Why should you tell the people, Troy B., that their consolidated school taxes had been repealed by the Legislature and that all school taxes had been put under one levy? I suppose that you will agree that this is true. Considering that people do not have to pay any more consolidated school taxes in Floyd county, there is not so much increase in school taxes after all, is there, Troy? Some rural sections pay a little more taxes, but their children get nine months schools, too, just as the children of our larger schools do. Under the new law everyone pays the same

rate, and every school in Floyd county regardless of where it is located gets the same school term as do the larger schools. Troy, don't you think the country boys and girls deserve an equal chance with the larger schools?

Moreover, Troy, why didn't you tell the people that the county rate for school taxes is the same and not one penny higher than they are in Prestonsburg where your brother-in-law Wicker is superintendent? The rate is \$1.50 in the county; it is \$1.50 in Prestonsburg. Here in Prestonsburg Mr. Wicker does not operate a large fleet of school buses as is done out in the county at a cost of \$50,000 per year, and yet the school taxes are as high in Prestonsburg as they are out in the county. This is the cold truth, Troy, and it cannot be wiped off the record with a smile.

Here is another thing Floyd county teachers and taxpayers ought to know. Under the present law, the sheriff gets 1 per cent of the school taxes for collecting them. Last winter while I was at Frankfort trying to get the Legislature to appropriate more money for the schools, Troy B. was down there trying to get a bill passed giving the sheriffs 4 per cent of the school taxes for collecting them. He got his bill passed. But he later found out that the law gives 4 per cent to the sheriffs; I am informed that he is now writing the sheriffs of the state for money to finance a law suit to see whether he cannot get his 4 per cent instead of 1 per cent for the collection of our school taxes during his present term. Who do I mention this? It shows one thing beyond doubt: Troy B. is more interested in his own bank account than he is in the teachers or the taxpayers.

Back last year when Troy B. was running for sheriff, he said he stood for the veterans. This year he has changed his mind, and he is doing his dead level best to defeat a veteran, Palmer Hall, who is now superintendent of Floyd county schools, and who lived on a little bread and soup each day in a German prison camp while Troy B. was safe at home. Does this sound very much like you are for the veterans or against them, Troy?

There is only one issue in this campaign, dear people! Do you want the collecting to continue to go forward under Palmer Hall, a veteran who risked his life along with your boys, or do you

want to elect Troy B. as political dictator in the superintendent's office to dominate all the offices around the courthouse without worrying about your children's interests?

I was your superintendent for almost ten years. Even Troy B. will have to admit that I did a fairly good job. The Board of Education and I looked after your children's interests. We hired Democrats as well as Republicans for teachers. We did not try to control other offices as our sheriff is now trying to do. Whether you continue to have good schools in Floyd county depends upon your choice for Board members to be elected in November. Let's keep our schools clean! I'm sure you'll agree with me that you don't want your schools flung back into politics. I'd like to see our schools continue to go forward. This can and will be done if you elect as school board members J. M. S. (Jimmy) Green in Educational Division No. 1 and Dr. J. H. Allen in Division No. 2. The men will co-operate with Palmer Hall, Superintendent, and the hold-over Board members—Dr. Dewey Osborne, Ray Fraey and T. N. Newsome—in continuing a good school program in Floyd county.

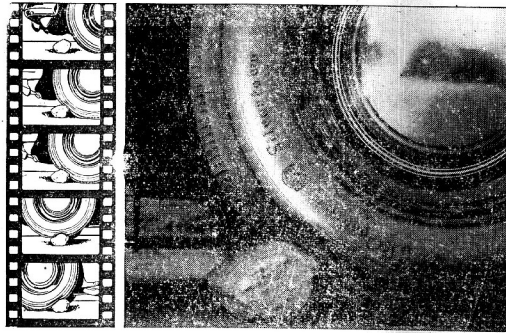

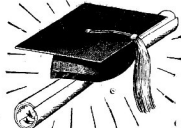

NEWS FOR THE VETERAN

CONVEYANCE FOR AMERICAN VETERANS
Application forms for amputee veterans for use in obtaining cars under the \$20,000 program are currently established by Congress, are limited to those veterans of World War II who are "entitled to compensation for the loss, or loss of use, of one or both legs as or above the ankle. The forms may be secured from any VA office or contact representative, with full information as to the established procedure in procuring the vehicle.

To avoid any misunderstanding of the \$20,000 program, VA stresses these facts:
1. The total purchase price, including any tax and all special attachments, cannot exceed \$1,600, nor can the veteran pay the difference for a more expensive car.
2. Veterans cannot be reimbursed for cars purchased prior to this date.
3. The veteran must conform to the state licensing regulations, and his eligibility for driving has to be adjudicated by VA.
4. The veteran must be separated from service and his claim completed by June 30, 1947.

Under this program, the veteran may use the car for a new or used mobile, station wagon, jeep, truck, tractor, or any other form of conveyance.

FUNERAL EXPENSES FOR VETERANS
The Ohio - Michigan - Kentucky branch office of the Veterans Administration in Columbus, O., this week outlined four specific benefits which are available upon the death of a war veteran. The benefits authorized by law to pay up to \$150 funeral and burial expenses of a veteran, and an American flag for burial purposes, arrange for interment in a national cemetery, and provide a grave marker. Applications for each one of the four benefits may be procured from any Veterans Administration office, from service organizations and from chapters of the American Red Cross. Benefits are available only when the veteran has been discharged under conditions other than dishonorable.

BENEFITS FOR U.S. VETS WITH SERVICE IN CANADIAN FORCES
An American citizen who served in the Canadian armed forces during the war and who received gratuities as a veteran under the Canadian laws, is not barred from certain benefits under the G.I. Bill, according to VA officials at the branch office in Columbus, Ohio.

The veteran who received a cash bonus and a "re-establishment credit" in an equal amount from the Canadian government, is eligible for a VA loan guarantee as provided by the American law. This decision clarifies the amendment to the G.I. Bill that stated: "American citizens who served in allied forces in the war are entitled to certain VA benefits if they have not received the same or similar benefits from the nation whose forces they served, and if they are residing in the United States."

Benefits, under the Canadian law, are a cash bonus, based on length and place of service, and an equal amount in the form of a re-establishment credit. On this basis, the VA decision ruled that a guaranteed loan which the veteran is committed to repay with interest, is not "similar" to the Canadian gratuity.

USE VA FORM 336 FOR BENEFICIARY CHANGE
Veterans interested in changing beneficiaries on National Service Life Insurance and U.S. Government Life Insurance policies were cautioned to be sure of the correct procedure. VA's Columbus (Ohio) branch office announced recently.

Scantly information is one of the prime "handicaps" encountered by all VA insurance offices. Their files contain 150,000 Johnsons, 120,000 Browns and 13,000 John Smiths, 8,000 of them without middle initials.

Completion of VA Form 336 assures all of the information needed for a properly completed change of

beneficiary. The forms may be secured directly or by writing to the nearest VA office.

G.I. RIGHTS FOR FEMALE VETERANS
Female veterans of World War II are entitled to the same benefits provided by the G.I. Bill as male veterans, it was emphasized by the Veterans Administration Columbus branch office for Ohio, Michigan and Kentucky.

Under the G.I. Bill, women veterans are entitled to education and training, guarantee of loans, readjustment allowances, including aid for self-employment and job finding assistance. Women veterans attending school or in job-training status are entitled to subsistence allowances of \$85 monthly without dependents and \$90 a month with dependents. They are eligible for disability compensation, hospitalization and National Service Life Insurance.

Women veterans eligible for benefits include former members of the WAC, WAVG, SPARS, Marines, nurses' corps, and commissioned physical therapists, dietitians and medical officers.

QUESTIONS AND ANSWERS
Q. If I take a part-time job, will the Veterans Administration cut the amount of subsistence I receive under Public Law 346?

A. No, as long as your subsistence allowance and your wages together do not equal more than \$200 a month if you have a dependent, or \$175 per month if you are without dependents. Your subsistence allowance may be reduced as much as necessary to meet this limitation.

Q. Does the fact that I receive other income have any bearing on the amount of compensation I get as a veteran with a service-connected disability?

A. No, your compensation is for a service-connected disability, the amount of income you have will not

generally affect the amount of compensation allowed you.

Q. What is the latest date on which a veteran can begin a course of education or take an on-the-job training course under the provisions of the Servicemen's Readjustment Act?

A. A course of education or on-the-job training under the Servicemen's Readjustment Act may be started not later than four years after the end of the war or date of discharge, whichever is later.

Q. I am an honorably discharged veteran of World War II and have re-enlisted in the army for 18 months. I would like to buy a home now with a G.I. loan for my own use after my enlistment is up. My wife and children would live in it if I am transferred away from my home. Can I get a G.I. loan for that?

A. You are eligible for a G.I. loan.

A SCHOOL TEACHER SPEAKS ON LOCAL OPTION

Only a few days ago, the writer as a Floyd County teacher, received a very urgent appeal from West Springs, professing much interest in the local option schools. The appeal was to use vote and influence to prevent passage of local option law. This was doubtless a form letter which went to a very great number, possibly all, of Floyd county's teachers. I should like to say—and it is, perhaps, the sentiment of many another teacher—that we are extremely grateful for all progressive legislation carrying particular benefits to schools, by way of lengthened term, increased teacher salaries, and the like. We are hopeful that our legislators will even yet find it possible to provide more support for our schools. However, if it be true as implied in this letter, that the alcoholic business must continue to flourish in order to preserve our present status in school support, I am very readily disposed to feel that I am not engaged in any honorable profession. I should, therefore, wish to detach myself from this line of work very promptly.

Surely, among the most acknowledged and approved purposes of education are constructive citizenship and strength of character. To these things intoxicating drink makes absolutely no contribution. More and more revenue derived from its sale means but one thing—more and more money of the results which education essays to achieve. In the long run our task of educating is not going to pay big dividends unless we give our sanction to such evils as legalized intoxicants, handled as they now are in our county and state. We need to remove the obstacles to real success rather than to encourage their existence.

The writer does not believe that any business has merits or demerits simply and only because of its revenue.

...producing ability, or lack of same. It is easy to rationalize on a liquor subject. It is less easy to rationalize on a revenue subject. It is close cut, moral standards why that nefarious liquor traffic should be prevented.

I feel that many other teachers in the county have the same sentiments with regard to local option appeals from the wets that I have. They focus our attention more definitely on the one and only stand which we can logically make—to wit: dry. On my part this is assuredly not for the purpose of offending any man, but to remove temptations real and permanent injury to us.

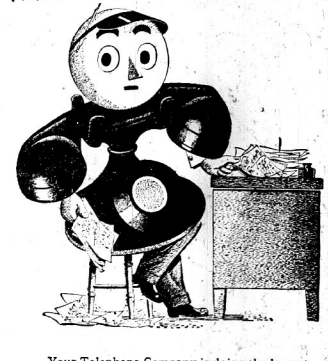
