**No. 4 Vote May Decide Congressman's Fate**

Washington, Oct. 4.—The fate of one of Kentucky's Congressional districts may hang on the political complexion of the State Administration which is elected Nov. 4.

The new Governor will be in office in 1951 when the Census Bureau reports the population figures gathered in the 1950 census—the first nationwide census to follow the widespread shifts and migrations of World War II. And the party in power can control any re-districting that may be necessary.

If the census were taken today, one of the nine Congressmen would see his district divided between two of his colleagues and his job abolished.

A House committee has found the Bluegrass state one of 10 which no longer have enough citizens to justify the number of members they send to the House.

These states stand to lose with Kentucky: New York 3; Pennsylvania, 2; and Arkansas, Illinois, Missouri, New Jersey, Tennessee, North Carolina, and Oklahoma, one each.

By contrast, California is entitled to six more House members, Michigan to two, and Florida, Indiana, Maryland, Oregon and Washington to one each.

If Kentucky's House delegation dwindles from nine to eight it will be at the lowest point in 150 years.

In 1800 Kentucky sent six representatives to the House. By 1830 the state's membership had risen to 13, its record number.

From the turn of the 20th century until 1930, the state sent 11 members to the lower House, but the number dropped to nine after the re-apportionment of 1930.

Barring a sharp rise in birth rate of many new settlers, the question of reducing Kentucky's membership will be brought to the attention of Congress by the man who is President of the United States in 1951, Congress may accept the President's re-apportionment or do some re-organizing of its own.

For instance, there is some talk that the House, rather than force some states to drop Congressmen, might raise its membership from 435 (since 1910) to 450 and keep everybody happy.

The party which rules a state government when a re-apportionment is ordered can control the job of gerrymandering the districts.

Ford, Denver Detective Capt. James J. Pitt said. He also confessed two other slaying murders in Michigan. Manacled, Schneider was taken from the Denver jail to Fords filling station. Sheriff Ernie M. Brown, of Sterling, Colo., produced the two iron bars with which he said he believes Schneider hit Ford.

Children from a nearby school were in the crowd which watched the re-enactment.

Whether a Republican or Democratic administration performs this delicate operation, however, it most likely would take place in and around Eastern Kentucky, heavily wooded with Republican voters.

Democrats might attempt the job of squeezing Republican voters of the Seventh and Ninth districts—represented by Republicans W. Howe Meade and John Robison, respectively—into one district, without re-zapping Democratic candidates in the Sixth and Eighth.

If Republicans are in power, they might try to throw the balance of power so that their two representatives would be retained and a Democrat dropped.

In view of the close votes of 1948 in the Eighth (Democratic by 3,603), Ninth (Democratic by 8,000), and Fourth (Democratic by 4,000), mathematicians of both parties seem to be plotting their possible moves on the checker-board of Kentucky's counties.

**Floyd Residents Receive \$1,020 Old Age Benefits**

Monthly benefits totaling \$1,020 were paid to 799 residents of Floyd county in Federal Old Age and Survivors' Insurance payments in the month of June. H. J. Godbey, manager of the Ashland Social Security Administration field office, announced last week.

Although 3,261 residents of the 13 counties served by Mr. Godbey's office are drawing \$57,585 monthly, he is concerned over the fact that many others are losing benefits because they failed to file a claim for them.

He emphasized the fact that payments under federal old age and survivors' insurance are not automatic. A claim must be filed with the Social Security Administration before payment can be made.

**TIDBITS OF KENTUCKY FOLKLORE**

**"DIDN'T IT RAIN?"**

No negro spiritual has appealed to me more than "Didn't It Rain?" which is the negro version of Noah's flood. When a good chorus of colored people sing that spiritual, you hear the rain and know that there was really a flood. The idea of the flood has taken a great hold on many minds, probably because in our American life we have so often been subjected to dangers of high water. In the 40 years—that I have lived in the cavernous limestone area I have somewhat forgotten how serious heavy rains used to be at Fidelity and elsewhere in the regions of surface streams. But the great flood of 1937 gave even us a feeling of helplessness when our few streams and our numerous sink-holes so stopped traffic that there was only one road open into our town for a few days. And that flood has probably left a deeper stamp on our whole state than any other weather that has come within my lifetime.

When I lived on a small hill overlooking a creek bottom, a mile east of Fidelity, every rise in Beechey Fork was an event. Those Jackson Purchase streams are small, but they are in shallow basins, with very wide floodplains stretching out on either side. A rain that the cave area would hardly notice would cause great damage to our fences and crops and might sweep away the results of a whole year's hard work. Cattle or other stock caught in the bottom after a freak flood might be washed away. Because of our immediate connection with this danger, every hard rain became an event that we dated time by. A hard summer rain, particularly on the Fourth of July, was sure to cause much damage to our fences and crops. We also thought that lightning struck often down in that section than elsewhere. And after a summer shower we found a tree that had been hit, very rarely some building was struck, but we feared that each storm would bring disaster to us. And all of us were frightened justly to death when a storm came up. We had heard of all the accidents that had ever befallen our whole section and naturally thought of these when the lightning flashed. If we were at home, we got on a feather bed for protection and worried about the men and boys who would have to take the rain in the fields or else get under a tree and thus invite lightning. When you are trying to endure a heavy summer shower right out in the woods or fields, an inch of rain can seem like a big portion of what flooded Noah's Ark.

It pleases me and also amuses me to see how weather is still a great bit of news. Flash floods, late frosts, very hot weather—anything slightly off the beaten path gives the cub reporter something to write about. This July, 1947, has been a freakish month, one that has often furnished even a good-sized article on the weather. The temperature went down to 49 one night and rose to 85 one day, with the coolest July weather the month has ever brought to my town and its adjacent area. The news photographers all over America have made good money with their pictures of snow in July at Cleveland, Ohio, for instance. The month ended with a flash flood and electric storm that damaged many farmhouses and barns and injured hundreds of shade trees. Even in the cave region, suddenly, let's ourselves ask to the youngsters we used to be, when a dark cloud in the west made us run for the house and the featherbeds. With all our advantages over our former selves, in paved roads, grounding of tall buildings and telephone poles, and bridges across streams, we can be made to feel in such nights as July 31, 1947, that we are not too far away from primitive man in the deep, dark woods, with dangers from floods and storms. Our civilization is, after all, only a pleasant kind of veneer.

## OF INTEREST TO VETERANS

### VA EXPLAINS INSURANCE PROVISION OF LOANS

World War II veterans may negotiate home, farm and business loans under the G.I. Bill on an insured basis if a guaranteed bank, Veterans Administration Branch office or officials in Columbus, O., pointed out this week.

Loans may be guaranteed up to 50 per cent of the principal of the loan, but not to exceed \$4,000 on a real estate loan, or \$2,000 on a non-real estate loan. Loans may be insured for a maximum of 15 per cent of the principal of the loan, but not to exceed \$4,000 and \$2,000 limits.

VA officials said that if a lending institution agrees with a veteran to use the loan insurance instead of the government's 50 per cent guarantee, it qualifies VA, which sets up an insurance account with the lender and enters to the lender's credit an amount equal to 15 per cent of the loan.

Insurance on loans is available only through supervised lenders, which include those subject to examination and supervision by state and federal authorities. VA will reimburse the lender for any loss on any one loan up to the aggregate amount of insurance credited to the account of that lender.

Loans may be either guaranteed or insured at the option of the borrower and the lender. Under an insured loan, the veteran gains an advantage as a smaller amount of his guaranty entitlement is used (15 per cent instead of 50 per cent). However, it is likely the lender will require a sizeable cash down payment on this type of loan because the security afforded by the 15 per cent insurance is comparatively small.

Application for any loan to be guaranteed or insured must be made within 10 years of discharge or July 26, 1947, whichever occurs later. Farm loans must be repaid within 40 years, other realty loans within 25 years and non-realty (business) loans within 10 years.

## LEXINGTON WOMEN HEAR CANDIDATES FOR GOVERNOR

Lexington, Ky., Oct. 11.—Democratic and Republican conceptions of state government clashed here today as two rival candidates for Governor expounded their views before the Lexington League of Women Voters.

Barth C. Clements, Morganfield Democrat, and Eldon S. Dummit, Lexington Republican, reached unqualified agreement on only two points. Each favored a convention to revise the state Constitution. And each said the 1934 outlier act ought to be repealed. This is the act that gives the Governor power to oust his appointees without cause or hearing.

Clements said he intends to vote "Yes" November 4 on the question to call a constitutional convention. Dummit has been speaking and working for a convention for two years.

Each candidate spoke for 10 minutes at the luncheon-meeting at the Lafayette hotel, then answered questions from the audience for 20 minutes. The question period clarified several issues that have been in doubt.

In response to questions, Clements said:

1. He is not in favor of abolishing the present one-man Highway Commission for a return to the old system of a nine-man commission. Nor does he intend, if elected, to convert the State Highway Department into a political machine.

2. He is in favor of federal aid to education, and does not object to some federal supervision if that is what it takes to secure the aid.

3. If elected, he will oppose all bills that make it more difficult for any R.R.A. to obtain artificial limbs may obtain appliances of their choice from any approved manufacturer under contract with VA in one of three cities nearest their residence. If the veteran lives in a city or town having an approved limb manufacturer, that city or town is included among the three from which he must choose.

After delivery of the limb, a veteran has a two-week trial period in which to determine whether it fits or functions properly. If the limb is unsatisfactory the veteran notifies the VA office through which he obtained it. In applying for spare limbs, veterans should wait six to 12 months to allow for the inevitable physical changes in amputations.

VA recently announced the development of three new artificial arms, known as the Northrup, Fitch and Hosmer arms, as result of the government's prosthetic research program. Veterans who have been issued both a permanent and spare artificial arm may obtain one of the new-type arms provided the appliance can be satisfactorily fitted.

Veterans desiring additional information concerning VA's prosthetic appliance program should contact the nearest VA office.

VA estimates there are 3,100 leg and arm amputees in the tri-state Columbus Branch Office area, including 1,800 in Ohio, 1,200 in Michigan and 100 in Kentucky.

Artificial limbs may be replaced by VA if the need arises through "fair wear and tear," VA officials said.

### VA REHAB PROGRAM AIDS HARD-OF-HEARING VETS

World War II veterans who suffered hearing impairments in service are eligible for a special program of medical rehabilitation which Veterans Administration has established to help them overcome their handicap.

VA Branch Officials in Columbus, O., said eligible veterans may take advantage of this program whether they require medical attention to improve their hearing or whether they need rehabilitation to overcome the handicap of a permanent hearing impairment.

The complete rehabilitation course includes a series of hearing and speech tests, the selection and fitting of a hearing aid if indicated, auditory training, lip reading instruction and speech correction if necessary.

VA has contracts with several institutions to give all or part of the complete rehabilitation course. These include the Cleveland Speech schools, subsistence allowance or reserve University, Cleveland, and Ohio State University, Columbus.

### QUESTIONS AND ANSWERS

Q. I am going to be trained under Public Law 18 and would like to know if I can borrow money from VA in case of need when I enter training?

A. Yes. Loans from a revolving fund, provided by Congress, not exceeding \$100 in any case, may be made to trainees commencing or undertaking vocational rehabilitation.

Q. Will payments be made to schools, subsistence allowance or readjustment allowance paid to me be deducted later from any future bonus that may be authorized by Congress?

A. No.

Q. May a veteran receiving disability compensation, receive at the same time subsistence allowance under the G.I. Bill?

A. Yes.

Q. Can a veteran get a guaranteed loan for any type of business?

A. Yes. The veteran can get a guaranteed loan on any type of legitimate business on which the lender is willing to lend.

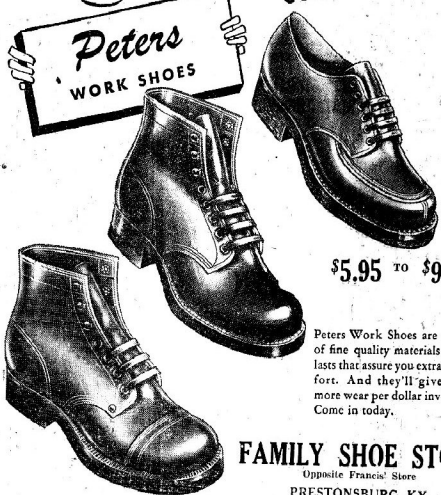

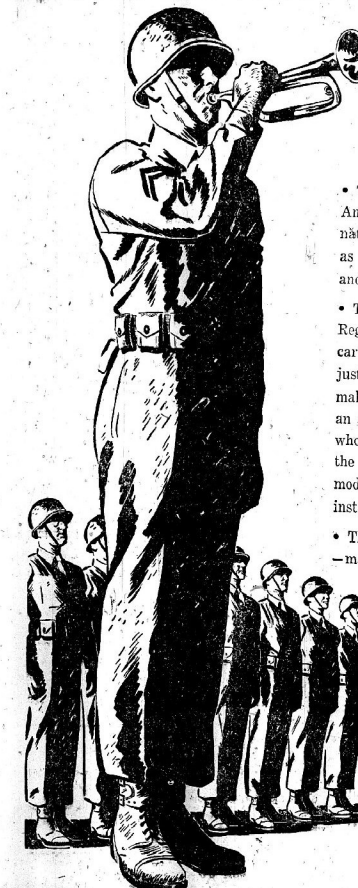

**TEACHERS, PARENTS AND TRAGEDIES**

A Worried Parent champions the cause of good teachers in a very understanding way in the following clipping which appeared in the Huntington Herald-Advertiser on Oct. 19. It is worth reading and pondering. It has already evoked an expansion of the idea by an old-timer under the caption, "Are Teachers Good or Bad?" It is herewith following clipping. It contains some food for thought in some very striking statements. Read them and see what you think about the suggested approach to a better understanding between teachers and parents. The Worried Parent in the clipping is concerned about teachers not getting credit for the fine job they do. But teachers realize Christ was crucified and all of Noah's fine carpenters had to drown. They did a fine matter who he is, rich or poor, good or bad.

They are ready and willing to do everything in their power to help each child, all alike, no matter who he is, rich or poor, good or bad.

If the parents could only take the teacher's place some time or realize the kind of material (meaning the children) they sometimes have to work with, they would be more considerate of the teacher.

Oh! Yes, the teacher is supposed to make a fine citizen from these boys and girls. Do you know any children who have had scarcely any home training? From the time some children can walk, they are turned loose on the streets as well as their neighbors who may be trying their best to teach their children right. In a wrong, good manners, respect for other people and to be good citizens.

Some parents never know where their or with whom their children spend their time. They

have destructive minds and twisted ideas, instead of constructive, clean minds.

It is absolutely shocking how impudent and disrespectful some children are.

A teacher must take her valuable time from the lessons to teach these children the things they should have been taught at home, by their parents. No matter how hard we may try to give our children the right upbringing or how high a standard of decency we set and live before them, with so many bad influences to come in contact with as they grow older, we never know just what sort of citizens they may turn out to be.

**WORRIED PARENT**

I am a teacher and have been ever since 1886. Have taught the one-room school with split-log seats. Have been principal and superintendent of various types of schools. Have taught in the most modern set-ups where a whole plant is air-conditioned and a two-way radio connected each teacher's desk with the central office. Have had dozens and scores of splendid teachers under my supervision. Not in all that vast experience, from 1886 to 1947, have I found a teacher who did not love children and was not willing to go far out of the way to serve and help any child become better and happier. Some children can and will profit by this service and help others will not. They do not seem to have any place to put it. They seem to have been short-changed on the way from the cradle to the crated. These short-changing factors may have been good liquor, tobacco, dope, abuse or under-nourishment. I have had occasion to come in contact with many of these congenital

tragedies. Here are some striking observations good for anybody to make: Do you ever see any person smoking his cane in alcohol before planting them? Will he soak his bean beans in tobacco juice before planting them? He is careful with his cane and bean seed. What about his baby seed? No use to behave the matter further, but another stinger or two won't do any harm.

Where is there a good, sensible farmer who would even try to improve his herd with a drunken bull, whatever breed he might represent? Yes, and where is there a good poultryman who would be so silly as to turn a drunken rooster in to run with his hens? This sounds perfectly ridiculous till we look around and check up on semi-in-law and even daughters-in-law by the dozens now-a-days. Many, many times I have had mothers to come to my office, crying and wringing their hands, and asking if there was not some way by which her cemented child could be helped.

To have to tell her that her child was defeated and wrecked before it had a soul was heart-breaking. The germs from which the child evolved were spoiled in one or both the parents' bodies long before the conception that turned a moron or an idiot loose in somebody's school district.

School teachers are a pretty interesting group in society. They represent much education, culture, refinement, and intellectual ability. They would never be able to qualify as teachers were that not true. They are social architects and engineers. Give us good material and we'll build you a splendid tomorrow. You might do like Sam Jones told a fellow who wanted to throw-off on his

preaching by asking a mean question: "Mr. Jones, do you believe in praying for bread?"

"Yes, sir," replied Rev. Jones, "but I would advise you to get at the end of a hoe handle and help answer that prayer."

So, as teachers, our best suggestion to parents would be to get down and study By-sonnets, Bi-ology, Sex-ology, Psychology, Physiology, Eugenics, Ethnic, Embriology and Endocrinology so they'll know better how to make a child that won't need so much re-making and un-making.

## Train Injuries Result In Death at Hospital Of Left Beaver Miner

Both his legs severed by the wheels of a coal train at Drift early Friday night, Eli Prater, 39-year-old Drift miner, died at 4 o'clock Sunday morning at the Beaver Valley hospital of shock and loss of blood.

Prater was struck while the train was backing and while he was on the tracks near the Simpson Martin Branch crossing, Drift.

The victim was a son of the late Mr. and Mrs. Kelly Prater and was a native of the Prosen Creek section of Breathitt county. He had resided at Drift for several years and had many friends there. Surviving him are his widow, Mrs. Grace Prater, seven children, James, Asa, Cara, Eli, Jr., Alvie, Mary and William, all of Drift, four sisters and one brother, all of Breathitt county.

The body was taken by the Ryan Funeral Home to Vanceburg, Breathitt county, for burial Monday in the family cemetery.

## Mine Improvements At Weeksbury More Than Score, Report

A federal coal mine inspector has credited more than a score of recent improvements and at the same time has suggested a few supplementary measures for the 1,200-employee Weeksbury mine operated by the Eastern Gas and Fuel Association, Coal Division. The mine has had 232 employees when it was re-inspected in August by Inspector J. Willard Wood.

Inspector Wood said that the haulage, face regions, and some of the back entries had been re-audited between inspections, but he pointed out that the rock-dusting program should be made more effective in certain areas.

Sufficient air was circulated throughout the mine, air connections were driven properly, and they were closed when necessary to facilitate ventilation, the inspector reported. Other betterments included reasonably good dust-free conditions in the mine, frame grounds for pumps, trolley wire runs at man-trip stations, display of signs at escapeways, and use of two open-type motors in the triple and removal of dust accumulations, separation of explosives and detonators in the haulage, clean areas surrounding the explosives magazine, removal of an underground booster fan, installation of an automatic signal on the Marshall Branch fan, and adoption of a positive identification plan.

For further conformance with the federal mine safety code, the inspector recommended removal of safety posts where required and attention to unsafe roof, safe underground location of individual explosives containers, firing of blasts with permissible blasting units, making of preblast mine examinations, clearer roadbeds with unobstructed clearance and shifter holes, resoling equipment for locomotives with oversize protection for cables, isolation of trolley wire grounds at additional places.

## ON WAY TO CIVILES

Staff Sgt. Howard Capps, Prestonburg, is en route to the United States aboard the S.S. General Morton. Public Information Office, headquarters Philippines-Burkas Command in Manila announced. Upon his arrival in San Francisco, Sgt. Capps will proceed to Camp Stoneham personnel center in Pittsburgh, California, for separation from military service.

## KNOTT TO UP COAL TONNAGE

### Irishman Creek Field To Produce 5,000 Tons Daily from New Openings

Neighboring Knott county, its coal resources heretofore almost unexplored, will shortly add heavy tonnage daily to the coal production of this section, with the development of a new track mine field on Irishman Creek, a branch of Carr's Fork, it was said this week.

With the Chesapeake & Ohio Railway Company driving a railroad from Wayland through Knott into Letcher county, even heavier coal development in that county is expected later. Before the present boom, the only Knott county coal shipped to market was loaded over Floyd tunnels or was from mines opened in parts of the county joining Floyd and Perry.

Coal men estimate that two leading ramps now under construction at Sasasfras will have a capacity of 100 railroad cars a day—roughly 4,000 tons. Sasasfras, on the Perry-Knott county border, is the terminus of the Carr's Fork branch of the Chesapeake & Ohio Railroad. The spur track was laid about 35 years ago.

One of the ramps at Sasasfras is nearing completion and others, in addition to the two now being built, are planned to handle coal from operations on the eight-mile-long creek.

About 25 mining firms are opening pits along the creek and others have leased large coal holdings in the area. Coal men say hundreds of thousands of dollars already have been invested.

Among the firms opening mines there are Cody Brothers Coal Company, Irishman Coal Company, Buckles-Breeding Coal Co., Hadden Brothers, Conis, C. H. Honegurt Mines, W. J. Ambury Coal Co., W. J. Breeding Coal Co. and the Creed Ambury Coal Co.

Several hundred men already have been employed and others are to be added as production gets under way, spokesman for the firms have announced.

Among the seams of coal to be worked is one about seven and one-half feet high, described as being entirely free of slate and of excellent quality.

Carr's Fork lies parallel with Rockhouse Creek, the Letcher county stream into which the L. & N. currently is pushing a branch line to tap another rich undeveloped coal resource.

When the line is completed, some observers predict, much of the Irishman Creek coal probably will be loaded at ramps along Rockhouse. In some instances, they would be closer to the source than leading points at Sasasfras.

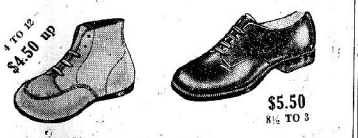

## Blind Man Wins Court Fight For Right To Erect Building

Louis, Ky., Oct. 6.—A blind musician operator won a court battle today and was a step nearer rebuilding his home, school and candy stand on the Lawrence county courthouse grounds.

Circuit Judge Watt M. Pritchard ruled in favor of Haskell J. Moore, blind and blind since birth, in an injunction proceeding filed by former Kentucky State Treasurer E. E. Shannon, who owns a building across from the courthouse, and John G. Burns, Louis d'Arnyan.

In his opinion, Judge Pritchard said: "Of course I do not believe that the court has the right or authority to deprive the county of its public square. However, the square at Louisville is large and when the fiscal court authorized erection of the fence to the blind man they evidently determined that the 200-foot strip would in no way interfere with the county's business."

The case has been pending since last April, when Shannon and Burns sought to prevent Moore from putting up a new establishment.

A brick-and-concrete base already had been built on the courthouse property, but no work has been done on the project since the suit was filed.

Moore now is free to go ahead with his plans unless there is an appeal.

The vendor's counsel, Col. E. E. Adams, said he had been informed Shannon and Burns would appeal their case.

Moore originally had been granted permission to operate on the property in 1936 through intervention of the Kentucky School of the Blind.

When the right of the county to lease the property to the man was challenged, a number of organizations began to worry.

The American Legion and the Louisville Women's Club have quarters in what was once the county jail, and the Louisa Methodist Church has its building on the courthouse grounds, all under 99-year leases.

This suit came as a blow to Moore, who was said to have made frequent donations to churches and the city when business at his stand was good.

The building, re-modeled at his own expense, would be county property.

At the time action against him was filed, Moore said about one of his opponents, when he didn't name, "I tried to save cigars during the war when they were hard to get, for one of these fellows, I thought he was my friend."

In defense of his big-money program, Dummit said: "We can do it if Kentuckians adopt a progressive attitude. This state has had a pauper-complex too long."

In defense of his unwillingness to make promises that he feels cannot be met in full, Clements said: "Kentucky is not a wealthy state. The ability to progress along these worthy lines is limited to our resources."

"My way is the slower way, but it is the surer way," Clements added. And then he outlined his plan to create more taxable wealth by developing the tourist trade and attracting enough new industries to Kentucky to strike a careful balance between agriculture and manufacturing. That program, Clements said, ought to bring enough new wealth within existing tax laws to meet the K.E.A. goal of a \$34,500,000 common school fund in four years.

Dummit, on the other hand, proposed to finance his program by combining estimated revenue collections of \$60,000,000 a year with the net surplus of \$21,000,000 now on hand.

To this theme, Clements related that a Democratic Governor, working with a Democratic Legislature, can enact a more liberal budget in all fields of public service than a Republican Governor at longheads with a Democratic Legislature and the Republicans, he said, will not deny that the 1948 Legislature will be Democratic in about the ratio of 7 to 3.

Jenk's, Ky., Oct. 28 (Sp.)—Mine employees, their families, and staff officers of the Consolidation Coal Company (Ky.), numbering about 1,800, gathered today to dedicate the company's new portal for its Mine No. 204 at the head of Marshall's Branch, about six miles from Jenk's.

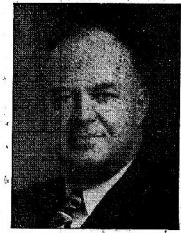

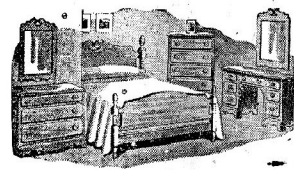

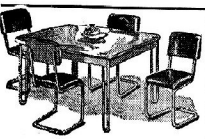
