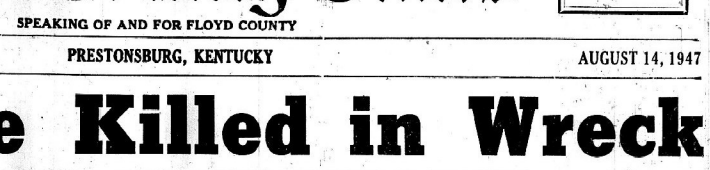

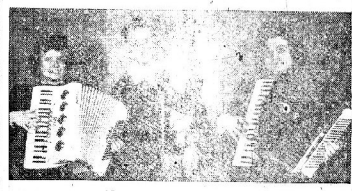



Driver License Check In Kentucky To Start Friday, Announcement
Frankfort, Ky., Aug. 12.—Col. Hayward Gilliam, director of the State Highway Patrol, announced today a check-up on drivers' licenses will start Friday.
Drivers found without proper licenses may be subjected to fines from \$2 to \$500 and imprisonment up to six months, he said.
Gilliam said terms of many insurance policies nullify protection if the licensed driver does not have a proper permit. "It is also very often considered in evidence against the driver in case of accident when he is not properly licensed," the Colonel said.
The Attorney General today issued two opinions on motor-vehicle operator licenses.
Ocho L. Compton, Phil. Casey county, was advised an operator's license issued by West Virginia is good for 90 days in Kentucky and that West Virginia recognizes Kentucky licenses for 90 days. A holder of a West Virginia license in Kentucky must get a Kentucky license after the 90 days expire, the opinion said.

Veterans May Get Disability Insurance

Many Veterans of Floyd county who hold G.I. insurance are not aware that they may be insured against total disability. Estel L. McKinney, of the Veterans Administration Office here, said.

Total disability income benefits authorized by legislation may be added to any plan of G.I. insurance upon application, proof of good disability coverage range from six to six months. Premium rates for disability coverage range from six rate of \$5 a month for each \$1,000 of insurance, depending on the insured's age and type of policy.

The disability benefits are at the rate of \$5 a month for each \$1,000 of insurance and are payable after the veteran has been totally disabled continuously for six months or more. The monthly benefits will continue to be paid as long as the insured remains totally disabled. The disability must commence, however, before the veteran's 60th birthday and while the policy is in force.

One of the principal features of the new disability benefit is that the face value of the veteran's policy will not be reduced by any disability payments he might receive.

Mr. McKinney said veterans with service-connected disabilities less than the total in degree are not prevented from taking advantage of the new provisions, provided they apply for it before Jan. 1, 1950. In these cases, such disabilities are waived if they are the only bar to meeting the health requirements.

Veterans were reminded they have until Aug. 1, 1947 to re-evaluate G.I. term insurance by submitting a comparative health statement and by paying two monthly premiums, regardless of how long their policies have been lapsed.

Detailed information on all phases of G.I. insurance is available at the VA office, Midland building, Prestonsburg.

Parking Meters, If Too Lucrative, Can Nullify Law

A parking meter ordinance that brings in an excessive surplus is actually an invalid revenue measure, the Attorney General's office said this week.

A city may install parking meters and exact fees which cover only costs of operating the parking system, the office said. Any small surplus existing at the end of the fiscal year can be used in liquidating other legitimate expenses and obligations of the city, it added.

The opinion was written for Lou H. Preston, City Clerk of Paintsville, who wondered if parking fee surpluses could be put in a special fund for the purchase of fire-fighting equipment.

The levying of parking fees is not for general revenue purposes, the opinion said.

Allen, Ky., Aug. 11 (SpL)—The Rev. Wm. T. Darr, pastor of the Allen Baptist Church, announced in his services Sunday that a new Baptist Church will be organized in Martin on the afternoon of August 24.

Baptists have already opened a full church program in Martin, with Sunday School and preaching each Sunday afternoon at 1:30, and preaching again each Tuesday night. At present, they are in a revival meeting with the Rev. Ralph Webb, of Paintsville, as evangelist.

The meeting place for both the regular and revival services is the Martin high school auditorium. The Reverend Darr emphasizes that all are invited and visitors from other denominations are always welcome.

TIDBITS OF KENTUCKY FOLKLORE

CHICKEN HAWKS AND TOM PAINE

IN No. 593 of this series of essays I spoke of not having had a single curt or discourteous letter from the people who read what I write. Then in 570 I spoke a good word for most of the hawks and in 571 praised the much-misunderstood Tom Paine for his help to America when it needed a good fighter. Those two unpopular things touched off the fireworks for some reader who forgot to sign his name to my one unpleasant bit of correspondence about "Tidbits of Kentucky Folklore." Thus I cannot write him directly, but I will speak here, hoping that he and others may try to get a few new ideas of their own and not forever quote some legend or tradition that was disproved for reasonable people ages ago.

Folk prejudices are about the hardest of all to eradicate. If Grandfather usually believed something, often that is proof enough of its validity, without any further investigation or thinking. You see, Grandfather was a big man in his time, and big men think big things. It is true that he had no screen on his house and felt that doctors were wrong in attributing malaria to mosquitoes; he often, on Sunday afternoons, when the neighbors asserted for a visit, said that the Bible very plainly regarded slavery as right; he had never been twenty miles from home in his life; his education was less than a good eighth-grade one. All this is beside the point, for he was the grandfather of the offended person, and was, therefore, a sort of super-man, who knew all the answers or at least the answers to all questions that ought to be asked. By the same reasoning, why labor to buy modern things, for poor old Grandfather, with all his wisdom, did not have them for the simple reason that they did not exist or were not for sale near his part of the woods?

Every true-born American loves to preach. I am in no sense a fornicator. But I have always been slightly opposed to preaching that is to direct. In the first place, such preaching usually meets ears that are already stopped to the remembered phrases and are not likely to open. Long ago I tried to wrap up some of my preachments in unassuming wrappings and have them unexpectedly explode right under the nose of the fellow who was on guard against the standard or garden variety of preaching. Maybe that is playing the game against the rules, but what better place to laugh at your foibles and mine than in a perfectly disinterested column whose author expects no rewards, material or otherwise?

Long ago I tried to wrap up some of my preachments in unassuming wrappings and have them unexpectedly explode right under the nose of the fellow who was on guard against the standard or garden variety of preaching. Maybe that is playing the game against the rules, but what better place to laugh at your foibles and mine than in a perfectly disinterested column whose author expects no rewards, material or otherwise?

What I'm trying to say in this little sermon is that it is a short-sighted person who imagines that he is far removed from the folk; he is right in the midst of folk thinking, folk habits, folk words and phrases.

High-and-mighty airs become none of us who live in any part of the state that I have seen; by searching you might find some of the mad from Fidelity mud on your shoes.

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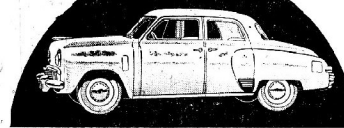

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Inspectors Recommend Lackey Mine Changes
 Safer timbering and haulage conditions, together with several improvements in electrical installations, are recommended for the Evans Elkhorn Coal Company's Lackey No. 8 mine at Lackey, in a Federal coal mine inspection report released by the Bureau of Mines. This mine employed 18 men and was producing 150 tons of coal daily when the initial Government inspection was completed in June by Russell Shaw.

The adherence to the standards of the Federal Mine Safety Code, Inspector Shaw recommended uniform use of safety posts at the working faces, removal or support of all loose roof, clean crosscuts for use as shelter holes and unobstructed clearances along haulageways, enclosed top lights, and effective blocking of all standing cars. To minimize electrical fire and shock hazards, he proposed insulators for trolley power wires, guards for surface trolley lines, and fuse and ground-current protection for electrical equipment.

Several safety improvements made during or immediately following the inspection were commended by the inspector, including the installation of prefabricated examinations of the mine for hazards, removal of coal-dust accumulations from the trolley and haulageways, good rock-busting, elevation of the transformers, a guard for the exposed shaft of the rotary converter, and covers for repair pits.

NO. 1 OF A SERIES
 The Kentucky State Employment Service, assisted by World War II veterans about G. I. home loans were announced today by Veterans Administration.

VA compiled the queries in a survey of the beneficiaries who have learned how much veterans know about their Federal benefits.

The questions and answers follow:
 Q. Where should a veteran go to get a home loan?
 A. He first must find a bank or savings and loan association or other private lenders willing to make the loan.

Q. Where does the Veterans Administration come in?
 A. VA guarantees up to \$4,000, but no more than half the loan made by the private lender to the veteran. This guaranty helps protect the lender from loss. VA does not lend money to the veterans.

Q. How much can the veteran borrow?
 A. As much as the lender is willing to loan. But the maximum VA guarantee will be \$4,000.

Q. What are some of the advantages of a G. I. Home loan to the veteran?
 A. (1) Because of the VA guaranty, the lender is more willing to make a loan; (2) the VA guaranty encourages the lender to make the loan without requiring a down payment; and (3) the interest rate (4 percent maximum) is low.

Q. Does the veteran also get a gratuity payment of some kind?
 A. Yes. VA pays to the lender, for every dollar the veteran borrows, an amount equal to 4 percent of the principal portion of the loan. For example, if the guaranteed portion is \$3,000, the lender will receive \$120 from VA to credit to the debt of the veteran.

Q. Must the veteran have cash to make a down payment?
 A. No. But if a down payment is required by the lender, it will not prevent the veteran from obtaining a guaranteed loan.

Q. Who pays the appraiser's fee?
 A. The veteran. This fee usually is about \$10 or \$20.

Q. Can a veteran join with a non-veteran to buy a two-family home?
 A. Yes, if provided the veteran's interest is properly protected to prevent any loss to him in event the non-veteran defaults.

Q. How about a loan where the FHA insures the first mortgage for only 20 percent of the price of the house and the veteran wishes to borrow additional money to cover the balance?
 A. VA can guaranty a secondary loan for the balance, provided the secondary loan does not exceed 20 percent of the purchase price.

Q. Can a veteran repay all or part of his loan at any time during the life of the loan?
 A. Yes, and without paying any fee or premium.

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

**Navy Chief Named 'Squealer'
On Comrades to Nipponese**

New York, July 22—Chief Signalman Harold E. Hirschberg, 29, of Brooklyn, was accused today at his navy court martial of being involved in the death of an American army private who allegedly was trampled by Japanese guards after the war in the Philippines in 1944. The soldier was named at the trial as George Garrett. No address was given.
Hirschberg, the first World War I enlisted man to be tried on charges of mistreating prisoners of war in Japanese camps, pleaded innocent to all nine specifications.
The first prosecution witness, Army Capt. Richard T. Pullen, who was a prisoner with the defendant at Nielson Field near Manila, testified that Hirschberg told him he had a Japanese wife whom he married in Hong Kong before the war.
Hirschberg said he had two children by the Japanese wife and that his Japanese guards permitted him to communicate with her. Pullen said Hirschberg's American wife and child live in Brooklyn.
The prosecution charged that Hirschberg reported to the Japanese, March 1, 1944, that Garrett was planning to escape from the camp. The army private (thereupon was tortured for three days and died, the judge advocate said.
The specification that the Japanese guards starved Garrett, struck him about the head and body with clubs, rifle butts, straps and files, placed a hose in his mouth and filled his stomach with water, then laid him on the ground and jumped on him.
In the other specifications, Hirschberg was accused of telling the Japanese of escape plans of two other army privates, William B. Hill and John L. Baker, both of whom then were beaten and starved by the Japanese.
The defendant was also charged with assaulting his American soldiers and sailors at Nielson Field between November 10, 1942 and June 1, 1943, while he was head of a work section.
