The 1946 Legislature in Kentucky Revised Statutes 166.675 changed the school tax rate so that it would be fixed at not less than twenty-five cents and not more than \$1.50 on each \$100 worth of taxable property. Kentucky Revised Statutes 169.670 provides:

"Each board of Education shall prepare a school budget showing the amount of money needed for current expenses, debt service, capital outlay, and other expenses of the schools during the succeeding fiscal year; also the estimated total that will be received from the common school fund and the amount that will be needed to be raised by local taxation, including the rate of levy necessary to raise such an amount."

It is my opinion that the fiscal court has no other alternative than to make the levy as requested by the County Board of Education, provided the Board is in order. In the case of the recent levy the matter was so prepared and the maximum levy of \$1.50 was requested.

### Leave the 'Bedclothes' Off

ATTORNEY GENERAL Eldon S. Dummit has served this state well by filing suit to revoke the charter in Kentucky of the Ku Klux Klan. This relic of the Civil War which has deteriorated over the years in moral fibre, if it ever had any, has no place anywhere in this country. Kentucky, traditional home of hospitality and neighborliness and courage, needs the Klan not at all.

A fiery cross in the night, a weird ritual, outlandish titles and ghostly habiliments behind which to hide may have a certain charm for the immature and the cowardly. But Kentucky men want no hood to hide behind when they act. Kentucky needs no Ku Klux Klan to "correct" any evil within its borders. It is not the Kentucky way, as it is not the American way.

The Klan, in qualifying for its corporate charter back in 1921, described its purposes as "benevolent and eleemosynary." Benevolent to whom? The word, "eleemosynary" was apparently added because the Klan likes big words.

The hooded terror cannot be benevolent. Its purpose is well-known. It should be no great task to prove what that purpose is.

Getting closer home, it may be stated that Floyd county has too many who damn the Jews and damn the biggers and damn everybody but themselves whenever any event does not redound to their credit in the bank or their advancement socially. But THE TIMES hopes we of Floyd county will carry Hitler's doctrine of hate no farther than that.

Whether Attorney General Dummit

succeeds as he should or not, let us of Floyd county do the honorable thing and hide behind nothing—particularly, not behind a sheet.

### Association's Action Is Justified

THE TIMES is glad the Big Sandy Valley Association is openly seeking the defeat of Senator Harley M. Kilgore (D., W. Va.) Congressmen Ellis and Kee of West Virginia and Flannagan of Virginia. Moreover, we devoutly trust this objective.

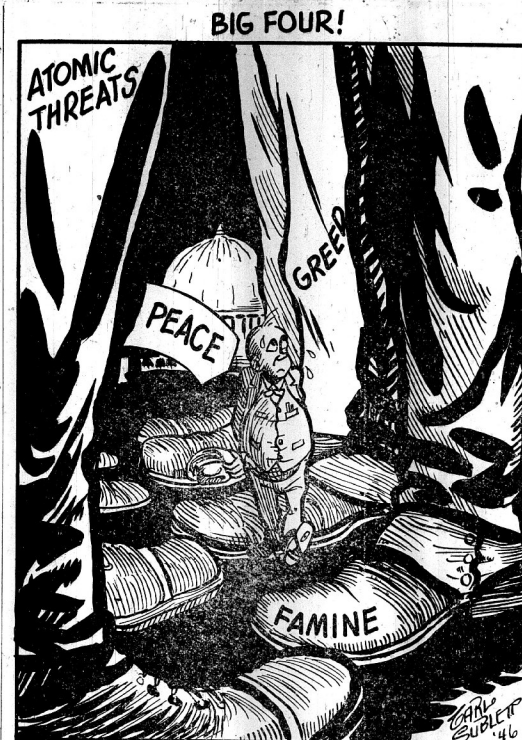
This is the quartet—Kilgore and Ellis and Kee and Flannagan—that led the fight on the canalization of the Big Sandy. These are the representatives in Congress who ask enormous federal expenditures for other sections but who fight to lop off from a billion-dollar appropriations bill any amount that would benefit the two tributaries of the Big Sandy which extend into West Virginia and from Kentucky on for a few miles into Virginia.

The bill from which they caused the Big Sandy improvement to be removed had 100 millions of dollars added to it after this section was shunted aside. This, despite the fact that these four representatives howled loudest and longest about economizing and saving the "dear taxpayer" the \$2-million-dollar cost of the Big Sandy undertaking.

Of the 33 river improvement projects embodied in the bill as it stood before Messrs. Kilgore, Flannagan, et al got through with it, the Big Sandy was fifth in size and third in economic ratio, according to army engineers' figures. The Big Sandy's ratio was 1 to 1.6 but it was discarded, while another project costing \$150,000,000 remained in the bill although its ratio was only 1 to 1.5.

But need for improvements, economy, economics or plain, common justice—none of these are the matter as viewed by the four legislators the Association openly condemns. They are just "agin" it. The Association was created to do just that.

Then what was there for the Association to do but seek the defeat of these four, even as the Four sought and achieved, at least temporarily, the defeat of the Association and the cause in which it honestly believes?

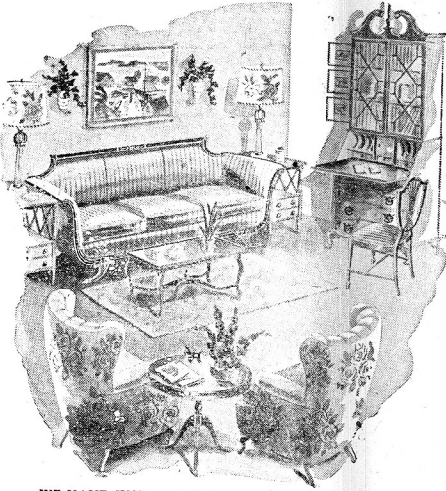

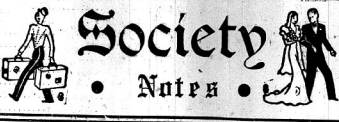

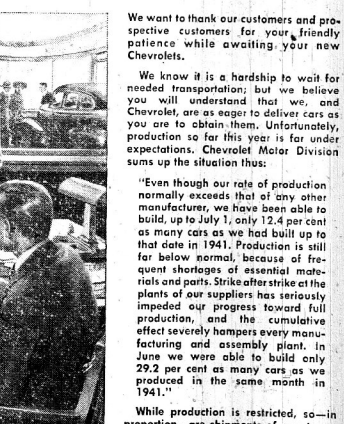
Through this Committee the Kentucky brewing industry... and Kentucky law enforcement agencies all work together to maintain wholesome conditions in retail beer outlets.
