Additional Safeguards Suggested for Mine
Additional corrective measures have been proposed to supplement some recent improvements at the No. 1000 West of the mine's 400-ton-a-day Alley mine at Water Works. The Bureau of Mines announced in a detailed re-inspection report based on re-examination of the mine in June by Inspector Russell Shaw. The mine, employing 65 men, was re-examined prior to the adoption of the federal mine safety code effective on July 29, 1946.
Covering virtually every phase of operation, Inspector Shaw's major recommendations called for prompt advancement of permanent timbers within one cut of the face where safety posts should be used, approved roof testing, exclusive use of permissible explosives and transportation of blasting supplies separately from mantrips, consideration of a split system of ventilating utilizing recognized air-couraging devices, pre-shift mine examinations after an overnight interruption in ventilation, examination of several substantial haulage concerns and unsafe practices, prohibition of smoking, and the use of fire extinguishers.
The inspector also advocated weekly examination of air courses, where guards at exposed openings, safety devices for electrical equipment, guards on shafts, mechanical equipment, surface-underground telephone service, universal wearing of safety apparatus, formation of an active safety organization holding regular meetings, monthly adequate surface and underground fire protection, adoption of company fire drills, reduction of first-aid supplies, and regular training of all employees in first-aid methods and a crew in rescue work.
In enumerating improvements effected since the June, 1945 inspection, the examiner indicated that the betterments had eliminated the most hazardous conditions only partially. Among beneficial changes were re-timbering of the drift portal and practice of guard beams along timbers, extensive timbering of the belt haulage, some improvement in lighting, and the installation of suitable waiting period, generally 15 minutes, of stoppages, and closing of necessary room crosscuts in one area, provision for two flame safety lamps for gas testing, reduction of "rapping" by haulage men, use of training of all employees in trolley circuits, and provision for a bulletin board.

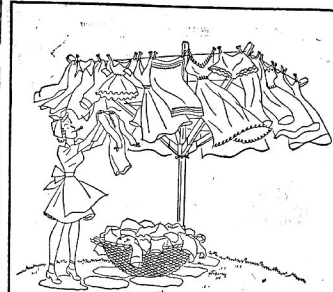

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SOCIAL SERVICE HELPS VETERAN TO ADJUST

An expanded social work program, designed to prevent cases of relapse and readjustment, is assisting veterans in Kentucky, Ohio and Michigan.

By means of follow-through contact with every veteran who has been hospitalized in the three-state area, social workers from the VA or from appropriate civilian agencies insure that a veteran is not cast adrift without someone looking out for him.

The veteran is interviewed by a social worker before he leaves the hospital. In the case of a veteran with a service-connected disability, the nearest VA regional office is notified of his release, while in the case of a veteran with a non-service-connected disability, the appropriate civilian agency is notified. The VA has a representative in each of the three states with the Home Service Departments.

The VA has 32 trained social workers in Ohio, 20 in Michigan and 10 in Kentucky. They assist veterans who are disabled by injury or disability to adjust themselves to their civilian life and their social relationships when they progress toward health and rehabilitation.

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QUESTIONS AND ANSWERS

Q: Why is it necessary to have property appraised before a veteran can secure a G.I. loan?

A: The property appraisement Act requires that the purchase price of a home be appraised before the cost of construction for property, or improvements, must not be more than the appraised value.

Q: I am planning to resume college studies this fall. Will the G.I. Bill What forms do I have to fill out and when should I make my arrangements?

A: Assuming that you have already made arrangements with the college to re-enter the fall, only one form need be filled out by the veteran to authorize the VA to resume payments for your subsistence allowance. Check with the college when you return in the fall to insure this simplified form has been made out.

Q: How long can a veteran with six months' service readjustment allowance be discharged under the G.I. Bill?

A: The number of weeks of readjustment allowance payable to a veteran is determined by the length of his active service between Sept. 16, 1940 and the end of World War II. The maximum is 52 weeks.

Q: What is the difference between a veteran's entitlement to readjustment allowance for 36 weeks?

A: A veteran who holds a bad conduct discharge entitled to no pay under the G.I. Bill is not eligible for readjustment allowance.

Q: Since he holds neither an honorable nor dishonorable discharge from the armed services, it would be necessary for him to contact his nearest office for a decision as to whether he was discharged under conditions other than dishonorable.

Q: I am in the army. I signed a statement saying my disability expired prior to my enlistment. The disability has become worse. Now may I apply for compensation?

A: If you are in the army, you may apply for compensation if your disability is the result of a service-connected injury or disease.

Diamond Elkhorn Adds Safety Measures, Report

An original inspection of the Diamond Elkhorn Coal Company's 233-1/2 mile long mine, located in Northern, disclosed the need of several commendable safety features since the mine was opened in October, 1945, a federal coal mine inspection has reported to the Bureau of Mines. Dummit Says Rural Road Program 'Grossly Inadequate'

Bowling Green, Ky., Aug. 17.—Attorney General Eldon S. Dummit today attacked the federal road program as "grossly inadequate." Kentucky has had a \$20,000,000 road fund for the past several years but rural roads have received only \$2,000,000 worth of aid annually, he declared, and called the amount "paltry."

In an address before the Warren County Board, Mr. Dummit pointed out that the federal road program is grossly inadequate and that it is not being done to the job. He said, however, the situation has been improved to some extent, he said. The 1946 legislature raised the yearly appropriation for rural roads to \$5,000,000 annually "on the advice of the Federal Highway Department."
