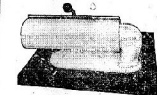

It has been said that the fault of Kentucky Governors lies in the fact that they lose perspective and are unable to see the forest that is Kentucky for the political trees heading Frankfort about.

There is some truth in that, but the metaphor applies with equal force to the citizens of Kentucky.

A Governor who sets himself to the task of being Governor and not a political dictator; one who will stick to his job and not devote himself to that of building a political machine, dabbling in every political situation in every county in the state; a Governor who will wash his so-called friends as closely as his known enemies; who will forget old scores in view of new problems and new needs of the state—such is the ideal the ordinary citizen looks to in a Governor.

For Governor-elect Clements THE TIMES would wish complete freedom from all cliques and "rings" that would serve their own and other selfish interests; and for him, too, the high esteem of his people four years hence.

Cats Gain Even Break In Net Games This Week With Wayland, Garrett

Prestonsburg defeated Garrett here Wednesday night, 44 to 35, with Branham and Porter leading the attack. Betsy Layne's Bobcats are here Friday night.

Prestonsburg and Wayland high schools staged another scoring tug-of-war here Thursday night in their first basketball meeting of the year, such as they presented to the excitement of the paying customers in their first meeting last year.

Wayland won, 41 to 40, on a foul shot scored by Castle after the regular playing time had expired.

It was that close, almost every minute of the game. Prestonsburg took a slight lead in the first minutes of the game, then lost it to the visitors and never regained it.

Sometimes the Cats would draw up even, but then Wayland would come back with a field goal or a foul shot.

It was Prestonsburg's first loss in three games. With seconds remaining in the game and Wayland leading, 40 to 38, Ed Branham, Black Cat high scorer, connected to tie it up. Castle of Wayland was fouled at that time in an attempt to shoot. Amid the hubbub of the excited crowd as it sensed an overtime period, some thought the foul was committed after the horn blew, but after some delay Castle was permitted to take his tosses. The first was short. The next sank, along with Prestonsburg hopes of victory.

Fletcher, Wayland pivot man, was the high scorer of the game with 21 points, 11 on foul shots. Branham led the losers with 18 points. Wayland's edge lay in a slight superiority on charity tosses, making good on 15 out of 25 while Prestonsburg made in on 12 of 24.

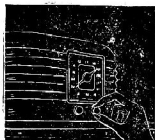

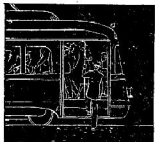

Va., one brother, Harry Spears, of Erdenkot, a sister, Mrs. Dick Clark, of the Auxier road, near here, and one half-brother, J. D. McCoy, of Hi Hat. The body was returned here and funeral rites were conducted Sunday from the Free Will Baptist Church, the Rev. Leane Stratton, James Roark and Henry Cider officiating. Burial in the Dick Clark cemetery on the Auxier road was directed by the Arnold Funeral Home.

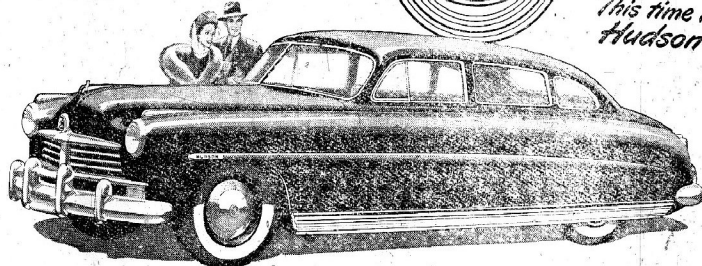

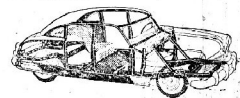

OF INTEREST TO VETERANS

Veterans, their dependents and beneficiaries in Ohio, Michigan and Kentucky received \$41,583,500 during October in various benefits available to them under the laws enacted by Congress. It was reported at the Veterans Administration Tri-State Branch Office in Columbus, Ohio.
The state totals were: Ohio, \$19,102,100; Michigan, \$12,899,600; Kentucky, \$9,581,800.
The totals include expenditures for educational benefits, disability and death pensions and compensation, autos for amputees, G.I. loan interest, burial allowances and unemployment and self-employment allowances. The latter two benefits, while paid by VA, are administered by the respective states.
VA said expenditures for medical and dental care and payments for insurance benefits are not computed in the totals.
There are 2,057,175 veterans of all wars now residing in Ohio, Michigan and Kentucky, according to records at the Veterans Administration Tri-State Branch Office in Columbus, O.
The total by states are: Ohio, \$65,230; Michigan, 734,310; Kentucky, 337,635. VA said there are 1,629,900 World War II veterans in the three states including 765,031 in Ohio, 572,027 in Michigan and 273,822 in Kentucky.
In a move to improve the quality of veterans' newly-built homes, Veterans Administration has announced inauguration of a new plan for VA inspection of the houses while they are under construction.
Officials at VA's Columbus, Ohio, Branch Office said the plan provides for a pre-construction appraisal of "reasonable value" for G.I. loan purposes, based on complete plans and specifications, and for a minimum of three interim inspections as the work advances to assure adherence to the standards agreed upon. The plan is applicable to new home developments of five or more family units.
QUESTIONS AND ANSWERS
Q. What veterans have preference to VA hospital beds?
A. Veterans suffering from service-connected disabilities and those requiring emergency treatment are given preference to hospital beds.
Q. Can you tell what the deadline is for a disabled veteran to apply for one of the specially equipped automobiles?
A. The last date on which applications can be approved is June 30, 1948. However, in order to give ample time for the processing of your application, you should apply at least 30 days prior to that date.

4-H Clubs Enroll 73,000 Boys, Girls

Kentucky was one of the top states in 4-H club work in the past year, with 72,008 farm boys and girls enrolled in 2,987 community clubs according to the annual report of the director of agricultural extension work of the College of Agriculture and Home Economics.

Pike county had the largest enrollment, 3,177 members, and 16 counties had more than 1,000 club members each. The boys and girls received training in project work, organization, health, leadership, conservation, judging, demonstrations, recreation and community activities.

During the year 6,762 local leaders helped with club work, of whom 108 had been leaders for five years or longer. Many counties have 4-H councils, composed of active leaders, to assist county and home demonstration agents in planning and carrying on the program.

Legislative Program To Aid Handicapped Children Asked

Development of a legislative program to aid Kentucky's handicapped school children was recommended recently by Miss Gwen Y. Retherford, Frankfort, state supervisor for educating handicapped children.

Miss Retherford addressed members of the Kentucky Society for Crippled Children at its annual meeting.

Such legislation, she said, should provide:

1. A clear definition of what is meant by a handicapped child.
2. Permission to local school districts to organize and administer special education facilities upon the basis of approved standards.
3. An "area" plan whereby two or more school districts could make use of the same educational center.
4. Provision for reimbursement of school districts for additional cost of a handicapped children's program.

The present \$25.66 in state aid per pupil each year is not sufficient to give the special training needed by children who are deaf, partially blind, mentally retarded, or physically handicapped to the extent that they cannot safely attend school, the speaker declared. For example, she said, it requires three or four more times more money to teach a handicapped child than other children.

Reporting on a state-wide "non-technical" survey conducted by the Department of Education with the Division of Census and Attendance, Miss Retherford said there are approximately 2,000 children in Kentucky who are handicapped. About half of them, she said, are receiving no schooling at all.

Of the 170 districts covered in the survey, only 18 reported having a special education program. About 1,000 handicapped children are receiving schooling in these 18 districts. Only Louisville and Lexington had more than five teachers whose time was devoted to this type of training.

Miss Retherford said the educational needs of handicapped children in Kentucky are:

1. A teacher-training program.
2. A program whereby all handicapped children would be provided an opportunity for adequate schooling adequate to meet their needs.
3. Co-operative planning among school districts to provide a proper and adequate program.

Pikeville College's new gymnasium, converted from a war-surplus airplane hangar, will be used for the first time Friday night when the Bears open against Kentucky Christian College and the Academy plays Virgin. **KENTUCKY
ON THE MARCH**

By EWING GALLOWAY

Once in a long while somebody comes along with material for this column and I don't have to do the writing myself. This time it is Harry W. Schaefer, president of the Committee for Kentucky. The paragraphs are lifted from his 44-page history of the Committee.

"To me the profoundest tragedy of our Christian civilization is that throughout these 2,000 years, we have spent the greater part of our effort, our thought and our care to the idea of pulling apart. We have made it of an art and a science. We have become experts at it. We have become professional at it. Tragically, our approach to the idea of pulling together throughout this time has been weak, inept, bungling and unattractive."

"I think that you will agree that the expression of the strongest instinct in man, it must be perfectly obvious, that the idea of pulling apart is detrimental to self-preservation. Whereas the idea of pulling together is conducive to it."

"Isn't this, then, the most important question that should ask of our civilization: 'Why is it that in these 2,000 years, we have devoted most of our time, our thought and our care to the idea of pulling apart when that idea is so inimical to self-preservation? Why have we done so little for the idea of pulling together, which alone can save our civilization?'"

"I don't profess to have the answer, but I do have my answer. It is that in all these years, because of fear and of a sense of security, we have exchanged mistrust, misunderstanding, the hate our minds and in our hearts. Had we followed the ethical precepts of Jesus and emphasized mutual respect, sympathy, and understanding, the history of our Christian civilization would have been profoundly different."

"For the first 1945 1/2 years we were able to survive the struggle between these two ideas. We could pull apart all over the world and then, when exhausted, try to pull together again. Somehow, we always had our eyes on the horizon and on August 6, 1945, with the dropping of the atomic bomb on Hiroshima, a new world began. Never again will we have another chance to pull together after we have pulled apart. If once again we pull apart in this world, it will be the end of our civilization."

Yet we are guilty of shipping some cars consisting of inexcusable amounts of rock, dirt, and slate. Every car of this extremely dirty coal that is loaded is with utter disregard, not only to the welfare of the shipper, but to every man engaged in truck mining for his livelihood.

The foreign market is by far our best guarantee of continued business. Exports for 1947 have been at an all-time high. European demands will be greater in 1948. However, exports much in excess of the 1947 level will encounter limitations of coal-loading facilities at United States ports, although much of these limitations can be overcome by more orderly marketing and shipping practices.

Coal is critical to European reconstruction. Because of reconstruction requirements, Europe's need for coal is greater than before the war. There are adequate reserves of coal abroad, but foreign production is still below pre-war rates, owing to lack of transportation, mining equipment and other supplies. Effective demand in Europe (not including

Russia) is at least five hundred and fifty million tons, or almost one hundred and ten million tons in excess of production. The deficit is primarily owing to the fact that production is down in Britain, Germany, and Poland (including German Silesia), the three largest European coal producers. Britain—a exporter of coal before the war—does not now produce enough coal for herself.

The Aid-to-Europe program is not generally approved by the people in Floyd county. Many have written me protesting this action. I appreciate those views, and I know, too, that sending billions to the European nations will not reduce our cost of living. However, I am going to support the Plan, for it will return to our section more than ten-fold our proportionate part of the tax burden. This is the first time in history that our section has been afforded a chance to get more out of government spending than we have actually had to contribute.

If Europe is to do without American dollars, we must do without a great portion of our present coal business in both railroad

and truck mines. A loss of this business means, of course, a loss of jobs for miners, truck drivers, and ramp men. It means a loss of business for every merchant in the area. It means an economic set-back for every person in Floyd county.

At present, here in Washington, we are considering the stop-gap-aid bill that will provide foreign relief until spring. This will pass without question. However, the so-called Marshall Plan for some twenty or so billions is in for rough going in the interim.

If the Marshall Plan passes—and I will put forth every effort to get it passed—we can look forward to a greater coal business. To insure that business for our section whereby we can not only keep full employment, but open new mines and create more job opportunities, I want to propose now that we set up an organization for the purpose of promoting our truck mine industry: an organization consisting of truck mine owners, miners, union officials, truck drivers and ramp owners; an organization that can guarantee greater sales, more jobs, and the deserved prosperity of our people.

Veterans Administration urges World War II veterans in Ohio, Michigan and Kentucky to pay their G.I. insurance premiums by draft, personal check or money order rather than by direct cash remittance. Remittances by draft, check or money order should be made payable to the Treasurer of the United States. Veterans may make insurance payments in person at any of the authorized VA collection offices, located in metropolitan areas in the three states, or remittances may be mailed to Collection Unit, VA Branch Office No. 8, 82 S. Starling Street, Columbus, Ohio.

Less than five weeks remain in which National Service Life Insurance policies which have lapsed may be reinstated without a physical examination. Veterans Administration Branch Office officials in Columbus, Ohio, said this week.

After the deadline date of December 31, 1947, policies which have lapsed more than three months cannot be reinstated without the veteran proving his insurability by a complete physical examination.

At the present time, and until the end of the year, a veteran may reinstate term insurance in most cases by simply signing a statement to the effect that his health is as good as it was at the time of the lapse. Then, by payment of two monthly premiums, his insurance can be reinstated.

Q. Will VA increase the \$13.50 I get for my 10 per cent World War II service-connected disability in event I marry?
A. No. Your compensation is based on the degree of disability. No additional compensation is payable for dependents.

History and Roads Parallel
 By HUGH MORRIS,

 Before the Revolutionary War, little was known of the country that today is Kentucky. Most of the 3,000,000 American colonists were clustered within 100 miles of the sea.
 When the first white men arrived in Kentucky, they found an extensive system of Indian trails and buffalo trails connecting most of the leading springs and river crossings. These paths usually followed the dry ridges. Subsequently, many of them were expanded into crude roads.
 Although the two natural routes to Kentucky, Cumberland Gap and the Ohio river, were opened as early as 1750, no settlement was established until 1774. In that year, Harrodsden, Kentucky's first settlement, was established.
 Land travel through Cumberland Gap was facilitated by Daniel Boone in 1775, when he established the Wilderness Road. It passed through the Kentucky river, and it ended at Boonesboro.
 During the last quarter of the 18th century, a whole system of trails, or crude roads, covered Kentucky. It was over this network that a part of America's first great western migration passed.
 By 1800, Kentucky's population had reached 220,000. The settlers arrived by way of the Wilderness Road, the Maysville Road, and the more arduous Ohio river route.
 Prior to 1802, when Kentucky became a state, Virginia had recognized the necessity of a wagon trail to Kentucky. In 1779, it entered a survey for that purpose. However, no road was made until later, when Kentucky itself saw the need for improving the more important trails for wagon travel. From 1780 until 1797, a number of laws were enacted for clearing designated wagon roads. From the period from 1835 to 1868, many private turnpike companies were chartered by the Legislature. No definite road plan was developed. But soon the expanding railroad industry overshadowed interest in roads. The railroad's faster, more comfortable service caused a sharp drop in highway traffic. Stagecoaches and freight horse-drawn teams, Turnpike companies began to lose money. Maintenance was curtailed, and road surfaces deteriorated. Tollgate wars were precipitated, resulting in abandonment of many roads.
 During the period from 1868 to 1912, the state abandoned practically all direct interest in roads and management of road affairs. Necessary maintenance was taken over by the counties.
 As a result, standards of maintenance varied widely from county to county. No significant state-wide
