## Rural Schools May Have Electricity By Sharing Cost

A plan whereby rural schools within service distance of electric poles would share the cost has been outlined to various schools of the county by County Superintendent Palmer L. Hall.

Briefly, Mr. Hall has told the schools that if any school and surrounding farms within a certain percentage of the cost of installing electricity, the County Board of Education will pay the remainder and also take care of power bills.

A large number of schools in rural districts through REA and Kentucky & West Virginia Power Company lines pass remain unelectrified. Mr. Hall said that at least 82 schools, however, have been wired this year, three others are now raising their half of the initial wiring cost and it is expected that within the next few years three half of the rural schools of the county will have electricity, he said.

Total cost of wiring a one-room school was roughly placed at \$700. Superintendent Hall said \$100. Some of the funds raised this year by the school will be used by schools in procuring electric service, and these amounts will be supplemented by contributions from the surrounding farms.

## Lespedeza Helps Nail Down Soil

Lespedeza cover crops have "made good" on hillides as well as on bottom land in Clay county, according to Chas. W. McGuire, county agricultural agent. Six years ago at Taylor White, of the Burning Springs community, seeded six acres of sericea on hillside washed and without hillside land that was untreated. Only slight preparation was made for the seed bed. For three years the sericea made slow growth, but when it once was established, it grew rapidly, filling the ditches this year the crop has completely covered the ground, making good pasture at the rate of one acre per cow.

Levi Sparklock, of the Big Creek community, has two acres of sericea from which he cut eight tons of high quality hay for the first cutting. He has seeded two more acres.

Although Mrs. E. P. Ray, of Garrard county, is more than 70 years old and has children, grandchildren and great-grandchildren numbering more than 40, she and her daughter-in-law, Mrs. Harry Ray, have made remarkable records in the Antioch Homemakers Club, according to Home Agent Margaret Williams.

The Rays last week re-modeled and re-arranged their kitchen to give added room for storage of supplies and equipment and to save steps; added kitchen windows; improved floors in five rooms; painted, papered, and re-arranged six rooms; painted six pieces of furniture and added nine; hung seven pairs of new or reconditioned curtains, and made two rugs.

Then they made two dressforms, made or re-modeled 67 garments and repaired 86, and made 15 accessories, three purses and four hats.

To maintain the health of their family of five, these homemakers planned their meals and grew a garden of 15 vegetables in addition to potatoes. They improved the exterior of their home by setting out trees and pruning old ones; cleaned and repaired walks and driveway.

With all their homemaking duties, the Rays found time to read nine books last year along with the daily and weekly newspapers and magazines, and religious magazines. They also made 40 calls on the sick and assisted three needy families.

**Corn Loans In State To Be \$1.21 to \$1.33**

## NEWS FOR THE VETERAN

### VA FACTS AND FIGURES

National Service Life Insurance premium payments by Ohio-Michigan-Kentucky veterans are received by the VA's branch office, Columbus, at an average of \$12,000 daily. The Columbus office is NSLI headquarters for World War II veterans in the three states.

Special Services Division of the VA's Branch Office, Columbus, during the period of June through August, arranged for 166 USO shows at the nine VA hospitals in Ohio, Michigan and Kentucky. The shows played before 26,400 patients and employees.

Less than one per cent of World War II veterans who have entered education or on-the-job training under the GI Bill, have exhausted their period of entitlement, it was reported by Veterans Administration officials.

Over 70 per cent of the veterans drawing disability pension or compensation from Veterans Administration during October were World War II cases. The remainder were previous wars and peacetime service.

"Write Right" is advice from VA insurance officials at the Columbus, Ohio, Branch Office to over 1,200,000 National Service Life Insurance policy holders in Ohio, Michigan and Kentucky. Reason: The insurance fees include \$400 for John; and \$300 for Johnson. Even a dozen Kilroys are listed.

### VA'S HOME-TOWN MEDICAL PROGRAM

The extent of medical services which may be rendered to veterans under VA's home-town medical program, was clarified this week by Dr. Paul R. Hawley, medical director of Veterans Administration.

Under existing legislation, veterans may be furnished out-patient medical or dental treatment in VA clinics, in private offices of physicians or dentists or in their own homes for disabilities connected with service-connected disabilities may be filled at government expense by local pharmacies under VA's home-town prescription service.

The medical facilities of VA's regional and sub-regional offices, clinics, and hospitals, under VA's program, will be considered when deciding whether a veteran residing in an area where there is a VA field station, will be referred to a VA clinic or to a civilian physician. Final decision rests with chief medical officers of VA regional offices.

Veterans may be admitted to private hospitals for in-patient treatment of service-connected disabilities by civilian physicians under contract to VA only if their condition is such as to constitute an emergency which cannot be met by a VA hospital because of the lack of beds or because the patient's condition prohibits travel.

Prior authorization for hospitalization and treatment in a private hospital must be obtained by letter, telephone or telegraph. If owing to the extreme emergency of the case, prior authorization is not obtained, the physician or admitting hospital should notify VA within 72 hours.

### QUESTIONS AND ANSWERS

Q. Are persons who assist in the presentation of pension or compensation claims to Veterans Administration permitted to charge for their services?

A. It is unlawful for any person whether he be an attorney or agent admitted to practice before the Veterans Administration or not, to charge or collect any fee for services in respect to a claim. However, the law provides that the Administrator of Veterans Affairs may by regulation authorize payment of fees in an allowed case to an admitted attorney or agent who has filed a valid power of attorney in that case. Such fees are deducted from the monetary benefits allowed.

Q. Will a veteran be able to get a guaranteed loan indefinitely?

A. No. Applications must be made within 10 years from the official end of the war.
