S. Employment Service office here, who gave figures on the educational attainments of those seeking employment through U. S. A. Deputy Sheriff Harold Conroy, who cited specific juvenile cases in this county, stressing the need for knowledge of both children and parents by the teacher, necessitating more home visits by the teacher; Mrs. Grace L. Conley, of Bonanza, with ideas on schoolroom beautification; George L. Moore, principal of the consolidated school, McDowell, with a discussion of citizenship and the task of getting the pupil ready for high school.

Superintendent Hall gave an analysis of problems discussed at the meeting. A general discussion of problems followed.

### Attention, Truckers

There is a new law becoming effective Jan. 1, 1947, which completely changes the method of licensing your truck. Hereafter, you have been licensing them according to manufacturers' capacity rating as 1-ton, 1 1/2-ton, or 1 3/4-ton. You must now completely forget the old method and your 1947 license will be issued according to gross weight, which includes the weight of your truck plus the maximum load you expect to haul. Have your truck weighed so you will know what gross weight you will need to license it for. Your license receipt will show your gross weight and if the State Patrol should check you and you are hauling a greater load than you license your truck for, then you will be fined.

Any private owner of a truck who uses it in his own business only and not for hire and who hauls a gross weight exceeding 10,000 pounds must purchase weight tags in addition to his license. This weight tag will be sold only in this office.

Common and contract carriers must secure a weight tag from the Department of Motor Vehicle Transportation before we can license them in this office.

Anyone who owns a truck and hauls for hire must buy a weight tag as they are classed as common or contract carriers, regardless of weight. For example, if you own a pick-up truck and haul groceries for someone who pays you, this makes you a contract carrier. But if you haul different types of material for anyone you then become a common carrier.

In order to license either of the above two types you must first secure your weight tags from Frankfort and then present them to us before we can license your vehicle. **JARVIS ALLEN, County Court Clerk**

legal. The act says, "No court . . . shall have jurisdiction to issue any restraining order . . . in a case involving or growing out of a labor dispute except" under certain conditions.

2. By raising the question whether a jury trial was mandatory. This act says that in all cases arising under this act in which a person shall be charged with contempt in a court of the United States, the accused shall enjoy the right to a speedy and public trial by an impartial jury.

3. By questioning whether the union, which was fined \$5,000,000, can be held to answer for Lewis' actions. The act says, "No association or organization participating or interested in a labor dispute shall be held responsible or liable in any court of the United States for the unlawful acts of individual officers, members or agents, except upon clear proof of actual participation in, or actual authorization of such acts, or of ratification of such acts after actual knowledge thereof."

These three points were among 10 raised by the defense petition. Although the Supreme Court permitted the arguments, it may rule on all the points or not, as it sees fit. The Court of Appeals decision affirmed a federal district court ruling of last June and upheld the contract granting recognition to a Lewis union as the bargaining agent of the mine foremen. The union is the United Clerical, Technical, and Supervisory Employees, a division of District 66 of the U.M.W.

Born Ajaccio, Corsica, Aug. 15, 1769. Known as "The Little Corporal" symbol of military genius. Entered French Army as Sub-Lieutenant of Artillery. Quickly rose to Captain, then General. Conquered at
