He and hundreds of others were buried at Margaret, Holland. Because "they were all gentlemen," Mrs. Krigger became a special caretaker of their graves.

She said her small son, Henri, grew strong with food which the G.I.'s shared with him, and added:

"Whenever you saw a G.I. you saw a child, Henri would go away with him in the morning. I was the only mother who did this after dinner. Always, they were kind."

She returns to Holland, Mrs. Krigger also hopes to visit two chaplains' whom she met overseas. They are Rev. Whit of Paris, Ky., and Rev. Taylor of Halden, Mo. She did not quote their first names.

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DEWEY DAM SAFE, BELIEF

Even if U. S. Senate Cites Appropriation For Flood Control

Although an attempt was being made in the U.S. Senate this week to appropriate \$200,000 for the Dewey dam and river and harbor improvements, all danger of cancellation of operations toward completion of the dam is considered very remote.

Now almost half completed, with diversion of Johns Creek only a matter of a few days away for the beginning of work on the dam, the Dewey reservoir is considered as nearly a certainty as an approved project.

The appropriations committee brought for its bill funding for \$700,000 to \$1,000,000 for the dam and river and harbor improvements, but the Senate committee has approved by the House for the same purpose.

For example, the House approved \$200,000 for the Dewey dam, but the Senate committee has approved by \$1,000,000 to \$4,000,000. It made even larger boosts in numerous other projects.

The fight on behalf of economy was led by three members of the Appropriations committee who disagreed with 15 other members in approving the increases. They filed a motion that the bill be sent back to committee, with instructions to the Senate to reduce the \$200,000 to \$1,000,000 where it would do the least harm.

The three are Styles Bridges, New Hampshire chairman of the Appropriations committee; Homer E. Ferguson, Michigan; and Clyde M. Reed, Kansas. They had voted support for the bill, but they changed their minds when they learned of the evidence produced during the debate that more Republicans are going to vote against the bill.

For example, there has been no statement for of government spending than Kenneth S. Wherry, of Nebraska, acting majority leader, said on the Senate floor. Wherry and Ferguson would vote against the bill unless he could be assured funds would not be taken from projects already under way.

Wherry has a stake in letting the bill go through in the form produced by the committee, because it added \$100,000 to the \$7,500,000 which the House voted for Nebraska's Harlan county reservoir.

Other Republicans with a similar stake in the Senate floor opposed the economists. William F. Knowland of California got from the Senate committee of which he is a member, an additional \$250,000 for flood-control work and \$2,938,000 for other projects.

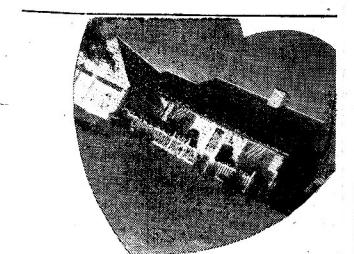

ON TEACHER UNION

Editor, The Times:

The Floyd County Federation of Teachers is nearing the completion of its first year. Despite the handicaps of a severe winter, transportation problems, and the fact that relatively few teachers are willing to take the initiative, the organization has made some progress. We predict that during the next school year great progress will be made.

Several proposals were made to the local administration this year. Among them was the request that we be given our few dollars within three days after sending in our monthly reports. These requests were all shrugged off with the excuse of inconvenience. During the next year we will attack some of the same problems more strenuously.

At one of our meetings prior to the meeting of the General Assembly, we asked Doug Hays, Henry C. Hale and Milton Stumbo, our State Senator and Representatives, to cooperate with the teachers on all constructive teacher legislation. According to Patrick Kirwan, president of the Kentucky Federation of Teachers, these men were solid for labor and education.

We saw the ineffective job done by the administration-dominated KEA during the last meeting of the Assembly. They were nothing for teachers. In fact, we will be paid less next year than this year, unless we get busy.

Teachers have the backing of all labor. Hence this is a labor issue, and we have to do it back ourselves, and our cause will be rapid. Our children will gain, too.

How can the public be satisfied with the condition of our schools? How can we teachers be satisfied? How can the public be satisfied to have schools taught by people who do not MAKE A LIVING? What can the Teachers Union do? We talked to this year regarding the Union were at favor of it, and appeared anxious to join. However, many of them did not get around to becoming members.

We would like everyone who plans to teach next year to give the Union serious consideration. We feel that education is a lost cause unless the teachers salvage and rebuild it.

What can the Teachers Union do? It can do what you want it to do. Here are just a few of the many things for the Union to work on:

1. Increased state aid.
2. Federal aid.
3. A more accurate tax assessment.
4. A greater value for the classroom teacher in planning the school program.
5. Complete political freedom of the teachers.
6. Fair tenure practices.

Let us then, be up and doing. With a heart for any teacher. Still achieving, still pursuing. And we won't have to wait.

House Votes Station In Appalachian Area For Fuel Experiments

The legislation, sponsored in the House by Congressman Griffiths, of Ohio, would authorize \$1,000,000 for construction and half a million dollars annually for maintenance and operation.

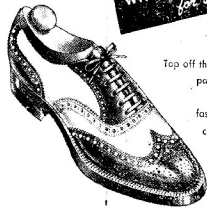

Last month Welfare Commissioner A. Y. Lloyd, in a letter to Clements, said downward adjustments would have to be made in grants to keep the assistance program going until the end of the year.

Lloyd had said the 1948 Legislature had to make a deficiency appropriation large enough to maintain old-age grants at the March average of \$17.40.

Lloyd had added that one-third of the cases would be reduced in April, one-third in May, and one-third in June.

April's reductions to old folks totaled about \$45,000 and the individual cuts generally ranged from \$2 to \$4.

But Clements explained that he has looked into the public-assistance fiscal picture. At the rate the Public Assistance Division was reducing grants there was a strong possibility that the program would end up with a fair surplus, he said.

That's why the no-more-reduction announcement was issued.

The Governor gave credit to the 1948 Legislature for approving a \$600,000 deficiency appropriation for public assistance for the remainder of this year. Unless the Legislature had done that, Clements said, the aid program would have stopped during May and June.

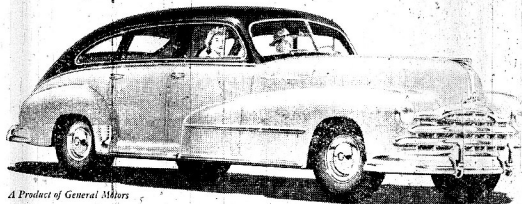

FISH AND GAME NOTES

The bass hatch from the Commission of Game & Fish hatcheries is described as excellent and to date more than 425,000 of these fry have been placed in rearing ponds and farm ponds. Minor Clark, superintendent of hatcheries, declares from the Williamsburg hatchery 300,000 fry have been placed in ponds in the Fifth, Sixth, Seventh, Eighth and Ninth districts, while 125,000 have been distributed, while at least 350,000 additional are expected and probably more than 100,000 additional will come from the Williamsburg hatchery. Counting the number of fry to be kept by the Division for rearing and for brood stock, the total for the season is expected to surpass the million mark, which will far exceed the greatest distribution in the history of the state hatcheries. Clark declared that the price of commercial fry is \$30 per thousand and at this rate fry valued at approximately \$20,000 will have been distributed by the Division this season. Deadline for application for stocking of ponds was April 15. This date was necessary so that distribution routes could be mapped to prevent overlapping of truck trips. More fish will be distributed in districts which already have received fish and those districts not yet touched will receive their bass within the next few weeks.

Two coal companies have been fined a total of \$400 on charges of polluting tributaries of the Big Sandy river, the Division of Game & Fish has announced. Verdicts were returned last week in the Pike circuit court over which Judge R. Monroe Fields presided. Fined were the Republic Steel Company, Ruston, Ky., for emptying coal dust in the Levisa fork of Big Sandy. Punishment was fixed at a \$400 fine on two counts. Candelaria Coal Company, Big Creek, Ky., was fined \$200 on one count for pollution of Big Creek with coal dust. The Division has announced that both these companies, since being indicted, have made corrections in their waste distribution, and additional judgments against each company are being continued since satisfactory arrangements have been initiated.

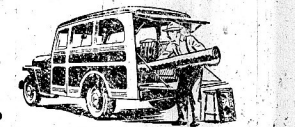

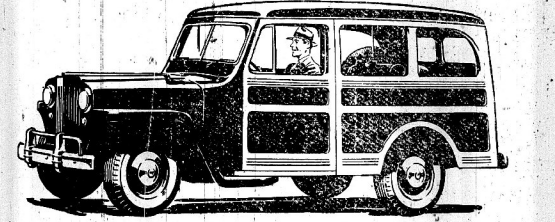

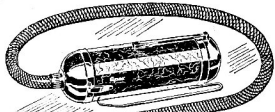
