars and trucks from the roads. County judges would send their pardons to help on the job. Persons leaving saloons or taverns would be watched and all trucks would be stopped when they started to drive away.

Children under 16 driving cars would be picked up and their licenses fined for letting them drive without licenses.

And the next General Assembly would enact far stricter traffic laws than we have now.

But with the appalling toll traffic accidents spread out over 365 days the public takes the slaughter as a matter of course.

We read now and then of someone mangled in road accidents, remarking that it is too bad and something ought to be done about it, then go our way and forget it.

And generally law enforcement officials, most of them keenly sensitive to public opinion, do just what they think is required of them and let it go that.

It seldom comes home to people that their own indifference is responsible for a large percentage of the lives lost in avoidable accidents. Recreators and truckers in particular, asking for a statement reassuring the public that the present inspection program would really be carried to a finish.

Ralph E. Foman, the Governor's secretary, gives us assurance of the inspection project in the following paragraph:

"We can assure you that Kentucky does mean business in its car inspection program, and of course, it is to be maintained until it is complete." We will continue until the entire state is covered.

Foman's statement is encouraging. We can't question the determination of the executive department at Frankfort to carry out the plan. We don't want to.

If you haven't guessed by purpose already, I am writing this article to urge every individual who reads it to write to Governor Willis, assuring him of your unqualified support in carrying out the inspection program and doing it thoroughly. You may even suggest that he ask county judges to co-operate by having their county patrolmen join forces with the state highway police. And you can urge that the Governor see that this is being done in your own county. Write that letter now.

**MAY SAYS SENATOR MEAD SEEMS TO 'CRUCIFY' HIM TO WIN GOVERNORSHIP**

Washington, July 28—Representative A. May charged that the Senate War Investigating Committee's "effort to crucify" him in order to win the New York Governorship, it was disclosed tonight.

May, whose heart ailment has postponed an appearance before the committee to explain his connections combine, sent a letter to a "number of friends" on July 19 in which he said:

"Senator Jim Mead is a candidate for Governor of New York and I think if he can crucify me he can crucify anyone. I have a great hero and overcame his present difficult political opposition and rode into the office of Governor of New York."

May's letter was written on stationery of the House Military Affairs Committee, of which he is chairman. A copy of the letter was received in Prestonburg, Ky., May's home town. In the letter May said he was sending the same letter to "a number of his constituents."

May has been charged with exerting undue pressure on War Department officials on behalf of the so-called "paper empire" headed by Henry H. Arnold.

He said in his letter that the charges were part of a "smear campaign" resulting from the Mead Committee's "political inspiration."

"All this time I have been calling by telephone the undersecretary of war, now Secretary of War, Robert Patterson, and some of them urging them to rush the production of war material at this time when General Eisenhower was pleading for more shells and the bloodiest onslaught at the Belgian Bulge," May wrote.

The basal salary for this year was set at \$115, plus \$2 a year up to five years for teaching experience, the established rate for this year was \$120 credit and 40 cents per hour for college work. Last year, college credits netted the teacher only 25 cents an hour.

The overall salary picture for the Floyd teacher is this:

The rural teacher with five years' experience and four years of college will receive \$167.80 for nine months' work this year as compared with \$120 for seven months last year.

The consolidated school teacher with the same qualifications and receiving no supplemental salary for supervisory work will receive \$185.80 for nine months this year as compared with \$139.50 last year.

The county's high schools will begin their terms September 5, it was announced.

Lexington, Ky., Aug. 5—A heavy culling of flocks, especially among commercial poultry producers, is expected to insure good prices for both poultry and eggs all and well through and all of next year, H. B. Price, University of Kentucky agriculture economist, said today.  
Addressing 111 men and women from 48 Kentucky counties and from Illinois, Ohio and Pennsylvania at the 22nd annual university short course in poultry, Price said the culling of flocks would lead to fewer hens and fewer eggs next year.

**Biblical Wheat To Yield 100,000 Bushels**

Cleveland, July 28—A handful of wheat, sown to demonstrate a Biblical prophecy, this week yielded 100,000 bushels for world-wide relief.  
A harvest celebration Thursday at the Adrian, Mich., fairground will climax the demonstration, inspired six years ago by the Rev. Clifford Robinson, 28-year-old director of the Cleveland Bible College.  
In September, 1940, Robinson, a senior Bible student at the college, was assigned to preach one Sunday at the "Columbus, Mich., Friends Church. His sermon was titled, "The Death Route to Life," and his text was from the Book of John, 12:24, which reads:  
"Verily, verily, I say unto you, except a corn of wheat fall into the ground and die, it abideth alone; but if it die, it bringeth forth much fruit."  
"Why not a cubic inch of wheat, tilled and re-planted for six years?" suggested Robinson.  
The miller four days later planted a cubic inch of wheat—360 kernels—on a patch of ground measuring 4 by 8 feet, on ground owned by Henry Ford near his home.  
The first harvest was tilled, one-tenth going to the church, and Hayden re-planted nine-tenths of the crop on a 24-by-60-foot plot on Ford's experimental farm. The third year the crop covered an acre, the fourth 16 acres, and last year 230 acres, all planted in the Bible Church soon.  
This year, 286 farmers in Michigan and northern Ohio took part in the final planting of the Biblical wheat over 2,668 acres.  
The first harvest of the wheat will be distributed for world-famine relief through the American Friends Service Committee. Mr. Robinson expects to leave for India as a missionary of the French Church soon.

**NEWS FOR THE VETERAN**

**REDUCE INTEREST RATE ON LOANS**  
Interest rates on government life insurance policy loans have been reduced from 5 to 4 per cent annually effective the first of August, the Veterans Administration announced. The VA explained the new rate is in keeping with the present trend of interest rates on policy loans made by commercial life insurance companies. Approximately 127,000 veterans of both World Wars have loans of more than \$15,000,000 outstanding against U.S. Government or National Service Life Insurance. On an annual basis the new rate will mean a saving of over \$1,000,000 to these veterans. The new 4 per cent rate represents the second reduction in government life insurance rates within the past seven years. The first was made on July 19, 1950, when it was cut from 5 to 4 per cent. Loans may be secured on permanent plans of U.S. Government and National Service Life Insurance after the policy has been in effect one year. The loan value is 84 per cent of the cash value of the policy. The new 4 per cent interest rate will apply to all policy loans, regardless of their size.

**BURIAL FLAGS**  
An American flag to drape the casket of a deceased veteran may be obtained by relatives or undertakers by application to postmasters at any county seat postoffice. Flags may also be obtained at other postoffices designated by the Veterans Administration or at any field office of the VA. The flag will be given to the next-of-kin after the burial. Eligible for this benefit are honorably discharged veterans of any war, or a person honorably discharged from the service after serving at least one enlistment or discharged for disability in line of duty.

**QUESTIONS AND ANSWERS**  
Q. Can one veteran have a loan guaranteed by the VA to buy or construct more than a single-family home?  
A. Yes, but one veteran cannot get a G.I. loan for more than a four-family home. If more than one veteran is buying then the four-family home is allowed for the group and decreased by one additional family unit for each veteran participating in the loan. Thus, two veterans can buy or build a six-family home, three veterans a seven-family home, etc.

Q. I am a veteran receiving disability compensation. If I accept employment will my compensation be cut?  
A. No. Disabled veterans are encouraged to work as long as it does not increase disability. Disability compensation is subject to change only at the disability itself changes.

Q. I have just been discharged from the army. I'm thinking about going to college this fall, but I'm not sure what I want to do. Am I obligated to return to college if I apply for a certificate of eligibility from the VA?  
A. No. The VA urges all veterans starting school for the first time to apply for certificates of eligibility right now, so as to avoid delays later. After securing your certificate of eligibility, you might consult the VA Guidance Center for advice as to what course it would be best for you to pursue.

Q. My husband, a veteran, needs hospitalization for a malignant condition. I understand the treatment he needs can be given at Hines, Illinois. Can he be admitted there?  
A. Direct admissions for the treatment of malignant conditions are not made to Hines or other tumor clinics unless they are those to which the applicant would normally be admitted. Admission is made to the nearest VA hospital, home or center with subsequent transfer to tumor clinics.
