called his 200-man policy committee to a June 24 meeting for "instructions."

It was taken for granted those "instructions" will deal with whether the miners shall work when they come back July 6 from their annual two-week vacation. The lockout starts June 25 and the current working agreement ends June 30, before they are due back.

Ching, in a telegram to the union and the producers, reminded them of the Taft-Hartley law section which says his office should move in, if a work stoppage threatens to interrupt commerce.

And both union and management, he said, have a "duty and responsibility" to try to break the impasse.

Charles O'Neill, spokesman for the operators, issued a lengthy statement.

The chief obstacle, he said, was the UMW head's insistence on putting the 1947 welfare fund, now built up to \$400,000 on a 10-cent-per-ton royalty on coal, into operation before anything else is done.

Federal Judge Paul G. Goddard, who ordered the UMW to discontinue Saturday afternoon picketing, said he was "representative on the board, is suing to stop picketing under a plan agreed to by Lewis and Senator Bridges (R-NH), third board member."

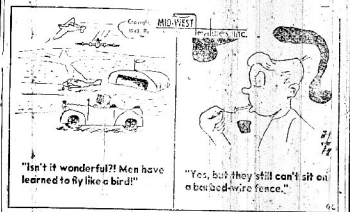

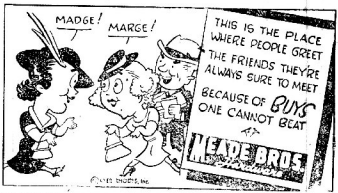

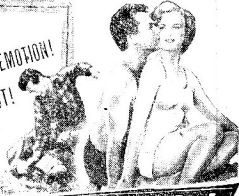

**KENTUCKY ON THE MARCH**

By EWING GALLOWAY  
Fellow columnist Bob Smallwood (Bentleyville Enterprise) thinks I was out on Laddio clover and 31 fence in a recent article. I offered no criticism of these two forage crops. I tried to do what I could to caution farmers against believing so-called Laddio or fescue was like scattering lead birdshot on the ground and harvesting gold nuggets as big as grapefruit. I passed along a report from a test fence is not as high as it might be in feed value. All I said about Laddio was that I had sowed it and was awaiting results.

Fescue and Laddio seed are selling at fabulous prices, which may account in part for the ballyhoo. Two years ago I visited a fescue seed farm in Christian county and saw the stuff growing on four fields varying in fertility from ground that seemed to have been worn to a frazzle with wheat or corn, or both to fairly good ground. The growth varied with the soil, but the poorest field, where seed was sown on hard stak land, had a surprisingly good stand and the grass looked almost as high as that on the best field. It was dense Laddio, but I was sure it would not have sprouted isopodema. As a cover crop, particularly on thin land, and as grazing for cattle, fescue has my wholehearted endorsement. I would recommend it for 40 per cent of the farms in Kentucky. It will enable farmers with thin land to raise cattle or sheep cheaply, and to check erosion.

In an article last fall I figured that Kentucky farmers could increase beef cattle production \$40,000,000 by utilizing the grass and other forage they already have. Nobody accused me of exaggerating. I fescue when the seed is cheap enough for farmers with thin land to afford it, should double my figures. I don't like to hear press agents, hired or voluntary, claim miracles for anything farmers have to buy. Last year a chemical weed killer was tried with considerable success in growing corn, and the ballyhoo was loud and long. I am going to wait a year or two before spraying my cornfields with a weed killer. The other day I asked a very able county agent what our corn land, particularly bottom land, would do for hams if there were no weeds plowed under. I mentioned fescue and Laddio clover also. "These things look good, thus far," he replied, "but the answer are not all in." In the meantime, I'll back up my approval of fescue.



The Division of Game and Fish has announced. The first chicks appeared on May 10, and subsequent hatchings have revealed that about 85 per cent of the eggs have produced chicks. This may be compared to the hatching percentage of 65 last year. The Division brooder houses are being shipped birds right now. It was pointed out. Within a few weeks all the birds will be channeled to operating clubs, and with this in mind, the Game Management department has sent to these clubs heating elements, thermostats and a complete set of instructions for the rearing of the birds. 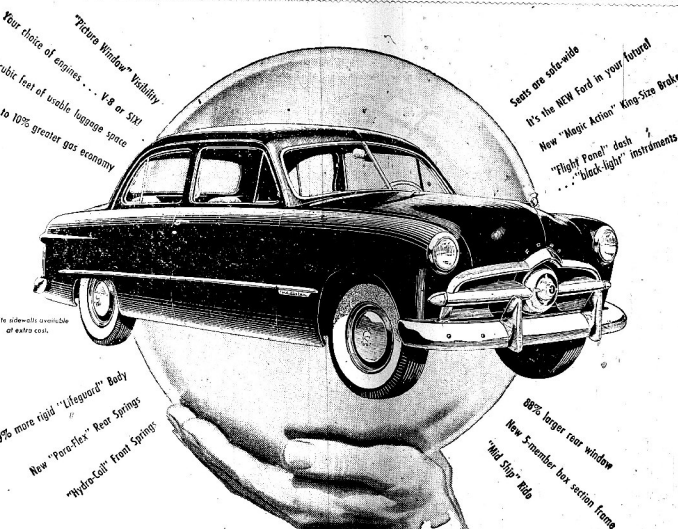

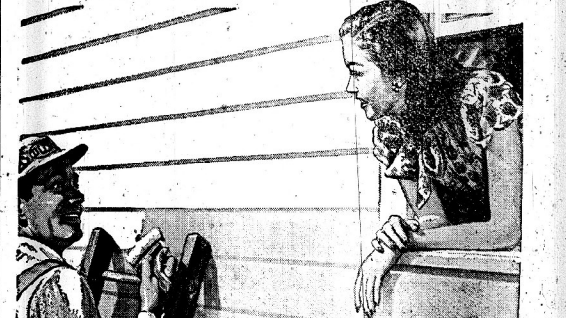

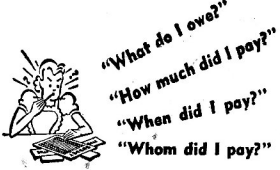
