Moore said he learned the three had been drinking heavily before the fight.

Says Chestnut Tree May Be on Way Back

The famous chestnut tree, killed several years ago by a blight, may be on its way back, says W. E. Jackson, extension forester for the University of Kentucky College of Agriculture and Home Economics. Reports are being received of chestnut trees 35 feet tall and five inches in diameter which have grown up as sprouts from trees killed by the blight. Some of the sprouts are eight to 10 years old.
There is a possibility, thinks Professor Jackson, that the chestnut sprouts are developing a resistance to the blight, and eventually will survive and make trees again. At first sprouts were killed by the disease, but eventually they began to survive, although most of them bear the canker of the blight.

College Says Plant More Cover Crops

Plant cover crops and more cover crops.
That's the advice given farmers by the University of Kentucky's College of Agriculture and Home Economics.
Stating that cover crops would protect the soil, furnish winter feed, and save labor, the college's agriculturalists suggested the following crops and gave latest date for safe seeding:
Crimson clover, September 15; ryegrass, September 15; winter oats, October 1; vetch, October 1 to October 15; barley, October 5; wheat, November 1; and rye, November 1 to November 15. Wheat and barley should not be seeded until frost-free danger is past.
Recommended seeding rates for best results are:
Crimson clover, 12 to 20 pounds per acre; vetch, 15 to 40 pounds; winter oats, 1 1/2 to 3 bushels; barley, 1 1/2 to 2 bushels; rye, 1 to 2 bushels; ryegrass, 15 to 30 pounds; and wheat, 1 to 2 bushels.
More pasture and better protection come from heavy seedings, the University report said. Lighter seedings may do it, no stock are run in the fields.
A good seed-bed, careful seeding, and proper covering may mean the difference between success and failure, the specialists declared. Early seeding crops especially need good covering, they pointed out.
Fertilizers and lime materials for winter cover crops usually pay and farmers were advised to check the fertility of their soil before seeding cover crops.

Letcher Track Mines Start Production Under Price-Increase Pact

Whitesburg, Ky., Aug. 14—A trickle of coal began flowing from five Letcher county track-coal mines today, but a full settlement of the dispute between track-mine operators and ramp owners failed to materialize.
Luther Bates, operator of the Star-Elkhorn coal mine, one of the five mines producing, said about 1,000 of the track miners were back on the job following agreement of five ramp owners to pay the operators higher tonnage rates on the coal loaded at their mines.
Bates estimated production from the five mines at about 10,000 tons daily.
It was the first production in 10 days. Four ramp owners agreed yesterday to price increases ranging from 25 to 31 cents a ton and to other concessions, partly breaking a nine-day strike of about 375 operators in Letcher county.
Bates identified mines which were operating as the Star-Elkhorn, which he operates, E. K. Elkhorst, Cooley-Elkhorst, Mayking and P.D., all near Whitesburg.
He said there were indications that other ramp owners would "come across" within the next few days.

Defense and Victory Medals To Be Delivered To Local Navy Veterans

The distribution of American Defense Medals and World War II Victory Medals in all towns and cities in which traveling recruiters from the Navy Recruiting Station, Huntington, W. Va., will be announced here today (Thursday) by Chief Petty Officer W. R. Corckill, U.S.N. Any ex navy man or woman eligible for these medals can get them at the postoffice building when Chief Corckill is in Prestonsburg.
Chief Corckill will be at the postoffice building from 10 a.m. to 3 p.m. every Thursday.
The American Defense Medal is awarded for service in the armed forces during World War II. Only ex-navy men are able to receive their medals in this manner, since distribution of the medals to ex members of the army, marine corps and coast guard is made by their respective service.

The Veterans Authority put on this week's issue the 10 questions most frequently asked by World War II veterans as to G.I. business loans. The questions were asked in a survey that VA conducted recently.

to learn how much the veteran knows about their federal benefits. The questions and answers follow:

Q. How does a veteran go about getting a loan for business purposes?

A. As in the case of home loans, the first must find a bank or other private lender willing to advance the money.

Q. How much of a business loan made by a lender will VA guarantee?

A. VA will guarantee 50 per cent of the loan up to a maximum of \$1,000 if the loan is for the purchase of business real property, and up to \$2,000 for a general retail business loan, such as for working capital.

Q. Can the veteran get a guaranteed loan for any type of business?

A. If the lender is willing, the loan may be used for any legitimate business purpose.

Q. Is there any limit to the duration of a business loan?

A. Non-real estate business loans are repayable in 10 years or less; real estate loans may run up to 25 years.

Q. Can a veteran enter into business with non-veterans and obtain a guaranteed loan?

A. Yes, provided the interest of the veteran in property mortgaged, but the guarantee must be limited to the veteran's portion of the business.

Q. Doesn't the veteran also get a gratuity payment of some kind?

A. Yes, VA pays the lender for credit to the veteran's loan, an amount equal to 4 per cent of the guaranteed portion of the loan. For example, if the guaranteed portion is \$3,000, the lender will receive \$120 from VA to credit to the debt of the veteran.

Q. What interest rates are lenders permitted to charge on business loans?

A. In most cases, 4 per cent is the maximum. However, the interest rate may be slightly higher for certain types of insured loans.

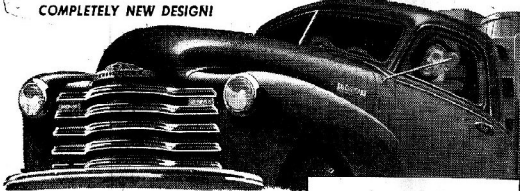

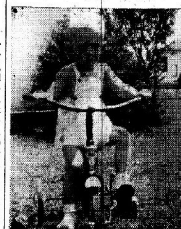

## Referendum Act Legality Is Hit

The legal fight to prevent pulling up on the question of calling a convention to revise Kentucky's constitution began this week.  
Clarence Noel Gimes, Frankfort, a retired army officer, filed suit in Franklin circuit court attacking constitutionally of the legislative act providing for the referendum and also sought an injunction to prevent Charles K. O'Connor, secretary of State, from advertising the convention question.  
But shortly after Gimes filed the petition, O'Connor sent advertisements to the Courier-Journal and the Lexington Leader, requesting the newspapers to print them for four consecutive days.  
The ad tells voters they may ballot yes or no on November 4 as to whether they favor the calling of a constitutional convention.  
Games' petition contended the 1944 and 1946 acts failed to specify how the Secretary of State should advertise the question. It also charged that the titles of both acts are defective and that their contents are different.

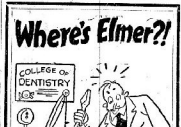

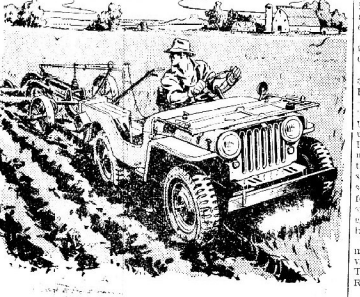
