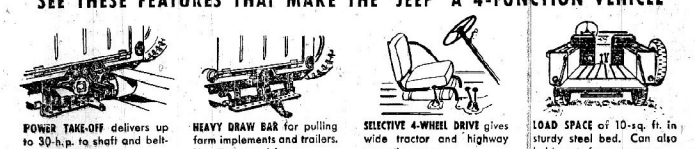

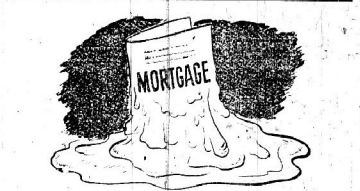

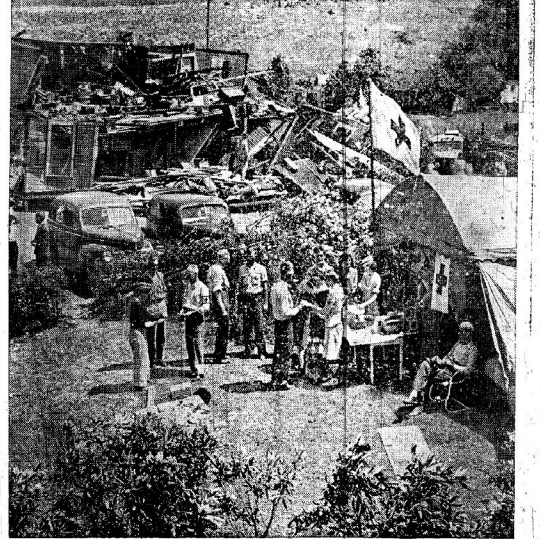

Mr. Leslie added that he prefers the present textbooks to the old. "One thing I do wish you would add: The training of the child reads mainly with the mother at home. It is an axiom that all great men had great mothers, and the mother is the most important thing in any child's life." Students, old and young of these schools will remember him: Foster Walker, Upper Cow, Lower Cow, Old Layneville, Dark Hollow, Allen, Dwyale and his home school, Emma.

H. M. Cooley, with a teaching career starting in 1895 will in April this year end a 52-year period during which his teaching was interrupted only by eight years as County Superintendent of Schools. Mr. Cooley's present \$157.24-a-month salary is the highest attained by any member of the group, but he started in 1885 at \$22.

"The old eighth grade education," he declares, "was higher than the high school education of today, and the old Harvey's Grammar and Ray's Arithmetic were the best textbooks of their kind I ever taught. I wish we had McGuffey's Readers in all our schools." Mr. Cooley looks back over the years and decides his early students were more studious, ambitious and better behaved than the youngsters of 1947. But he is not one to admit that "the younger generation is going to hell." In fact, he is a teacher in the group has any such ideas and they all stand up strong for the modern boys and girls. He began teaching at Brush Creek, then of Middle Creek, Bull Creek, Dwyale, West Prestonsburg, Prestonsburg, Maytown, Garrett, Louisa, and is now teaching at Dwyale.

Another former County Superintendent, John Stephens, of Water Gap, began teaching in 1891 and recalls that at that time there

was not a high school or brick school building in Floyd county.

"I think," wrote Mr. Stephens, "the present generation is composed of fine young men and girls who are not interested as much in their school work as the older generation began teaching, but they are in the present about more things. One thing I am sure about is that the older generation, about it, children are promoted too fast, and I believe most parents are responsible for it."

Mr. Stephens prefers Ray's Arithmetic and McGuffey's Readers to the present texts, but believes there has been an improvement in the teaching of Language. "They don't call it Grammar, any more," he comments. "Children today are poorer at spelling, reading and penmanship and I consider these three areas. Arithmetic as the four fundamentals. My advice to pupils of today is—read!"

He began teaching on Stephens Branch, then on Buckeye and Lick Fork of Middle Creek, the County school on Spruce, Dunwood and other schools on Bull Creek. He began at \$37.50 a month. Except for the 1923-1924 period when he was County Superintendent, he taught practically every year till 1942 when he became chief clerk here in the War and Rationing Board.

R. T. Hunt, of German, in 1899 began teaching in Pike county but in 1907 moved to this county to continue the same work. He began at \$23 a month and when he retired in 1942 he received \$72.

Recent in Ray's Arithmetic and Harvey's Grammar, Mr. Hunt connects the idea of modern textbooks. "There has been a marked improvement in teaching methods," he comments. "For instance, under the old methods we were taught to memorize dates and a lot of facts that had very little educational value. There have been a marked improvement in the broader conception of the subject matter. I think the new method of teaching reading, in particular, is a wonderful improvement over the old 'a-b-c' method."

Comparing the old with the new as to his pupils, Mr. Hunt said the old were better behaved but that those whom he taught in his last years in the schoolroom were more studious and ambitious. His most interesting experience found in the schoolroom was the two weeks he taught penmanship after the regular six-month term was ended—free to all who cared to attempt it. He remembers one old lady in her 70th year who could not write her name. Because of age and weather conditions, she attended only six days but during that time she learned enough to write her own name and relatives and friends. The pleasure I got from working with those children is something I cannot describe built up between us were well worth the time."
