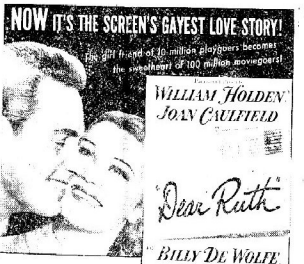

## What Might Have Been

THE shooting and wounding recently of two Floyd County officers while in the ordinary discharge of their duties causes one to wonder what might have been.

Wonder . . . if these officers who called on Walter England in this county three weeks ago had seen him move for a gun in time to open fire first and had killed him—what might have been the public reaction?

"Poor, helpless man, shot down like a dog by pistol-totin' deputies, without a chance for his life—can't you hear the voices?"

But the "poor, helpless man" wasn't shot down like a dog. He shot two officers down and they are alive today because of good intention of his. He is alive today, also, and lives as a threat to peace-loving citizens and to any officer who may chance upon him. If officers' claims that he has vowed not to be taken alive are correct.

THE TIMES does not go in for hero-worshipping when it aligns itself with the officers of the law in most cases. It takes this position because it has little sympathy with the lawless and even less with those who, posing as tender-hearted citizens, side with the criminal.

It is not to be denied some officers abuse their authority, that some are criminals in the uniform of the law. But that must not poison the public mind against every officer to such an extent that the majority of the people assume the "copper-bating" attitude of England.

It is a foolish parent who hears little Junior's tearful complaints of mistreatment when teacher finds it necessary to take him to task and in turn takes the purpose of the teacher and holding that Junior can do no wrong. Equally foolish are those who make of every tough at odds with the law a little Junior and of every peace officer a Simon Legree armed with a gun instead of a whip.

This we have argued in years past. It would seem to be the way of thinking of every citizen worth his salt. Yet we wonder . . . if the criminal, not the officers, had fallen—that the public's reaction would have been.

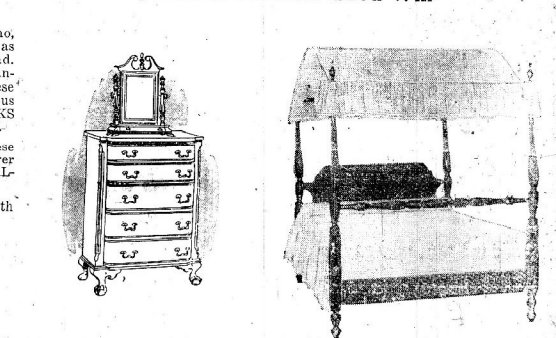

**FEDERATION HITS MCGUIRE**

**KEA Leader's Position On Tolerance Attacked By Teacher Federation**

Frankfort, Ky., Nov. 18.—The property of Heman H. McGuire, secretary of the State Textbook Commission was questioned today by Patrick S. Kirwan, president of the Kentucky State Federation of Teachers.  
 McGuire's resignation as president of the Kentucky Education Association and as Superintendent of Carter county schools was asked by the federation at its convention in Louisville Saturday.  
 The teachers accused McGuire of "treachery and flagrant indulging in bigotry and bigoted prejudice by religious faith and to a racial group." They asked his resignation "in the interest of public education in Kentucky and in the interest of racial and religious tolerance." Their action stemmed from a signed political advertisement of McGuire's which appeared in the Louisville Courier-Journal. McGuire and G. W. Campbell, superintendent of Corbin schools, were appointed to four-year terms on the state textbook commission last June by the State Board of Education. Their terms will expire June 30, 1951.



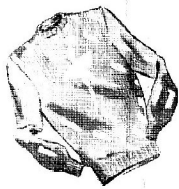

# Survey Shows Game Supply In State Greater This Year

If a survey conducted by the Happy Hunting Ground, Division of Game and P. F. prohibition, is correct, the hunters of Kentucky are in for some good quail and rabbit hunting this fall when the season opens November 20. Quarters in the various districts were asked their ideas about the supply of quail and rabbits this year and in every district there were reported more quail while most of the districts report rabbits are on a par or slightly more than last year.

In the first district, composed of 14 counties in Western Kentucky, the rabbit outlook was described in every county as better than that for last season, while birds in most counties were reported more plentiful than last year. Hunters will find good venison shooting in Crittenden, Caldwell, Gallatin, Callaway, Christian, Ballard, Fulton, Graves, Hickman, Lyon, Livingston, McCreckin, Trigg and Marshall counties. In all the counties the quail outlook was described as "good," "fair" and "excellent." The survey showed an excellent supply of quail in Christian, Hickman, Crittenden, Livingston and Marshall counties.

The second district annually furnishes plenty of game for the hunters. The district is composed of Warren, Henderson, Webster, Butler, Logan, Davies, Hancock, Morgan, Muhlenberg, Hopkins, Union, Todd, Ohio and McLean counties. An increased quail supply was reported in each county in the district. Rabbit supply was described as no better than last year in these counties: Warren, Henderson, Butler, Davies, Hancock, Ohio and McLean. The other counties report an increased number of cottontails.

In the Third district quail outlook was described as good in Oldham, Bullitt and Meade counties, while Spencer, Shelby and Jefferson will have a fair supply, according to the survey. For the district as a whole the quail supply was reported as about the same as last year while more rabbits will be found.

In the Fourth the quail outlook was described as very good, with Adair, Allen, Barren, Breckinridge, Graveson, Green, Hardin, Letcher, McCallie, Meade, Monroe counties having a little better prospect than Cumberland, Edmonson, Nelson, Washington, Taylor and Marion. The outlook is not too good on rabbits in this district, with each county reporting about the same number as last year.

**KENTUCKY ON THE MARCH**

By EWING GALLOWAY

"One of the best pieces you have ever written for our local newspaper," says a reader, "was that one about William Creech, the unlettered Harlan county mountaineer responsible for the founding of Pine Mountain School, a model educational institution. I felt like a ton of brick for both the letter the old man dictated and the two or three sentences describing the school."

If you, dear reader, fell like a ton of brick, I, who knew more about the subject than I could tell in my limited space, tumbled like a cascade peak toppling into Yosemite Valley. So, it is only natural that I

should want to give you some more of the story.

In 1913 two women, Miss Katharine Pettis and Mrs. Rhial Gandy, both college graduates, started a little school in an isolated district in Harlan county, on 250 acres of land donated by the late William Creech and wife. Aunt Gandy gave industrial, moral and intellectual education. . . and to serve as a social center in an intensely rural neighborhood. The school began with a small number of young children of kindergarten age, many of them from broken homes. It grew rapidly.

As first 40 buildings and other facilities could be provided. Other children were furnished and the teaching staff was enlarged.

By 1924, when improved public schools were able to take care of the grades, only children ready for the fifth grade were admitted. Beginning with 1930 the school did only junior and senior high school work.

By that time a system of vocational training was well established—courses adapted to the needs of the region. Boys and girls at Pine Mountain now enjoy as good academic instruction as those in recently city schools and vocational training that is a pattern for isolated rural high schools all over the nation.

There is a "pruit shop" where youngsters learn typesetting and press work. Every now and then a new building is put up and boys learn stonecutting, masonry, carpentry, plumbing. The dairy farm, with a sizable herd of fine cows, enables students to learn all about the production of milk and butter. Feed crops and extensive truck gardening by the most modern methods suited to the region afford more agricultural training. There is a shop for auto mechanics, where boys take cars apart and put them together again. Girls learn to cook and serve food. They run the kitchen and dining room, and learn dietetics. There is an infirmary which serves several counties. It has two trained nurses under whom girl students learn Red Cross nursing. With hand home girls learn weaving, and there are classes in sewing, darning.

Students give two and a half hours a day to vocational work which pays for rooms and board. Good manners, most of the social graces, as well as non-sectarian religious instruction are essential parts of the training. Uncle William Creech's profound statement, "It's better for folkses characters if they learn to do things with their hands," is never overlooked by the faculty of Pine Mountain School. Nor is the value of academic training, which Uncle William probably knew less about.

Wouldn't it be fine if there were Pine Mountain Schools in 200 or more isolated Kentucky districts?

**WRECKING OF TWO PLANES IN BLAST AT BARDSTOWN LAID TO MOONSHINERS**

Bardstown, Ky., Nov. 14.—Reports of two airplanes and airplanes on two others in a bad flat night at the Nelson County Airport may have been caused by moonshiners, investigators reported today.

Moonshiners, for some time have been at odds with the airport management, fearing that "planes were being used to spot stills, investigators said.

The explosive was believed to have been Deputy Sheriff John Wright said it probably was dynamite or some other powerful material. The blast was heard here, 2 1/2 miles from the airport.

The explosive was believed to have been placed in a plane owned by Miss Teresa Cecil, 26, bookkeeper for a Bardstown distillery. She had bought the plane three weeks ago for \$2,500. The craft was blown to bits.

Miss Cecil reported telephone lines between the airport and Bardstown had been cut several times recently.

The other plane destroyed and the two craft damaged were owned by the M. & M. Flying Service, managed by R. L. McDonald.

The blast, about 9:30 p.m., blew out a side of the hangar that housed the planes.

At Frankfort, Jerry O'Brien, director of the Kentucky Aeronautics

Commission, said he believed the total loss might reach \$10,000. His estimate was based on a report by Vincent O'Brien, the commission's chief inspector, who had visited the airport.

The director said his commission would aid county officials in their inquiry, but "primarily it's a problem for the sheriff."

**OF INTEREST TO VETERANS**

World War II veterans in Ohio, Michigan and Kentucky have negotiated 5,885 G.I. loans for business purposes in the amount of \$18,769,465. It was reported this week at Veterans Administration "Franchise Office" in Columbus, O. VA has guaranteed approximately 40 per cent of the total amount.  
 The volume includes: Ohio, 2,063 loans for \$7,186,798; Michigan, 2,970 loans for \$8,760,287; Kentucky, 803 loans for \$2,792,252.

Under terms of the G.I. Bill, VA is authorized to guarantee 50 per cent of a loan up to \$2,000 on a non-real estate loan and up to \$4,000 on a real estate loan. Loans for home, farm and business purposes are made by lending institutions and not by VA.

Veterans Administration recently reported a record enrollment of 328,540 World War II veterans taking educational and job-training courses in Ohio, Michigan and Kentucky.

The total includes veterans studying and training under both the G.I. Bill and Public Law 16 (Vocational Rehabilitation Act for the disabled). The enrollment on November 1 included 156,825 in Ohio, 122,118 in Michigan and 39,526 in Kentucky.

VA officials said the peak enrollment was reached with the entry of 81,257 veterans in schools and colleges in the three states during October, including 33,933 in Ohio, 37,249 in Michigan and 10,175 in Kentucky.

Each veteran in training under the G.I. Bill will receive a notice from the Veterans Administration

with future subsistence checks advising him not to cash the check if he believes he is not entitled to the full amount of the payments. VA Branch Office officials in Columbus, O. said this week.

The notices are designed to help eliminate subsistence allowances overpayments and the necessity for refunds by veterans, VA said.

The notice informs the veteran that, according to VA records, he is still in training. It urges the veteran to contact his nearest VA office before cashing the check if he has stopped training or has any reason to believe the check represents an overpayment of his account.

If the veteran is entitled to a part of the money, VA said it will make every effort to adjust his records and issue another check without delay.

**QUESTIONS AND ANSWERS**  
 Q. I received an overpayment in subsistence allowance after I left school. I have to return the amount I received to the government. A. Yes.  
 Q. I am being rehabilitated under Public Law 16 and I would like to know what medical treatment is available to me?  
 A. Under the Vocational Rehabilitation Act (Public Law 16) you are entitled to any kind of medical treatment needed (hospital or outpatient) to prevent interruption of your training.  
 Q. If I obtain a G.I. loan to go into business and my business fails, is the guaranteed portion of the loan paid by the government charged to me or is it an outright gift to me?  
 A. A guaranteed loan is a gift to the veteran. It must be repaid. If the government has to pay the guaranteed portion of the G.I. loan to the lender, the veteran is obligated to the government for the payment.  
 Q. How and where do I apply for hospitalization for a service-connected disability?  
 A. See your nearest contact representative or apply at a VA regional office or hospital. A letter addressed to the nearest VA office also will suffice. In case of emergency, you can telephone the nearest VA office collect.  
 Q. Please tell me what veterans are eligible to have prescriptions filled at government expense?  
 A. If the veteran's physician has been authorized by VA to treat the veteran, VA will pay cost of the prescription if it is to be used in treatment of the veteran's service-connected disability.  
 Q. If I go to a private physician to determine whether I need hospital treatment or domiciliary care, will the government pay the cost of the examination?
