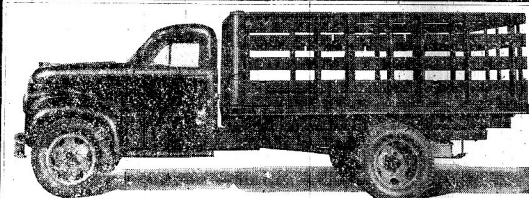

Dear Senator Hays:

The press has reported that you sponsored a bill to establish state liquor stores in Kentucky. Many are wondering about your motive and wish to ask you the following questions:

1. Did you own or have an interest in a liquor store when Floyd county went dry?
2. Do you represent and work for the interests and welfare of Floyd county which voted dry? If so, why do you propose to take state revenue from us and give it to the wet counties?
3. Why do you say you are "not a wet" and then promote wet legislation?
4. In proposing to use liquor revenue for "welfare and education" do you mean to whitewash the evils of liquor, bribe dry taxpayers to vote wet, and intimidate the personnel of our welfare agencies and educational institutions?
5. If your proposal has no effect on dry counties such as Floyd, why are YOU promoting it?
6. Do you know that violations of the liquor code and the corrupt handling of funds are repeatedly and widely reported in our neighboring states that have state liquor stores? And that they use the sales tax for revenue?
7. Do you know that the grand jury in Charleston, W. Va., publicly gave a blistering rebuke to enforcement officials for lack of aggressiveness in the presence of open and

notorious bootlegging and gambling?

8. Do you expect us to believe that your liquor store bill WOULD be enforced better than in West Virginia? Do you know that enforcement of our present laws would stop bootlegging?

9. Do you know that drunkenness has been sharply reduced in Floyd county since going dry?

10. Do you favor letting the poor man pay the taxes by selling him all the liquor he will drink and then fine him for getting drunk?

11. Do you favor using grain to make liquor instead of using it for food? Do you know that the purchase of grain for liquor increases scarcity of food that skyrocket prices?

12. Are you aiding the Liquor Lobby in Louisville in their attempt to stop the steady march of dry-by-optional territory across the state?

13. Why did you vote against a public hearing on the recently passed change in Local Option?

Senator, we are wondering about you working for the welfare of the people of Floyd county.

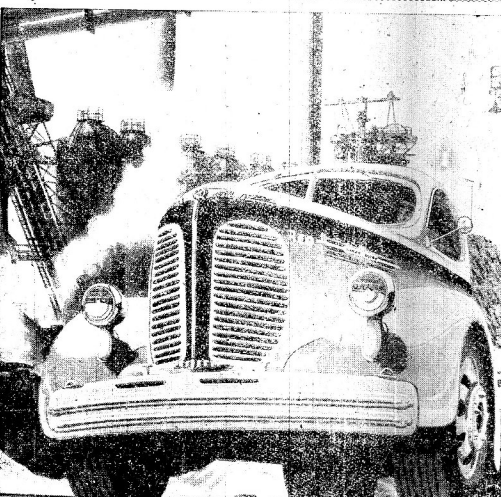

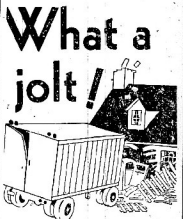

RICE SLAYING SUSPECT FREE

Escapes State Hospital at Huntington, W. Va.; Termed 'Dangerous Man'

The "No. 1 suspect" in the slaying of Elmo Rice, Johnson county native and Columbus O. real estate agent, roamed at large last week-end, and a fugitive from Huntington (W. Va.) state hospital.
Capt. Glenn C. Hoffman, chief of the Columbus Police Detective Bureau, described 27-year-old Elmo Rice as "the hottest lead" in the two-month-old Rice slaying.
Dean, charged with robbery, forgery and obtaining money under false pretenses, escaped an unarmed attendant at the hospital Friday.
Rice was slain Dec. 10. He disappeared after leaving home to demonstrate his automobile to a prospective buyer. His body was found on a lonely suburban road the next morning.
Exactly who police considered Dean "the hottest lead yet" to that slaying wasn't made public. Police in the Ohio capital apparently became interested in Dean while he was held in the Kanawha county jail at Charleston, W. Va., for safekeeping.
He was arrested Dec. 23 in Kenova, south of Huntington, on a charge of forging a check for \$130 on a Maysville, Ky., bank. Later he was indicted in nearby Hamlin on a charge of robbing the Lincoln Theatre of \$2,200.
After questioning in Hamlin, he was taken to Charleston. There he was charged with forgery and obtaining money under false pretenses.
Dean was described by Detective Axel Bryant as "a dangerous man." Dr. E. F. Resor of Huntington hospital said the man "simply obtained 'ex' in escaping."
The fugitive's mother obtained a lunacy warrant, which prevented his extradition to Ohio for questioning in the Rice slaying. Police reported he agreed to extradition before the warrant was brought.
Seemingly "tractable," Dean was accompanying his attendant from a clinic building to another structure when he broke and ran.

CLAIM STATE CONTROL PAYS

Perkins, Others Cite Roadbuilding Record In Neighboring States

Special to The Times
 Frankfort, Ky., Feb. 3—Three neighboring states have materially advanced their improved road mileage by placing all roads under the jurisdiction of their state highway organizations, according to a report filed today with Garrett L. Wilborn, commissioner of the Kentucky Department of Highways. The report was signed by McCracken County Judge Brady M. Stewart, Chief Assistant Attorney-General Carl D. Perkins and Design Director Dwight H. Bray of the Department of Construction material was gathered by the trio on a survey trip to West Virginia, Virginia and North Carolina. "West Virginia placed its entire road mileage under state control in 1933," the report said. "Virginia's secondary (rural) highway system came into being on Jan. 21, 1932. The state took over all roads for maintenance and improvement except those in four counties, which voted to retain local control. One of these later joined the state system. North Carolina's General Assembly voted the entire road system under state control in 1931."
 "West Virginia income for highway purposes amounts to a total of about \$35,000,000. One cent of the gasoline tax, all the fire, all poll tax and an added grant of \$6,000,000 from the general fund is applied to the secondary (rural) roads. This gives the state \$11,000,000 for the purpose."
 "In the opinion of the vast majority, the state control system is superior in efficiency and economical in cost, as compared with the county system, that of those questioned, almost everyone was content that state control in West Virginia stay in force."
 "Virginia's overall state road income for 1947 amounted to \$81,662,000 with \$17,171,000 of state funds being allocated to secondary (rural) highway purposes. From the time of the establishment of the system to date, a total of \$35,000,000 or an average of \$7,500,000 a year has been expended on secondary (rural) highways. Mileage of black-top rural roads has increased from 2,065 in 1932 to more than 8,000 miles in 1946; mileage of lightly surfaced rural roads from 9,000 in 1932 to 24,000 in 1946."
 "Only 19 of the 100 counties in North Carolina had passable county roads when the state became responsible for the upkeep of all rural roads in 1931. Today, 4,500 miles have been built and 25,000 miles of sand-stay roads have been maintained by grading."
 "The state collects about \$54,500,000 yearly for all road purposes. Out of this sum \$23,000,000, or almost half, is spent on rural roads. The rural appropriation is divided \$12,000,000 for maintenance and \$11,000,000 for improving additional mileage."
 "North Carolina has 30 highway districts with 30 well-trained engineers in charge. Each of the 100 counties has a competent road supervisor. West Virginia has 10 districts, each with five counties. Resident engineers are in charge of the districts with district engineers in charge, and 57 sub-districts, each with a resident engineer."

BIG TUNNEL JOB FINISHED
Burpo, First Engineer On Run out of Shelby, Also 1st thru Pine Mt.

Jenkins, Ky., Feb. 3—Engineer H. L. Burpo, Jenkins, veteran of some 40 years with the Chesapeake & Ohio Railway, grasped the throttle today and the first train rolled through the new \$2,000,000 Pine Mountain tunnel.
 The west-to-east crossing from the Virginia to the Kentucky side of the border marked the completion of the tunnel itself, which was constructed to give access to the rich coal field of Upper Poudre Valley, Virginia.
 At the same time, railway officials announced that estimated reserves of coal in the field totaled 300,000,000 tons. Previous estimates had fixed the total at 50,000,000.
 The train, including Engine No. 1456 and eight work cars, traversed the 3,400-foot tunnel without incident.
 The railway announced, however, regular traffic would not start until February 27.
 Fifteen months were required for construction of the tunnel, and the Western Construction Company of Sioux City, Iowa, said that \$400,000 cubic yards of earth were moved.
 The train trip was another "first" for Burpo. He was at the throttle back in 1912 when the first work train moved out of Shelby, Ky., on the Big Sandy-Ekham division of the C. & O.

OF INTEREST TO VETERANS

World War II veterans in Ohio, Michigan and Kentucky have negotiated 670 loans totaling more than \$600,000 against their National Service Life Insurance, Veterans Administration Branch Office, Columbus, O., reported this week.

VA officials also reported that veterans in the tri-state area have converted more than 131,000 policies to one of more six permanent plans available. Face value of this converted insurance is approximately \$55 million dollars.

The deadline for conversion of term insurance to one of the permanent plans is eight years from the original date the term insurance was issued prior to Jan. 1, 1946. G.I. insurance issued after that date may run on the term plan for five years under existing legislation.

Veterans are not required to pay attorneys or agents for representing them in monetary claims against the Veterans Administration, VA said this week in answer to numerous recent inquiries.

Fees for such services, VA said, are payable only by the veteran himself and are deducted from the monetary benefit due the veteran at the time the claim was allowed.

Fees are fixed by statute at \$10 for an original claim and \$2 for claim to obtain increased benefits.

Any agent or attorney who charges or attempts to charge any veteran for such services is subject to penal provisions of the law in addition to loss of his accreditation, VA said.

QUESTIONS AND ANSWERS

Q. Must a veteran have 10 percent or more service-connected disability to be eligible for out-patient treatment?

A. Any veteran with an established service-connected disability is entitled to out-patient treatment for service-connected disability regardless of the degree of disability.

Q. I lost my last subsistence check before I was able to cash it at the bank. What should I do?

A. Go to your nearest VA office and explain what happened. The office will take necessary action to re-convert or replace your check.
