LEXINGTON, Ky., Aug. 25 (S.A.)—One teacher of vocational agriculture in Floyd county is carrying taking a special course in the University of Kentucky Division of Vocational Education. Dr. Corvus Hawkins, head of the U. K. Department of Agricultural Education, announced this week.

Eight Miners Killed In State Last Month, One in Floyd County

LEXINGTON, Ky., Aug. 25 (S.A.)—The Department of Mines and Minerals reported today that eight miners were killed in July, bringing the casualties for the past seven months to 77.

Seven of the deaths were caused by roof or slate falls. Three deaths were reported in Harlan county, two in Pike and one each in Pike, Mingo, and Knott counties.

At the same time last year there had been 57 fatal accidents. Nine miners were killed in July, 1946.

The department also announced that five of the accidents would be held Aug. 20 at Hazard and Madisonville, Sept. 13 at Harlan, Sept. 20 at South Williamson and Middletown, and Sept. 27 at Pikeville.

An examination for mine firemen will be held Sept. 3 and 6 at Middletown. Students receive that among requirements a 50-foot must have a minimum of five years mining experience.

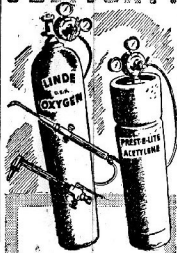

Veterans Administration Approves On-Job Training In Fifteen State Counties

A total of 292 establishments has been approved for veterans on-the-job training in Floyd and 14 other counties served by the Mayo State Vocational School, according to an announcement made by James L. Patton, director of the school. One hundred seventy-nine veterans are currently enrolled at the school.

Mr. Patton, in discussing the service of the Mayo State Vocational School, stated that his school had been assigned the task of inspecting and supervising all on-the-job programs for veterans in the 15 counties, including apprenticeship training.

Standards for such apprentice training must be registered with the state or federal training before any establishments can be approved to offer apprentice training on the job. Final approval of applications of establishments that desire to offer on-the-job training to veterans will be made by the State Department of Education at Frankfort.

Kentucky's 12-credit trade schools, of which the Mayo State Vocational School is one, now have approximately 1,800 veterans enrolled in trade training courses in the schools.

He and his family will establish residence in the Ohio town.

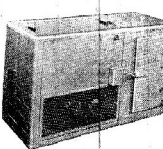

INFORMATION OF INTEREST TO VETERANS

(No 3 of a series)
Veterans Administration this week answered the 10 questions most frequently asked by World War I veterans about National Service Life Insurance in a recent VA survey. The questions and answers follow:

Q. How can a G.I. policy offer so many advantages for so low a premium?
A. Because the government assumes all costs of administration and of extra hazards due to military and naval service. Also, there is no charge calculated in the premium for those engaged in hazardous occupations, or for the waiver of premiums in case of total disability for six consecutive months or more.

Q. When will I start getting dividends on my NSLI?
A. Dividends will be paid as soon as the administrative work of determining the amount due each participant can be accomplished.

Q. When will I receive a regular insurance policy instead of my certificate?
A. Policy forms are being drafted to include changes made necessary by recent insurance legislation designed to make NSLI fit the present needs of veterans. They will be distributed when the VA branch offices can handle the extra work without interfering with their primary purpose of giving service to those who are keeping their insurance in force.

Q. Why do I have to pay two monthly premiums when I restate my lapsed policy?
A. One premium is for the 31 day grace period following the date of lapse, during which the insurance was continued in force without payment of premium; the other premium is for the current month of the reinstatement.

Q. What is the difference between TERM INSURANCE and CONVERTIBLE INSURANCE?
A. Term insurance provides the same protection for a specified period to the insured's beneficiaries in the event of death, as does converted insurance. However, term insurance accrues no cash loan or paid-up insurance values, as do the permanent, life and endowment plans.

Q. Can I choose anyone I wish to be my beneficiary?
A. Yes. There is no restriction in your choice of a beneficiary.

Q. Can I use part of my Armed Forces leave bond to pay my insurance?
A. No. The remainder of your bond is placed to your credit until such time as it becomes payable in cash, or you authorize further premium payments from the balance to your credit.

Q. Why do I lose all that money I paid on my term policy while I was in the armed forces when I convert my insurance?
A. You don't lose it. While your insurance was in force, you received insurance protection against death at a very low rate. Term insurance is intended to provide no more than that.

Q. How can I tell the due date on my premium?
A. In those cases where regular payments are being made, the date your premium payment is due is shown on each remittance envelope mailed by VA to policyholders. If you are not receiving these envelopes, you will find on your insurance certificate the effective date of your policy. The date of the month on which your insurance is effective is the monthly due date for each premium.

Q. Can I convert my NSLI policy to some of the private companies?
A. No. Your National Service Life Insurance (term plan) is convertible to one or more of the six permanent plans issued by VA. These are Ordinary Life, 20-Year Payment Life, 20-Year Endowment, Endowment at Age 65, and Endowment at Age 60.

TAXPAYERS

Many of you have not listed your property for taxation. It is your duty to do this before Sept. 1, 1947. Please attend to this duty at once.

Following is copy of the law governing listing of property for taxation purposes:

Date of assessment of property; when, where and by whom listed; in whose name assessed.

(1) All taxable property and all interest in taxable property shall be assessed and valued as of July 1 of each year unless otherwise provided by law. It shall be the duty of all persons owning or having any interest in taxable property in this state to file with the county tax commissioner of the county where it is located, except as otherwise provided by law, all persons in whose name property is properly assessed shall remain liable for the tax notwithstanding they may have sold or parted with it.

(2) Real property or any interest therein shall be listed in the county or district where it is located by the owner of the freehold estate therein, and it shall be assessed without reference to conflicting title. If the owner fails to list the property, the county tax commissioner may swear witnesses in order to ascertain the person in whose name to make the list.

(3) Real property shall be assessed in the name of the owner, if ascertainable by the tax commissioner otherwise in the name of the occupant, if ascertainable, and otherwise in the name of the undivided real estate of any deceased person may be assessed to the heirs of such person, without designating them by name.

Another drier, another stocky eight footer, intends to play a lot of guard this fall and has indicated that he will work hard at his practice. Jack Crawford, a 120-pound Sophomore tackle and end, has already developed the unique manner of blocking for the "T" formation. With some additional weight, he should go a long way on the gridiron. Kyle Chaffin, a 115-pound end, is reputed to be the rookie of the year. He only weighs 115 pounds but has already served notice to the big lard boys that he can well handle them any time and any place. He is smart, tough as a nickel steak and has the desire to play. It is my belief that Howard Burchett, rough tough end, will agree that Chaffin is no man to fool with... even in dummy scrimmages. Frank Lemaster, a newcomer to the fold, is a fast guard, light, smart and loves to play the game.

Pre-season indications are only a point of view of the appearance of the men on the field and the true value and worth of the individual cannot be determined until actual physical contact during scrimmages. With the many scrimmages in the near future, a much better idea of the men's abilities will be had.

Three Typhoid Cases Reported on Mud Cr., Brings Total to Five

Three typhoid cases reported from a comparatively segregated community brought the total number of persons to contract the disease in the county this year to five. Dr. Marvin Rauscher, director of the Floyd County Health Department, said last week.

The new cases are all confined to one family on the Spider Hill branch of Mud Creek where Rod Hall, 62, fell ill August 12, and later his son, Clarence, 35, and his daughter, Jessie, 26, were stricken.

Dr. Rauscher said he had been unable to identify the source of the disease but that he had immunized residents of the entire neighborhood.

The two previous cases reported were at Whitesburg and were classified as "vacation cases"—the result of diseases contracted while on a fishing trip. These cases were reported more than a month ago.
