Inland Steel Nears Safety Compliance, Report Indicates

Although numerous recent safety gains at the Wheelwright mine of the Inland Steel Company have brought this 5500-ton-a-day development into substantial compliance with recognized safety standards, a federal re-inspection report issued by the Bureau of Mines also suggests a few additional precautionary measures. The mine employed 1314 men at the time of the June 1947 survey by Inspector Jack Vitvrouk.

Among the recently-dispatched safeguards cited in the report were compliance with the adopted timbering standards, setting of permanent timbers reasonably close to working faces, prompt replacement of dislodged timbers, reproofing of the air duct leading to the 2-inch ventilating fan, coursing of sufficient air through the last entry crosscuts, driving of crosscuts between timbers and entries at 80-foot intervals, installation of a-lock doors, suitable preshift examinations in an effective roof-dusting program.

Further betterments listed in the report embraced lifting jacks and gates for the locomotives, a ban on the use of open-flame lights by workmen entering the mine from remote areas, unobstructed haulage-way clearance, severe electrical safeguards and the use of water to slay dust formed during cutting in about 15 per cent of the working times.

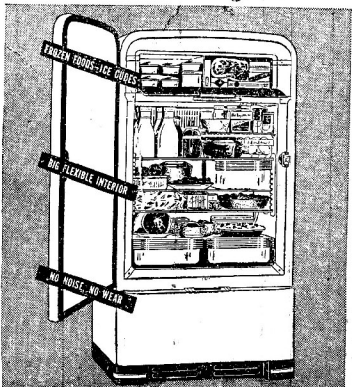

Delay Squirrel Season Five Days This Year

Squirrel hunters may take to the woods on August 20 this year, five days later than the opening of the season last year, the Division of Game & Fish has announced. Thirty days have been cut from the season this year in an effort to protect squirrels for future years, the Division warned.

The Fish & Game Commission also has changed the frog hunting season. Frogs may be taken from June 1 through December 31, with a limit of 15 per day. Hunting of pheasants or native grouse will be December 1 to December 15, both dates inclusive, while opossum, mink, raccoon, skunk, muskrat and red fox may be taken from December 1 to January 31, both dates inclusive. Federal regulations, which have not been announced, apply to the hunting of doves, geese, snipe, and gallinule, woodcock and snipe.

Denny was paid in his praise of the recent state open and said it was one of the best tournaments he had ever played in. His tournament experience has not been very wide but he has been out in some fast company a few times.

He played in the Charlotte Open in 1945 and in the city tournament in Chicago in 1939 and while working at Allen he played in the Hazard Open.

Then of course he has played in several tournaments around the state and early this spring he finished first in the sweepstakes event the pro shooting for a little job in the first pro-amateur event of the season up at Charleston's Kanawha Country Club.

Denny is pretty well satisfied with his 284 for fourth place in the recent state open. Sam Sneed won it with a 268. George Hoffer was second with 278 and But Coffee third with 280.

Denny had a 72-68-70-74-284 and his only regret is that 74 on the final round. But he knows why he slipped. "The grind was too tough. I just wasn't in shape for that final day of 36 holes." And there was only one way for him to be in shape and that was by playing golf more.

Sneed, Hoffer and Coffee had all been on the tournament trail and their legs were ready for the grind. But at that Denny came home with a hand full of laurels and the other hand full of money and he deserves a lot of credit for his showing.
