take his chances on collecting from Keystone when and if the company is able to pay.

Keystone was placed in liquidation by Pennsylvania's Attorney General at 9:30 a.m. (CST) July 26. All Keystone property—damages and public liability insurance held by Kentucky operators was voided at that time.

Though suspension notices have been sent to Kentucky operators, the transportation division explained that technically an operator cannot be suspended without a formal hearing.

After Pennsylvania acted against Keystone, Harry B. Wilson, Kentucky insurance director, canceled the right of 109 agents in the state to do business for Keystone after it learned the company had assets of around \$7,500,000 but liabilities of \$16,000,000.

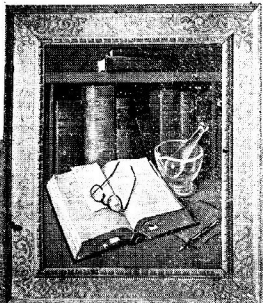

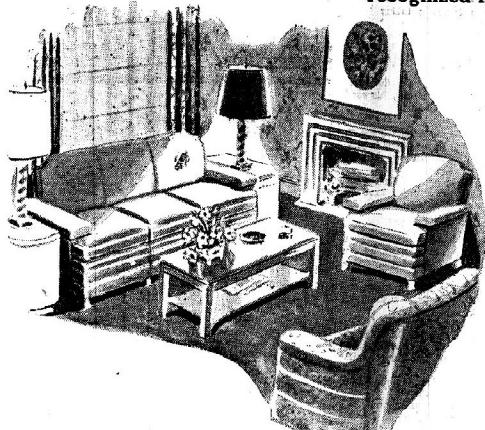

NEWS FOR THE VETERAN

VA HOSPITAL PATIENTS VIEW RELIGIOUS FILMS
The showing of religious films in Veterans Administration hospitals in Ohio, Michigan and Kentucky has become a helpful adjunct to chaplaincy work among hospitalized veterans.

Edward J. Kreenke, chief of the Chaplaincy Division for the VA's first-stag Branch Office in Columbus, Ohio, said this week religious films frequently are used in chaplaincy programs in eight VA hospitals in the three states area. An average patient attendance of 45 has been noted at film showings at Dearborn, Mich., Cleveland (Cris) Brecksville, Dayton and Chillicothe, Ohio; Lexington, Louisville and Orlando, Fla.

"Chaplains do not substitute film showings for other phases of their religious work," Chaplain Kreenke said. "Films either are incorporated in a religious service or shown in addition to regularly scheduled chapel services."

Hospital chaplains point out that the films are helpful to the particular type of patients viewing the shows and that the films respect denominational preference if shown to mixed religious groups.

"Our hospital chaplains agree that there is a definite need for the showing of religious films," Chaplain Kreenke said. "We realize the tremendous teaching power, the spiritual and even the psychological value of motion pictures."

MAJORITY OF VETERANS STUDY AT COLLEGE LEVEL
Nearly two-thirds of all veterans

in school under the G.I. Bill and the Vocational Rehabilitation Act (Public Law 16) are enrolled in institutions of higher learning, the Veterans Administration reported today. VA's definition of institutions of higher learning includes universities, colleges, professional and technical schools, teachers' colleges, normal schools and junior colleges.

URGE VETERANS TO KEEP MEDICAL APPOINTMENTS

The Veterans Administration this week urged World War II veterans in its tri-state area to keep appointments for medical or dental care which have been authorized in their respective cases by VA.

Officials at the VA's Columbus, O. Branch Office said veterans should make every effort to obtain prescribed examination or treatment within time. Broken appointments frequently cause unnecessary delays in medical or dental care.

Medical examinations must be given within the period specified on the authorizing certificate. Treatments generally are prescribed on a month-to-month basis.

Dental examinations must be given within 30 days of the date on the authorization certificate, while any subsequent treatments are scheduled by the dentist at his discretion, but within a reasonable period of time.

Under existing legislation, veterans may be furnished out-patient medical or dental care in VA clinics, in private offices of physicians or dentists or in their own homes for disabilities by VA incurred or aggravated in line of duty in active service.

Dental conditions which are regarded as service-connected are those which are shown by examination to have developed during a veteran's period of service or within one year after discontinuance.

"Home-own" examination and treatment may be authorized when VA medical or dental service is not feasibly visible. Majority of the authorized examinations and treatments are made by the "home-town" doctors and dentists, VA said.

World War II veterans who believe they are eligible for medical or dental care at government expense may make application at any VA office, presenting a discharge certificate which is either dishonorable.

QUESTIONS AND ANSWERS
Q. What is meant by a guaranty of a loan under the G.I. Bill?
A. The guaranty of a loan by VA under the provisions of the G.I. Bill is an agreement between a lender of money and VA in the event a veteran fails to pay his loan, the government will pay the guaranteed portion of the loan.
Q. If I can't meet payments on my guaranteed loan, is payment by the government a gift to me?
A. No. Payment by the government of your guaranteed loan is not a gift.

It must be repaid, and if the government passes the guaranteed part of the loan to the lender, you are obligated to the government for that part of the loan.

Q. Under what conditions is a veteran entitled to out-patient treatment from VA?
A. A veteran whose disabilities are service-connected may receive out-patient medical, surgical and dental service for service-connected diseases or injuries. Treatment may be given at a VA field station, or VA authorize it to be given by a physician or dentist in the applicant's place of residence.

Q. What is the latest date on which a veteran may begin a course of education or job-training under the G.I. Bill?
A. A course of education or job-training under the G.I. Bill may be started not later than four years after the end of the war or date of discharge, whichever is later.

Q. If I take a part-time job this summer will VA cut the amount of subsistence I receive while attending school under the G.I. Bill?
A. No, as long as your subsistence allowance and your wages do not equal more than \$200 a month if you have a dependent, or \$175 a month if you are without dependents. Your subsistence allowance may be reduced as much as necessary to keep within these limitations.

A Tribute to George P. Archer

The Bank Josephine was incorporated by Special Act of the Kentucky Legislature, Chapter 255, Acts 1880, which Act became a law February 23, 1880. The term of the charter was for 25 years, which in due time was extended for a further term of 25 years, and has now been extended for a further term of 50 years.

The bank began business on February 2, 1881, A. J. Davidson being its first cashier.

George P. Archer was the first employe of the bank after it began business, being employed on June 4, 1881. He was elected assistant cashier on February 8, 1892, cashier on June 20, 1904, which position he resigned on June 20, 1912 and to which he was re-elected on July 29, 1912, member of the Board of Directors from April 1, 1893 to June 20, 1912, and from May 7, 1920 until this date; was elected as President on February 1, 1938, continuing to hold the office of Cashier as well; on June 5, 1947 he resigned as Cashier, such resignation to be effective July 1, 1947.

During the period of Mr. Archer's employment and official connection with the bank, its growth has been substantial and progressive, as is best shown by the following comparative statements:

During the period above mentioned the country has gone through the Spanish-American War, World War I and World War II; it has weathered three major panics; the bank building was destroyed by fire on May 24, 1916, but it has always been a matter of pride to Mr. Archer and to all the officers and directors who have been associated with him in carrying on the business of the bank that, no matter what the vicissitudes have been, there has never been a time since its organization that any restriction has been placed upon the right of any depositor to withdraw any portion or the whole of his or her deposits at his or her pleasure or to have such deposits paid in cash, nor has there ever arisen a condition when the bank has failed to extend proper credit or enable any of its regular customers to save and to carry on an established business.

The responsibility of the active management of the bank has been substantially upon the shoulders of Mr. Archer for more than 66 years; he has enjoyed the confidence and respect of all who knew him, as a banker, as a sound and correct and accurate business man, as a man who could be trusted under all circumstances and under all conditions and with all matters whether personal or financial.

Many years ago the confidence of the people of Floyd county was considerably shaken as to the safety of the funds in the treasury of Floyd county; then treasurer of Floyd county; he then removed from office by the fiscal court; and the demand was spontaneous and practically unanimous from all sections of the county that Mr. Archer be named as treasurer. He came from a school of an appointment to accept such a position. His acceptance of this duty was the man of his choice; he restored confidence throughout the county.

We regret that time, age and health has impeded Mr. Archer to the extent that he is relieved from the active and important duties of Cashier, but the Board has elected W. J. May, the man of his choice, to succeed him as Cashier, a man in whose ability to fill the office the Board has unlimited confidence, and who has worked with and under Mr. Archer for a period of 35 years.

We are pleased that Mr. Archer will continue to serve the bank as its president and that he will be active in the performance of the duties of that office.

We hereby express the appreciation of the stockholders, directors and officers of the bank to Mr. Archer for his untiring and unending loyalty and interest during the long number of years he has been connected with us.

We request that a copy hereof be made a part of the records of this bank, and that a copy hereof be furnished to Mr. Archer.
