Watkins Says New Board Expedites Legal Action Against Road Employees

Frankfort, Ky., July 31 (Sp.)—Too many law suits are being directed against employees of the highway department which could be handled by Kentucky's new Board of Claims, J. Stephen Watkins, commissioner of the department, said today commenting on a bulletin being distributed to division directors and district engineers for the department. Persons have claims against the department not exceeding \$1,000 involving negligence in the construction, reconstruction, maintenance and policing of the highways can now obtain action through the new board authorized in the 1946 session of the General Assembly.

"Many people who have small claims against the department are not informed relative to the new board," Mr. Watkins said. "Prior to its creation, to sue the state it was necessary to obtain the sanction of the General Assembly. Some suits have been filed making individual employees of the department defendants. Claims bring inwards of one hundred and eighty thousand dollars of the new board.

"Frequently accidents happen where the agencies and yet the employees are such that the employee should not be the subject of a suit," Mr. Watkins said. "He should be required to appear as a defendant in an action at law by reason of the accident.

The bulletin urges heads of divisions and districts to acquaint all personnel under their supervision with the provisions of the new law.

continuing the fight for the people. Both standard bearers for November are men experienced in government and politics. Clemente now is serving his second term in Congress from the Second District. He was in the State Senate in 1942 and 1944, and was a major leader for the last session. He has been sheriff, judge, and clerk of county court.

Dunnitt is attorney general in the Administration of Governor Simon Willis, and has practiced law for 25 years. He has been state commander of the American Legion, and president of Optimist International.

Each candidate is 50 years old, each studied at the University of Kentucky.

The two opponents for lieutenant governor will be Lawrence Weatherby, Louisville attorney, Democrat, and Orville M. Howard, Harlan, Republican. Howard was commissioner of revenue until he resigned to make the race running mate to Williams. He was the only winning member of the Williams slate.

For secretary of state, the race in November will be between E. E. Hughes, Smithland, Republican, George Glenn Hatcher or Miss Adams. Hatcher and Miss Adams are running neck and neck and the outcome will be in doubt until the last precincts are counted. Miss Adams was assistant secretary of state, and Hatcher was Secretary of State from 1939 to 1943.

The race for Treasurer will be between two Louisville men—Edward F. Seiler, Democrat and C. A. Moine, Republican.

H. E. Kinser, Brownsville, is the Republican nominee for auditor, but the race still is in doubt on the Democratic side between Harry N. Jones, Lexington, and June L. Suter, Warsaw.

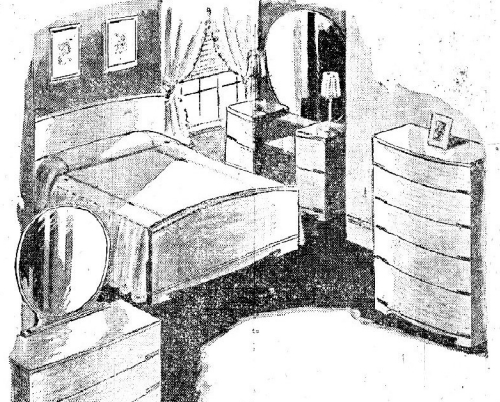

less than a dollar per acre. He said hoping by hand to remove the weeds would have cost about \$10 an acre.

Some 20 leading U. S. Department of Agriculture and State university agriculturalists visited Henderson county to inspect the results.

Dr. Othmer H. Adgren of Rutgers University predicted the day may not be far off when it will be possible to grow corn without cultivation.

He envisioned the planting of corn from the front end of a tractor and at the same time, eradicating the crop against weeds with spray equipment on the rear of the machine.

He said it also could be possible to use the corn rows closer, if the need for cultivating machines were eliminated increasing the yield per acre.

Dr. David L. Taylor of the University said he found root structures of corn plants in treated fields healthier than those of untreated fields. He predicted an increase in yield of 20 per cent over corn in fields that had not been sprayed.

Highway Department Warns Sign Owners Of Proposed Action

Owners of billboards signs or buildings erected to encroach upon the state highway rights-of-way are to be warned that such structures will be removed by the state at the owners' expense.

Stephen Watkins, Commissioner of the Department of Highways, said this week. Encroachment is only permitted in cases where sufficient right-of-way is available to prevent obstruction of view in the interest of traffic safety.

In a number of recent cases he has found that people have erected signs, billboards and even three-story buildings on the state's right-of-ways.

Mr. Watkins said it is the policy of the department to permit temporary structures where sight-distances are not impaired, but such structures must be made by our own staff of engineers before the sign is started.

Those who contemplate building dwellings, stores, gas-station, billboards or the erection of signs along the highway should first determine the property lines. A permit will not be granted for encroachment on the state's right-of-ways unless the circumstances warrant.
