1980 Vets Claim Unemployment Pay

Frankfort, Ky., Jan. 4 (Sp.)—Jobless benefits in the Prestonsburg area totaled 2401 for the week ending December 21, the Kentucky Unemployment Compensation Commission reported today. Industrial claims numbered 284, interstate 157, and veterans' 1980. Total claims were down 1023 from the previous week's figure of 3424, but this was attributed to the fact that some of the area's heaviest claims-taking points, visited bi-monthly, had not been visited during the week covered in the current report.

Owsley Farmers Say Tile Drainage Pays

How big crop yields soon pay for tile drainage, told by County Agent H. M. Williams in Owsley county. W. H. Gibson harvested 98 bushels of corn to the acre on land tile-drained in 1942. Treated with Humate and phosphate and kept in meadow two years, it was plowed in the fall of 1945 and sowed to oats, soybeans and other legumes and grasses. On 1.65 acres where the oats crowded out the other crops, 157, 102 hybrid corn was planted in the spring of 1946. A total of 456 bushels of corn was picked. Fred Peters tile-drained land that had been a swamp as long as the others, and could remember. Corn on it produced 50 bushels to the acre in 1945 and 80 bushels to the acre in 1946. On Claude Duff's farm, where 30 acres are being drained, corn yielded almost 100 bushels to the acre in 1946 on three acres where the drainage system was completed. If the crop could be had, at least 23,000 feet would be used in Owsley county in 1947, Williams said. Approximately 85 per cent of the veterans receiving self-employment allowances from Veterans Administration are farmers.

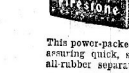

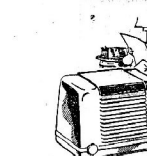

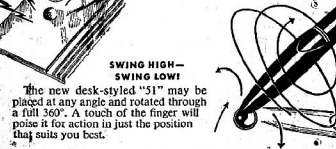

The climax came, Justice said, when Hobart announced he was going to shoot all the war veterans and then drive the bus and the others into the Ohio river.

"You're first," Justice said. Hobart told the driver, "I don't want to shoot you sitting there. You must stand up."

Stillwell had to stop the bus to stand up. Then the passengers jumped Griffin and his brother.

The Griffin brothers were tossed out of the bus and walked down the highway to a garage, where they surrendered meekly.

Municipal Judge Kenneth Cranshaw, presiding, ordered each set bonds of \$5,000 each for the two brothers.

Neither entered pleas after Chief Deputy Sheriff Burl Justice signed affidavits charging them with the kidnapping of driver C. L. Stillwell and two passengers, and the intimidation of 21 others.

The younger brother was named in six affidavits while Hobart was named in five. Their cases, involving 11 felony counts, were continued till Jan. 20.

Rain was charged with cutting with intent to kill in addition to five other charges which Justice placed against the pair. These charges included pointing firearms, assault and battery, assault and operating a motor vehicle without the owner's consent.

The continuance was granted after Assistant County prosecutor W. W. Weidner requested additional time. The bonds were set pending the preliminary hearing.
