**SALES LOW, PRICES HIGH**

**'Petitcoat Rebellion' Effect Is Doubtful, Batcher Declares**

Butchers in some sections of the country admitted this week that buyers' strikes were crippling their business and grocery chains in only city cut prices to keep its meat moving.

Some shopkeepers said their business was down, while others said it was too early to tell whether the rebellion of housewives, who vowed to stay away from meat this week, was taking effect.

In Los Angeles the Safeway chain reduced the price of steaks to 93 cents a pound "to keep them moving." Last week T-bone and porterhouse steaks sold there for \$1.17 while club steak brought \$1.13. The chain cut round steak to 85 cents a pound, 8 cents under the price two weeks ago.

Wholesale meat prices held firm, however, and even advanced slightly on the New York market. Dunn & Breese said food prices generally have remained unchanged for the past two weeks.

Some retailers and ranchers said the buyers' strikes could not justify food prices, because the high prices were caused by short supplies.

A survey in cities where buyers' strikes have been organized brought mixed opinion on whether the "petitcoat rebellion" was successful. But almost all butchers agreed that general consumer resistance to high prices—whether organized or not—was cutting sales to the bone.

Many shopkeepers said business couldn't get much worse because, in effect, "There has been a buyers' strike for the past three months anyhow."

**No War On, But Floyd Almost Subscribes Full Bond Quota**

## SPORTS AFIELD

BY TED RESTING  
The person who fishes or hunts travels in a notable company of top-notch architects, miners, camouflage artists and military engineers, reports Bill Wolf, outdoor writer and naturalist.  
Some of these creatures, who long ago anticipated many of our most modern skills, wear feathers, some are clad in other porous scales or armor plate and some wear nothing much at all.  
These outdoor technicians are all interesting to observe. There is no doubt that human beings learned from them and copied many of their mechanical and other devices.  
For instance, watch that dragon fly closely. It is perfectly designed for its purpose in life. This one insect anticipated the airplane, helicopter, submarine and jet propulsion.

Sometimes, when hunting in October or November, look to the sky and you probably will see some of the bird's first balloons and parachutes—common spiders, which often travel hundreds of miles before alighting.  
Many of the military sciences actually owe their origin to imitation of nature. The latest model tanks were probably more efficiently "fire armed" because ordnance engineers studied the turtle. We are all acquainted with the skunk's military weapon, poison gas. Some octopuses discharge ink into the water to form a concealing smoke screen; and the bombardier beetle can fire four or five rounds of an acid, reddish "smoke" at its pursuers.  
Camouflage was highly developed in the last war, but we are fumbling amateurs in comparison with the masters we encounter whenever we go fishing or hunting. For all its gaudy coloring, a cock pheasant can manage to look like a rusty red rock on a bare field. Grouse and quail are invisible even when you know where they are squatting.  
Next time look around you when outdoors. You will be surprised at how many ways wildlife has anticipated man. Fishes use these principles first—fins to act as rudders and stabilizers, a swim bladder to increase or decrease buoyancy, a tear-drop shape for their least resistance to water.  
You'll find it difficult to understand how man has been so slow in adopting methods and principles that have been right in front of him ever since he came out of the trees.

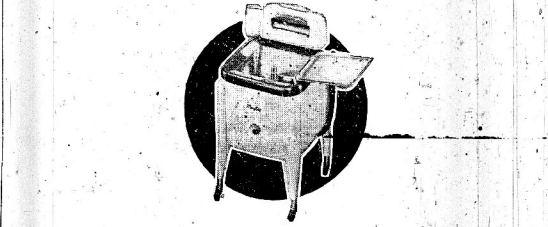

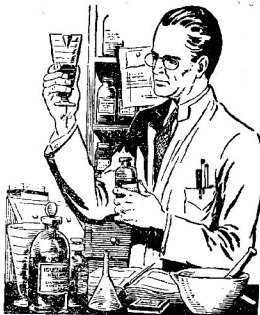

**OF INTEREST TO VETERANS**

Trailers and houseboats do not qualify as homes under loan guaranty provisions of the G. I. Bill, Veterans Administration branch officials at Columbus, O., are visiting relatives here.

Repeating to numerous inquiries, VA officials said trailers and houseboats, although frequently used as dwellings, are not "homes" within the meaning of the G. I. Bill and are ineligible for loan guaranty.

However, G. I. loans may be negotiated for trailers and houseboats if for legitimate business purposes.

Four specific benefits became available upon the death of a veteran of any war; it was pointed out this week by Veterans Administration branch office officials in Columbus, O.

VA is authorized to pay up to \$300 for funeral and burial expenses of a war veteran, provide an American flag for burial purposes, arrange for interment in a national cemetery and provide a grave marker.

Applications for any one of the four benefits may be procured from any VA office, from service organizations and from chapters of the American Red Cross. Benefits are available only when the veteran has been discharged under conditions other than dishonorable.

Appointment of Miss Olga C. Benderoff, of Cleveland, as acting chief in charge of the nursing division for the Veterans Administration in Ohio, Michigan and Kentucky was announced this week by Deputy Administrator Ralph H. Stone of the VA's tri-state branch office in Columbus, O.

A World War II veteran, Miss Benderoff joined VA four months ago as assistant nurse chief in the New York City branch office. Formerly, she was assistant director of nursing service at University Hospital, Cleveland.

**QUESTIONS AND ANSWERS**  
Q. If a G. I. loan, for any reason, is not completed after the guaranty or insurance has been entered upon the veteran's honorable discharge or certificate of eligibility, what should be done?  
A. The veteran should take his honorable discharge or certificate of eligibility to the regional office of VA where the necessary correction will be made.

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**COMMON SCHOOL ACCOUNTING PUT UNDER STATE CONTROL**

Six supervisory accounting districts for Kentucky's common school system were announced Wednesday by E. B. Hodgkin, Superintendent of Public Instruction.

Floyd county comprises the fifth or eastern district, along with Madison, Clark, Montgomery, Powell, Edith, Lee, Breathitt, Knott, Pike, Martin, Johnson, Magoffin, Wolfe, Menifee, Bath, Rowan, Morgan, Elliott, Lawrence, Boyd, Carter and Greenup.

County Superintendents Palmer L. Hall said here today that he considers the accounting system "a good idea." "It not only will keep a closer check on school administration but it will make advice from supervisors more readily available. Sometimes Superintendents need advice in certain situations," he said.

Shelby Kitch, Frenchburg, instructor and school administrator for 22 years, was named supervisor for this district.

Each district will have a bookkeeping supervisor who is to provide advice to school superintendents and boards of education and maintain an independent check on school-district finances.

Hodgkin said in the past the State Department of Education has audited school-district books. But a weakness in that procedure, he said, was that auditors were mainly concerned with simply seeing that figures on the books balanced.

The new supervisors, he explained, will have direct on all the money sent by the state to the school districts, in addition to having access to local-revenue records.

He said auditors are to concentrate on general school-finance accounting, pupil-personnel accounting, and veterans financial accounting.

**More Roadside Parks Planned by Kentucky Highway Department**

Frankfort, Ky., Aug. 3—Roadside planting and the establishment of additional roadside parks along Kentucky highways is being planned as a joint program for the Department of Highways and the Kentucky Garden Clubs Highway Commissioner Garrett L. Withers said this week.

The commissioner said he has been assured of garden club cooperation by Mrs. David B. Houser, Lexington, and Mrs. Baird Price, Louisville, representing both the national and state organizations.

"Each club in Kentucky will be requested to name its own committee to work with department district engineers," Mr. Withers said. "Native planting will be used by the department in all future work. Just as rapidly as possible, roadside parks will be created for the convenience and pleasure of motorists. A recent check of our present roadside parks indicated a growing use of this facility."

"Roadside planting is a practical work of the department. Seeding and protecting native trees protects the roadside and prevents erosion. When drainage is hampered by erosion, the road surface is also affected. The process of roadside planting has been called roadside beautification, but actually it has the dual role of reducing highway maintenance costs."

"We will welcome the gracious help of local garden clubs where the practical service of planting the highways will also bring about more presentable and attractive roadside appearance. It will reduce our full support."

It wasn't one of those stories that happens right in front of the newspaper, either. The bank was robbed at Pound, Va., 20 miles to the north over rugged mountain roads.

It was shortly after noon in Norton that The Coalfield Progress was to go to press. The paper had been made up with accounts of meetings and society items laboriously gathered from the clubs and churches and P-T-A. through the week.

Carroll Tate, a bushy dark-haired young man who calls himself "general flunk" for the paper and who is its reporter and business manager, was relaxing in the office.

## Mine Inspectors Ask Improvements

Although numerous safety improvements have recently been effected at the Stephens Elixons Fire Corporation's Stephens Elixons mine, an official coal mine re-inspection report released by the Bureau of Mines recommends the adoption of further timbering, haulage and ventilation safeguards. The mine is at Norton. It employed 150 men and averaged 1,000 tons of coal daily when re-examined in June by Inspector Leslie Johnson.

Among the principal timbering and haulage safeguards proposed in the report were wider use of safety mats in the face regions, setting of permanent timbers closer to working faces and prying down or effective support of loose roof, removal of remaining obstructions from haulage ways and shelter holes, driving of shelter holes at specified shaft throws, use of permissible trip lights, and discontinuance of certain risky practices.

Further conformance with company timbering rules, more extensive control of coal dust, and several other electrical safeguards are recommended for the Alely mine, at Water Gap. Some improvements were credited to the mine, which had 81 employees when it was re-examined in June.

Inspector Russell Shaw said safety posts should be set at working faces and permanent timbers advanced promptly, permissible explosives should be fired with electric detonators, holes should be tagged with suitable material, and all shots or series of shots should be fired immediately after charging when blasting on shift.

Safer blasting practices and a rock-dusting program are recommended for the Conn Coal Company's No. 3 mine at Harold. This mine employed 19 men and produced 150 tons of coal daily when W. R. Stewart re-inspected it in June.

Coal was blasted off the solid, with black blasting powder, fired with fuses. Inspector Stewart advanced firing the shots singly with electric squibs and electric blasting units, using only wooden tamping bars, using closed individual non-conductive containers for carrying black powder, providing a suitable surface explosives-storage magazine, and keeping explosives underground in individual containers. A safe distance from rails of power lines, and out of line of blast. The inspector also pointed out to the management the disadvantages of using black blasting powder, with the hope that eventually permissible explosives or permissible blasting devices would be used exclusively.

## KENTUCKY ON THE MARCH

By EWING GALLOWAY  
Recently I gave you part of the story about what the Ladies' Auxiliary of the Madison County Health Society is doing for backward schools in that community. There wasn't space enough for all of it, so I'm giving you the second half now, or to be more exact, relying to you the rest of the letter from Maister D. Bement, executive director of the committee, who, with James W. Bement, the committee's director of community service, visited Richmond and much of the county earlier in this year.

The ladies' organization, headed by Mrs. Shelby Carr, has full cooperation of the service clubs of the county, many churches, woman's clubs, the veterans' organization, the school system, the medical society, and the county officials. Says Mr. Bement:

"We visited a one-room school that is now springing hot lunches to the students. The Lions Club donated a cook stove and the children's teacher, being in vegetables, which are prepared at the school and served in the form of a hot lunch daily. No actual cash is required by the students for this hot lunch.

"Each rural school has a leader from this group assigned to the school, who, with her committee, is responsible for the total health program for that particular school. Some of the little one-room school-houses have been painted on the inside by the children. Home-made dressing tables are made by students and a number of other small items have been added as school equipment. In most cases this has been done without any expense to the students or to the County Board of Education.

"This voluntary group of women have also established a clothing center at the consolidated county high school, which is outside Richmond. Individuals and organizations all over the county donate clothing to this center. Teachers from the rural schools come into the center and check out clothing which is needed by the students. This clothing is distributed through the teachers of the rural schools. If a child is able to buy the clothing it is sold at a very nominal cost—for example, a dress, for 50c; a pair of shoes for 25c, etc. However, if the children do not have and cannot get, the 50c or 25c, the clothing is furnished through the voluntary organization.
