Many Improvements Need of Conn Mine, Inspector Reports

Recommendations suggesting improvement in nearly every phase of operation are contained in a Bureau of Mines safety report issued and based on an original inspection of the Conn Coal Company's 140-ton-a-day No. 3 mine at Harold. The mine, employing 20 men, was examined in April by Inspector W. R. Stewart in accordance with the Federal Mine Safety Code.

A systematic method of timbering has been adopted for the mine and roof is tested frequently by workmen, but Inspector Stewart said the timbering plan should be complied with in additional places. Temporary roof supports be set at faces and permanent posts advanced promptly, and some unsafe roof observed should be removed or supported.

Although comment on the circulation of sufficient air through last open cross-cuts, the inspector proposed offsetting the fan at least 10 feet and providing more extensive, suitable gauge, and pressure-relief facilities. Incombustible main stop-frames should be substituted for permissible flame safety lamps and making of pre-shift mine examinations and at least weekly air measurements for explosive gas and other hazards.

Pointing out the dangers of using black blasting powder, Inspector Stewart said if continued in use on the shift, blasts should be fired with electric squibs and an electrical blasting unit. He also proposed safe carrying of blasting supplies in approved containers, and firing of all shots singly when shot-firers are in the mine.

Additional recommendations called for removal of coal dust accumulations from haulageways, rock-dust-dusting rooms and entries to within 80 feet of the working faces, unobstructed clearances and clean shelter areas along haulageways, effective ear-plugging, insulators for power wires and electric light wires, frame grounds for electrical equipment, with overhead protection for cables, adequate first-aid and fire-fighting equipment, adoption of a personnel-checking plan, and wearing of protective hats and footwear by all employees and goggles by those in eye-hazardous work.

While endorsing many recent safety advances in the 1,000-ton-a-day Stephens Elk Horn mine at Manton, a federal coal mine inspector recommended additional rock-dusting and ventilating safeguards. Operated by the Stephens Elk Horn Fuel Corporation, the mine employed 150 men when Leslie Shaw re-inspected it in April and May.

All rooms, entries, and haulageways had recently been rock-dusted to within 80 feet of the faces, but the inspector pointed out the need for more rock dust in several sections to minimize dust explosion dangers. In addition to dusttight motors for dusty tippie locations, Commending the pre-shift examinations and the incombustible stop-frames, he also suggested more air through the last open crosscut in the 2 east entries, air-lock doors or attendants at single doors, warning signs at abandoned workings, and further safeguards for the Nos. 2 and 4 ventilating fans. No gas was detected during the inspection.

MINERS URGE DEFEAT OF 2

Brand Meade, Chapman Labor's Foes Because Of Tatt-Hartley Act

United Mine Workers leaders called Friday for the defeat of Seventh district Congressman W. H. Meade, a Republican, and Virgil Chapman, candidate for the Democratic nomination for United States Senator.

Carlton Elkins, District 30 representative for the union, and Tom Raney, international board member, disclosed the adoption of two resolutions by local leaders of the U. M. W. at a meeting in Hazard, Ky.

Chapman was declared to be the "hand-picked" candidate of Governor Parke C. Clements, and was described in one resolution as "the most notorious enemy of labor in Kentucky." The same resolution named John Y. Brown, Lexington attorney, "an outstanding and unselfish friend of labor."

The resolutions, withheld two days before their release, announced also the formation of a "labor education committee" to work for the defeat "of enemies of organized labor" in the August primary election.

Referring to Congressman Meade, the resolutions called for the U. M. W. full credit for sending him to Congress, and pledged his support to legislation beneficial to labor.

"Mr. Meade, however, has been taken in by the enemies of labor. He voted for the Tatt-Hartley bill." The 50 local union leaders who signed the two papers indicated no opponent of the incumbent for election.

Opposition to Chapman had been announced by the miners two weeks ago. Raney said in a statement June 5 that in protest against Chapman's nomination, union members of the Seventh district were boycotting the county Democratic organization meetings.

Meade is opposed for the Republican nomination in the primary by Herbert Rowland, Whitehouse. Five candidates seek the Democratic nomination.

Mrs. Underwood Dies, Believed Heart Victim

Mrs. Zona Dove Underwood, 63 years old, mother of Mrs. Raymond Hopson, of Haysville, and Raymond Underwood, formerly of Prestonsburg, was found dead in bed at her home in Mullens, W. Va., early Sunday.

Mr. and Mrs. Grade Hubbard, of Prestonsburg, who were visiting their daughter, Mrs. Raymond Underwood, at the home at the time, said she apparently died of a heart attack while she slept. She had been in failing health for the last few years.

Mrs. Underwood was a native of True, W. Va. She was a member of the First Methodist Church at Mullens. Besides her husband and son and daughter, a second son, James Monroe Underwood, of Logan, survives.

Former Allen Resident Ganshot Wound Victim


Vernon McIntosh, 54 years old, former resident of Allen and father of J. W. McIntosh, of Prestonsburg, was found dead late Tuesday afternoon in the yard of his home at Winchester, Ky., a shotgun wound in his chest. The shot, it was said, was self-inflicted.

Mr. McIntosh at one time was employed at Allen and for several years had been connected with a gas company at Winchester. Besides his widow and son, two daughters survive.

The funeral was conducted today (Thursday) and burial was made in Winchester cemetery.

What the New Draft Act Means

These are some pertinent questions and answers on the peacetime draft bill which Congress passed Saturday night.

- Q Who will be drafted and for how long?
- A. Within the next two years, a maximum of 666,882 men, 19 through 25, will be drafted for 21 months each. The army estimates it will need 200,000 to 225,000 draftees the first year. The navy and air force hope to keep up their strength through volunteers.
- Q When does the draft bill take effect?

A President Truman has until a week from Wednesday—10 days from the bill's passage—to sign it. Any time after the 90 days immediately following the signing the President may, upon recommendation from the armed forces, make a draft call. The first call is likely to come in September.

- Q Who must register and when?
- A. Most males through 25, except members of the regular armed forces and their active reserves; diplomatic officials and their families. Registration may start at any time after the signing of the bill, provided the draft machinery now being organized can be put into operation.
- Q Who is exempt from the draft in addition to those who need not register?

A. War veterans—those with at least 90 days of service between Pearl Harbor (Dec. 7, 1941), and VJ Day (Sept. 2, 1945), or 12 months between Sept. 16, 1946, and the day the bill becomes law, regularly organized ministers, students studying for the ministry and conscientious objectors.

Q How can eligible men avoid the draft?

A. Men 19 through 25 may do so by joining the National Guard or other active drilling reserves of the armed forces before the President signs the bill. For youths of 18, a one-year enlistment, to be followed by six years with organized reserve units, or the National Guard, is required.

- Q Who can be deferred?
- A. High school students until they are graduated, quit school or become 20. College students are deferred for one year if enrolled on or before the date the President signs the bill. The President also may defer at his discretion: (a) Men with dependents; (b) Men essential in agriculture, industry, government and research; (c) Scientific and medical students.

Students who have completed their freshman and sophomore ROTC training are deferred so long as they continue in those courses. If they

graduate and receive their commissions as reserve officers, they will then be subject to possible call.

- Q How about draft boards?
- A. Probably the same organization used for World War II, with local boards appointed by Governors. However, there probably will be only 4,000 boards compared with wartime total of 6,442.
- Q Who will be called first?

A. This has not yet been decided, but the lottery system probably will not be used. Drafting by age groups, starting with 21-year-olds, is a probability.

- Q Who will run the system?
- A. Probably a revived Selective Service office, perhaps headed by War-time Draft Chief Maj. Gen. Lewis B. Hershey. The office of Selective Service records now is in charge of planning.
- Q What about training?

A. The army has stopped disposing of its wartime training camps and is examining their usability. Draftees may also train with regular army divisions now located at Camp Ord, Calif.; Campbell, Ky.; Hood, Texas; Dix, N.Y.; Jackson, S. C. Some draftees may go overseas as soon as they finish their basic training.

- Q What veteran benefits will be available?

A. Regular peacetime benefits, including hospitalization, disability compensation and death pensions.

Q What is the purpose of the draft?

A. To help enable the United States to carry out its occupation mission overseas, and to maintain an adequate home defense.

Frankfort, Ky. June 21—The State Revenue Department announced today that occupational licenses on billiard tables, bowling alleys, cigarette wholesalers, sales of ice cream, restaurants, sale of soft drinks, theaters, and tobacco retailers will expire on June 30.

The department said its field men will be instructed to make a thorough check on occupational licenses shortly after July 1. Delinquents will be subjected to a 20 per cent penalty and fines ranging from \$25 to \$200.

Mine Bureau Cites Lessons Taught by Deaths, Injuries

The lessons learned in two mine accidents in which four Floyd county men were killed and five others were burned are pointed to by the U.S. Bureau of Mines in its official reports of the separate occurrences. Excerpts from the reports follow:

Lethal carbon monoxide, given off by 15 heavy charges of explosives fired almost simultaneously, caused the deaths of four inexperienced miners in a poorly-ventilated truck mine near Blairtown, Ky., Feb. 25, according to the findings of federal coal mine inspectors.

Opened less than four months before the disaster, the 25-ton-a-day mine had been advanced only 100 feet into the coal bed and it was dependent upon natural ventilation to remove blasting smoke and fumes and provide fresh air for workers, the Bureau report states. The mine is known as the Southern Elkhorn mine, operated by the Southern Elkhorn Coal Company.

After the men had lit the fuse on the explosive charges, they apparently retired to a crosscut to await the blasts and for the smoke and fumes to clear, the federal inspectors reported, where they were overcome by the deadly carbon monoxide. The bodies were discovered the next day by wives of the four victims.

Inexperience of the four miners and their lack of knowledge of ventilation requirements and poisonous gases given off by explosives were contributory causes of the disaster, the inspectors stated. The owner of the mine, who died with his three helpers, had less than six months of mining. The other three had worked in coal mines less than two months.

Natural ventilation of the mine was not sufficient to carry away the smoke and fumes from the explosives. It was shown in the report prepared by Federal inspectors M. J. E. Collins, Charles Schindler, Miss Leslie Bink, and Roy Rogers.

Under "lessons to be learned" from this disaster, the inspectors stated: "Dependence upon natural drafts for ventilation, even in a mine only 100 feet in depth, is foolhardy. Inexperienced persons should not be permitted to work underground unless accompanied by one having practical knowledge of mining and its attendant dangers."

The firing of several shots of black blasting powder—a dangerous and non-permissible explosive used in some coal mines—ignited the coal dust explosion in which five men were burned at a small mine near Ligon.

Nine men were in the 150-ton-a-day mine known as the J. M. Hall No. 5 mine, operated by the Jack's Creek Mining Company at the time of the explosion. Three were burned critically, two less seriously, and four escaped unharmed. Federal inspectors Leslie Bink, Johnson and John E. Jones were making a routine inspection of another mine in the Hall mine district when the explosion occurred.

A blow-out blasting shot—one that blows out of the drill hole without breaking down the coal—ignited the cloud of coal dust, which had been raised from other shots fired a few seconds previously, the federal inspectors learned. Blasting was being done "off the side" without cutting the roof, making the coal more difficult to blast down and increasing the chances of a blow-out shot. Flames and heat from the explosion spread into other parts of the mine.

The use of permissible-type explosives, a thorough rock-dusting of the mine to neutralize the explosibility of the coal dust, and the removal of coal-dust accumulations would have prevented such an explosion, in the opinion of the federal inspectors. Even though the poorly rock-dusted mine was partly wet, coal dust was solely responsible for the explosion, they pointed out. There was no gas in the mine.

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Summarizing salient features of the accident, the federal inspectors said: "Blasting coal off the solid, especially with black blasting powder, is a hazardous practice, because of the cause of many fatalities. That damp coal dust can and will explode in a so-called 'wet' mine has again been demonstrated. Natural means must be supplemented by rock dust to prevent the propagation of an explosion."

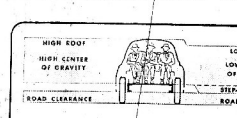
