Probst Is Successor Of Lathon As Social Security Field Man

Horace J. Godbey, manager of the Social Security Administration's field office in Ashland, has announced that Harry Probst is the representative of his office now on full-time duty in Floyd and Pike counties. Probst replaced Thomas Lathon, who recently resigned from government service. The new representative is a World War II veteran, and has been with the Social Security Administration about seven years.

The Social Security representative will be at the Prestonsburg post office, the second and fourth Tuesdays of each month, and at the Wayland postoffice the first Tuesday of each month. Those who wish to call on Mr. Probst in Pikeville may see him at the Pikeville postoffice on any Monday, Thursday or Friday.

Mr. Godbey explained that his office administers federal old-age and survivors insurance. Under this program workers in industry build monthly cash insurance benefits that are payable to the insured worker and qualified members of his family when he reaches age 65 and retires; likewise, to eligible survivors of the insured worker when he dies at any age. Stressing the fact that no benefit can be paid until an application for it has been filed, Mr. Godbey urged all persons who believe they may be qualified to come in and discuss the immediate filing of claims. The next visit to Prestonsburg by the Social Security representative will be on Oct. 14.

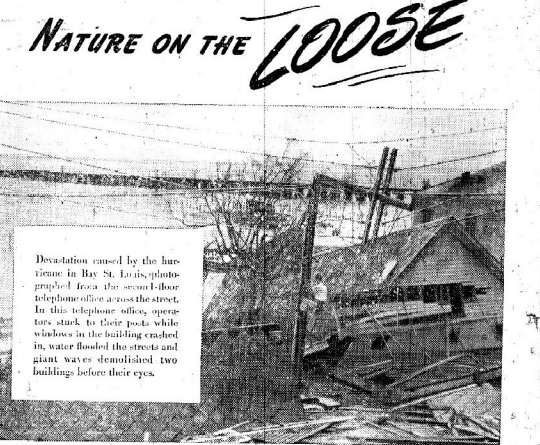
