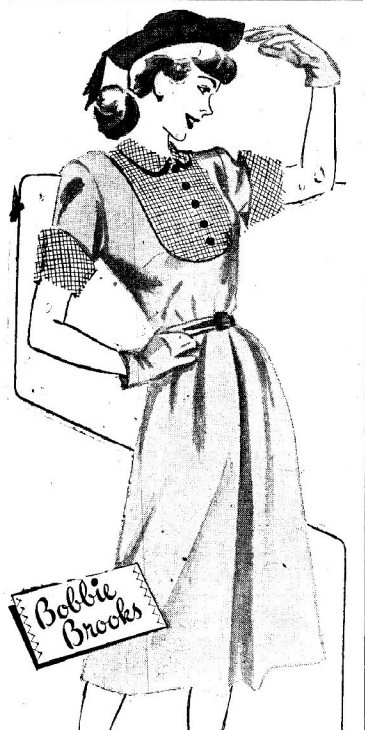

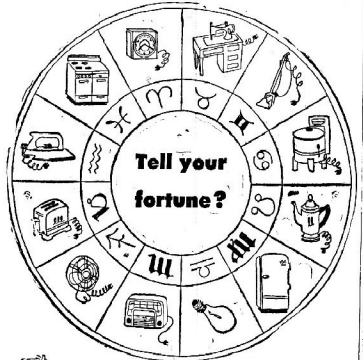

As usual in the closing days of an election many "stratagems" will be pulled—many rumors will be circulated. I've recently been asked if I have withdrawn from the race for Representative or if I have any intentions of doing so. 2. 3. To provide a House Committee appointed by the Governor and approved by the House and Senate who will consult with the representatives of the United Mine Workers and upon recommendation of those representatives to sponsor such laws as the miners see fit to enact for their own safety and benefits.
4. To sponsor laws that pertain to soil conservation, prevention of erosion and restoration of wildlife in Kentucky. To at all times be prepared to fight for legislation in which the state government will aid

the mountain farms. With proper aid and qualified advice from state employed specialists our hillside farms of Kentucky can easily become productive and provide for the farmers a steady income instead of a bare existence. With your backing, fellow voters, our hillside needs will be covered with green beans, sedge grass or ragweed but can be replaced by cover crops and other income producing crops because I intend to fight for those things we need in Floyd county. You pay taxes, so why shouldn't our state protect you?

5. To sponsor legislation in which the people of Floyd county and the mountains will be able to obtain and there is a new 1 1/2 sanatorium to be in Floyd county, not in Ashland and legislation that will prove of great aid to our underprivileged children.
6. To sponsor a law that will set aside an equalization fund for rural highways in every county so that our fiscal court will have sufficient finances to improve our roads to the extent that in winters we will not be unable to travel and roads will have surfaced rural roads to travel, and people living in the country deserve more than they have been getting—your pay taxes too.

Friends, it is not my intention to start mud slinging in this election but I must be frank and honest. I intend to mention, things that I feel that you should know about myself and my opponents. As I mentioned earlier in The Floyd County Times Mr. Biggers and Mr. Allen are good friends of mine. It is unfortunate that we are desirous of seeing our Representative at the same time.

I promise you that when elected your Representative that I will at all times be found in Floyd county and not at Glasgow, Louisville or in New Orleans as has been customary with our present Representative—the Honorable Bill Biggers. I want to remind you that I was born and reared on a mountain farm in Floyd county and did not come to Floyd county from the western part of the state as has Mr. Biggers. Jeep Caravan To Be Here At Willys Motor Sales

The Jeeps are coming to Town! A caravan of Jeeps heading the complete line of Willys-Overland equipment manufactured by Willys-Overland Motors will appear at Prestonburg on Saturday, July 26, it is announced by Ben Standler, Willys Motor Sales area distributor. Mr. Standler said demonstrations of both industrial and agricultural equipment, powered by the war-famous Jeep, will be held on that date at the Prestonburg ball park.

Community leaders and city officials, as well as farm agents, 4-H club officials, industrialists, businessmen and students, as well as the public in general, have been invited to attend the demonstrations. It will be the first time since the war that the complete line of Willys-Overland utility vehicles has been shown in this area.

The eight-vehicle caravan, headed by a Jeep fire engine, will include four Jeeps bearing various industrial and agricultural attachments, an arc welder, a generator, a compressor and a life of hydraulic lift implements designed specifically for use with the Universal Jeep in agriculture.

In addition, there will be a four-wheeled farm wagon loaded with various farm attachments for the Jeep, a four-wheeled trailer carrying chemicals to be used by the fire engine, and a Jeep Station Wagon from which demonstrations will be directed.

The caravan to visit Prestonburg is one of four similar units currently touring the United States. A unit carries eight vehicles, with a crew of 10 men, all Willys-Overland factory-trained personnel. It is estimated that the four caravans will conduct demonstrations for nearly a million people between now and September.



NEWS FOR THE VETERAN

AUG. 1 DEADLINE FOR TWO G.I. INSURANCE BENEFITS
Although the time for reinstating lapsed National Service Life Insurance has been extended to next January 1, Veterans Administration this week emphasized that Aug. 1, 1947 still remains the deadline for applying for two other insurance benefits.

The first concerns veterans who may be entitled to waiver of premium payments because of total disability existing for six or more consecutive months. Waiver in such cases generally is made effective from the date the period of disability commenced, but not more than one year before VA's receipt of the insured's application for waiver.

If application is ready by Aug. 1, however, and entitlement to waiver is established, it may be made effective from the beginning of the disability period as far back as Aug. 1, 1941, and premiums paid while the insured was totally disabled will be refunded.

After next August 1, waiver of premiums paid more than a year from date of application will be granted only in special cases where it can be shown that the insured was unable to apply within the time limit.

The other deadline affects beneficiaries of deceased NSLI policyholders who, prior to death either in service or after discharge, became eligible for waiver of premiums but never applied. Such beneficiaries may claim refund of waived premiums during the insured's total disability extending as far back as August, 1941. If application, with evidence of the insured's right to waiver, is made by August 1 of this year.

After that date, waiver normally will not be granted for any premium which was due over a year from the insured's death, and the beneficiary must apply within that time. Exception is made where the

beneficiary is incompetent or a minor, in which case application must be filed within one year from removal of legal barrier.

Forms and assistance in applying for these benefits prior to the August 1 deadline are available at any VA office.

TRI-STATE VETS REPAY \$9,000,000 IN G.I. LOANS

World War II veterans in Ohio, Michigan and Kentucky have repaid in full 2,287 loans amounting to \$9,139,843 which they had borrowed for home, farm and business purposes under the guaranty provisions of the G. I. Bill, the Veterans Administration tri-state branch office in Columbus, O., reported recently.

Repayment includes 2,168 loans amounting to \$6,447,137; Michigan, 532 loans totaling \$1,734,524; Kentucky, 587 loans for \$85,182.

Since inception of the G. I. loan program, financial agencies have made more than 85,000 loans to veterans in the three states. In Ohio, 45,200 loans have aggregated more than \$291,838,000. Michigan veterans have negotiated 23,300 loans totaling \$185,555,000. In Kentucky, 8,600 loans have been made in the amount of \$48,400,000. Ninety-two per cent of the loans have been for homes.

AMPUTEES IN THREE STATES GIVEN 1,838 VEHICLES
A total of 1,838 disabled veterans of World War II in Ohio, Michigan and Kentucky had acquired automobile vehicles at government expense through June 30 under the "aid to amputees" program of the Veterans Administration reports.

The total included 801 in Ohio, 703 in Michigan and 234 in Kentucky. Average cost of each vehicle was \$1,588.

Most of the eligible veterans have purchased automobiles, VA said, although some have selected trucks, jeeps, station wagons and tractors. Most of the vehicles have been fitted with special attachments to facilitate operation by the individual veteran despite his disability.

The law, which became effective last September, provides a \$1,000 car or other transportation for those who in service lost or lost the use of, one or both legs at or above the ankle. The law originally expired June 30, but has been extended by Congress until June 30, 1948. Application forms are available at all VA offices.

VETERAN ENROLLMENT DIPS AFTER TWO-YEAR RISE

The number of World War II veterans enrolled in schools and colleges in Ohio, Michigan and Kentucky declined sharply during June, marking the first time in two years that the steady increase in veteran enrollment had been checked.

The Veterans Administration tri-state branch office in Columbus, O., this week reported 96,683 veterans were enrolled in Ohio on July 1 under educational provisions of both the G. I. (Public Law 346) and the Vocational Rehabilitation Act for Disabled Veterans (Public Law 16), compared with 106,097 veterans enrolled on June 1. In Michigan, the enrollment on July 1 was 76,450, compared with 85,340 on June 1. The veteran enrollment in Kentucky on July 1 totaled 22,462, compared with 27,586 on June 1.

Many of the veterans who have terminated their education for the summer months are expected to resume their studies in the fall, when VA anticipates a new all-time high in veteran enrollment.

Despite the June decline in veteran attendance at schools and colleges, the number of veterans taking post-war training in the three states increased 3,314 during the month, totaling 78,504 on July 1, including 45,911 in Ohio, 19,385 in Michigan and 10,908 in Kentucky.

QUESTIONS AND ANSWERS
Q. I receive compensation for injuries incurred in service. Do I have to show the amount of compensation I receive in making out my income tax report?
A. Yes. It is unnecessary to show pension or compensation payments in a income tax report.

Q. Under what circumstances can I claim that my parents are dependents?
A. Dependency will be held to exist if your parents do not have an income sufficient to provide reasonable maintenance for themselves and members of their family under legal age.

Q. I draw permanent total disability compensation because of injuries due to service. Will I continue to draw my compensation if I move to Australia?
A. Yes. Residence has no bearing on compensation entitlement.

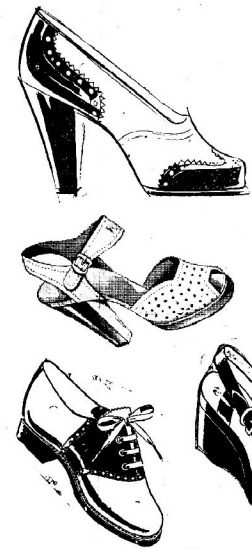

KENTUCKY ON THE MARCH

By EWING GALLOWAY

Industrial growth is largely a state of mind. This is especially true in Kentucky, where indifference, even hostility in some instances, has held back and towns in such states as Alabama and Georgia get ahead of us.

Our state has too many people who oppose industrial growth because they think it is liable to disturb their quiet and sometimes among community life, and then there are the industrialists in the smaller cities who do all they can, on the quiet usually, to keep new factories out because of fear of competition in the local labor market.

In his report on manufacturing for the Committee for Kentucky Dr. Scott Hall, economics professor at Transylvania College, gives us a hopeful paragraph on Kentucky's industrial state of mind.

"The attitude of Kentuckians toward manufacturing varies," says Dr. Hall. "Some people are lukewarm, fearing increased wages for farm and other labor, unskilled plants, a 'foreign' element, unemployment and relief costs during depression, and a brood with out agrarian heritage. But more people appear favorable. New plants are usually exempted from city taxes for a five-year period and occasionally a building is furnished on a subsidized basis."

On a recent tour of the Deep South I couldn't help visiting such cities as Macon, Columbus, Rome, Gadsden, Decatur, Huntsville, Florence and Montgomery with Kentucky's medium-sized cities, such as Lexington, Owensboro, Henderson, Paducah and Bowling Green. The cities "way down south" have just about doubled their size in the last decade, and their growth has been due almost wholly to industrial development. Cheap electricity from the TVA is a big factor in bringing big factories to northern Alabama cities, but generally the progress of Alabama and Georgia can be accounted for by a state of mind. The people see industrial growth as their greatest hope.

The industrialization of these two states has not disturbed the peaceful lives of deep-rooted and well-to-do families as these complacent folks fear it would. Nor has it robbed the plantations of their labor. The drift of the sharecropper population to factory towns has been offset by mechanization of agriculture. And so far as I can learn few if any factory owners have had cause to complain that rivals have raided their labor supply.

Really the opposition to new factories in Kentucky towns and cities is groundless. Stock fears are almost 100 per cent imaginary.
